

Settlement Seen In U. S., Canada Wheat Controversy

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A major economic friction between the United States and Canada appears to have been settled by agreement reached this month on American surplus wheat marketing policies, Guy Carrington Smith, Canada's trade chief in Washington, said Thursday.

U. S. dumping of surplus wheat stocks abroad has seriously cut wheat exports by Canada, which is the highest import customer for United States products, said Smith in an address prepared for a San Francisco world trade luncheon.

Smith declared Canada's export sales of wheat and flour amounted to 12 per cent of the Dominion's total exports last year and are of "utmost importance" to Canada's economy.

In contrast, he said, U. S. wheat sales abroad amount to only a small fraction of total exports.

Canadians became alarmed by the U. S. wheat dumping methods, Smith said, because "wheat is one of the backbones of Canadian exports, and exports in turn are one of the main supports of the Canadian economy."

Under the agreement announced Oct. 8, the United States pledged to avoid, in surplus marketing, interfering with normal commercial channels of Canadian wheat.

"This is an example of how we usually manage to deal with serious economic problems between us when they arise," said Smith.

Smith is minister in charge of commercial affairs at the Canadian Embassy in Washington.

Price Fixing Charged To Nine In Portland Area

PORTLAND (AP) — A federal grand jury Wednesday indicted nine firms on charges of conspiring to fix milk prices in this area.

Judge William East set Nov. 22 for arraignment of Safeway Stores, Inc.; Oregon Milk Distributors; and seven members of the distributors.

The indictment accuses them of agreeing "to fix prices paid to producers for raw milk, to fix distributors' prices for bottled milk . . . to establish non-competitive quantity discounts for bottled milk and eliminate competition among distributors in the sale and distribution of bottled milk."

According to the indictment, the nine firms accounted for 80 per cent of the 120 million quarts sold in the Portland market area last year.

The Justice Department started the Portland milk price investigation last April. In charge was Lyle Jones, chief of the San Francisco office of the department's anti-trust division.

A distributors' spokesman denied there had been violations of anti-trust laws or a conspiracy to fix prices. He said Portland area milk prices are the lowest of any major West Coast city.

Portland stores have been selling milk at 22 cents a quart.

Judge Instructs Jury In Trial Of Thomas Maloney

PORTLAND (AP) — Circuit Judge Martin Hawkins Thursday gave his instructions to the jury in the bribe conspiracy trial of Thomas E. Maloney.

The trial is one of a number which stemmed from Portland's long vice probe.

The state has charged that Maloney, former Dist. Atty. William Langley and Joseph McLaughlin of Seattle were in on a plot to profit from gambling.

Maloney, 54, testified earlier in the trial that he had been employed by Langley as an investigator to ferret out vice operations here.

In this final argument to the jury Wednesday, Asst. Atty. Gen. John Nichols said "this story of the informer was invented to supply an excuse for the acquaintance of this man with Langley that couldn't be accounted for legitimately in any other way."

Three Criminal Cases Dismissed In Circuit Court

Three criminal cases were dismissed in circuit court this week because of lack of evidence or because witnesses are no longer available.

An indictment returned by a grand jury in Nov., 1936, was dismissed upon motion of the district attorney. This charged Donald W. Hilliard, 23, Myrtle Creek, with assault with a dangerous weapon.

The indictment charging Hilliard with attacking Loren H. Corder with a couple of rocks was dismissed because of insufficient evidence.

Dismissed because witnesses have left the area and can't be located was a complaint charging Richard Atkins, 30, Canyonville, with destruction of person property. He had been accused of destroying a McCart Bros. Logging Co. bulldozer blade with an acetylene torch on July 12.

A cruelty to animals charge against a man identified as John Voss was dismissed because witnesses are no longer available.

The charge was placed against Voss because of an alleged attack on a dog with a piece of lumber on Feb. 11, 1936. The animal belonged to Raymond Cook of Riddle.

Voss was tried in Canyonville justice court May 9, 1936 and was found guilty by a jury. He had appealed the conviction.

Observer Perishes On Arctic Glacier

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — Death on an Arctic glacier, apparently from exposure, came to Dr. Richard C. Hubley, 31, who was making night observations for the International Geophysical Year program.

The death of Hubley, a graduate of the University of Washington, was announced Wednesday at the Arctic Aeromedical Laboratory at Ladd Air Force Base near here.

It occurred the night of Oct. 28. Hubley was coordinator of the U. S. glaciological program in the northern hemisphere for the IGY project.

Hubley, and three other men, not immediately identified, were at a camp on the glacier on Romanof Mountain in the Brooks Range in far northern Alaska.

The Air Force said Hubley left camp late in the evening of Oct. 28 to conduct observations and did not return. An immediate search was started but the scientist was dead when found. The Air Force said "prolonged exposure" apparently was the cause.

Hubley, unmarried, was the son of G. Carleton Hubley of Tacoma, Wash.

