Bill Would Ease Action On Grievance Complaints

SEATTLE (AP) — A bill to make it easier for union members to get action on grievance complaints against union officers is being considered by Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore).

Porter, here to address the Metropolitan Democratic Club Wednesday night, told newsmen that union members would purge the labor movement of crooked officials if they were permitted "freedom of action."

He said his idea would be to establish a board, or series of boards, to hold preliminary hearings on grievances. Such boards, he said, could be set up by the unions themselves, or the government.

"They could screen out the crackpot grievances and give assistance to the prosecution of grievances which have merit," he added.

TO GET DESTROYER

BREMEN, Germany (AP) — The West German Navy announced Wednesday that 113 officers and sailors will fly to Charleston, S.C., next month to take over the new navy's first destroyer.

The destroyer, loaned to the Germans by the U.S. Navy, will be used for training until West Germany has built its own vessels.

Civil Air Patrol Joins Search For Airplane

SEATTLE (AP) — Ten Civil Air Patrol planes joined the search Wednesday for a stolen plane that disappeared Monday after the pilot radioed he was making a suicide dive into the Pacific.

The man identified himself as J. A. Greenawalt of Seattle, and messaged he was "taking this way out" because of mental depression.

A search of Pacific beaches and isolated airfields Tuesday produced no trace of the plane.

Greenawalt's estranged wife, Anita, was notified at Fairbanks, Alaska, where she is living with her parents. The couple has two children, age 3 and 2, and she is expecting their third child in a few months.

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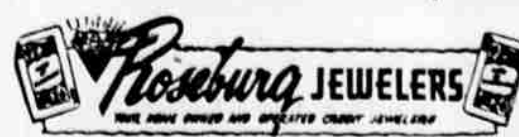


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