Former Idaho Senator Dies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Herman Welker, an Idaho Republican who served one six-year term in the U. S. Senate, died Wednesday night at the age of 50.

Welker, who was defeated for re-election last year by Democrat Frank Church, died at the National Institutes of Health following a second brain operation.

Cause of death was not immediately announced, but a friend of the family said recently a first operation was to relieve pressure on the brain and to explore the possibility of a brain tumor. A second operation on Monday presumably was to remove a tumor.

A consistent spokesman for the conservative wing of his party, Welker attracted national attention in 1934 as the principal defender of the late Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) in debate preceding the Senate condemnation of McCarthy.

Welker resumed law practice in Boise after his election defeat. Survivors include his widow, Gladys, and a daughter, Nancy.

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President's Enthusiastic Support Of GOP Candidate Poses Political Question

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower may be risking a political black eye in his enthusiastic endorsement of Republican Malcolm Forbes in the New Jersey governorship race.

On the other hand, Eisenhower's plug for Forbes in a contest some Republicans regard as a long-shot gamble may be of more significance to the GOP in the 1958 battle for control of Congress than what happens at the polls in New Jersey.

Forbes is running against Democratic Gov. Robert B. Meyner. If Forbes wins next Tuesday, it would provide — as Eisenhower told his news conference Wednesday — "a great big shot in the arm" for Republicans.

If Forbes loses, Eisenhower will have put himself into a situation many will regard as confirmation of reports his own political popularity is slipping noticeably.

Watches Other Poll

At his news conference, Eisenhower was asked only about the Forbes-Meyner race. But press secretary James C. Hagerty said later the President hopes also for a victory by Republican Ted Dalton over Democrat J. Lindsay Almond for governor of Virginia.

Politicians here read the President's action as indicating he intends to make a stiff fight for the kind of candidates he likes, even if he has to take some political lumps in the process.

These politicians are contrasting this new attitude to the considerably more cautious course Eisenhower followed in 1956, when his own re-election was at stake.

In discussing his attitude toward the 1958 campaign, Eisenhower said last May 22 that he will support "enthusiastically" Republicans who back him on major issues. As for those who are against him, he said, he'll be for them "merely because they are Republican."

No Chance To Alibi

In the case of Forbes, Eisenhower wiped out any chance the Republicans could alibi defeat by contending that local—and not national—issues decided the contest.

By the same token, he went a long way toward making any Forbes victory a lesson to those in the party who don't like the White House brand of "Modern Republicanism."

To some this looked like a new determination by Eisenhower to carry out his post-election pledge to remake his party.

Eisenhower described Forbes as "the young, vigorous type of candidate we should have in politics."

"I believe he is a man of fine character," the President said. "He has a fine family and I think

Mount Angel Abbey Anniversary Observed

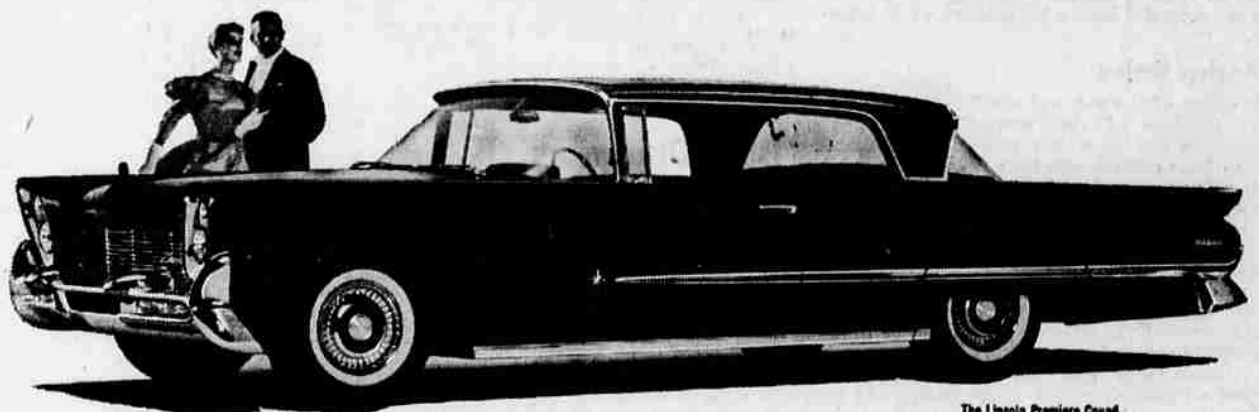
MOUNT ANGEL (AP) — The 75th anniversary of Mount Angel Abbey's founding was observed Wednesday.

The Most Rev. Francis P. Leipzig, bishop of Baker, addressed a luncheon.

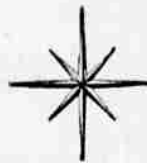

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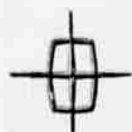
