## Marshfield Is Favored But Indians Eye Upset

A hungry band of Indians will invade the Marshfield Pirates home field tonight for what looms as one of the most important games of the season for either club. Neither team has registered a win in District 5-A-1 competition this year and will pull out all the stops in an effort to come through with a victory.

Marshfield has its 40-game winning streak stopped last week by the South Eugene Axemen, 9-0, after being held to a 0-0 tie the week before, by a fired up bunch of Springfield Millers, in the first two league encounters for Roseburg, they were trimmed by South Eugene, 20-0, and edged by Springfield, 6-0.

This leaves Marshfield one notch higher than Roseburg with a record of no wins, one loss and one tie in league play against the 0-2 mark for Roseburg.

For the season, Roseburg sports a record of three wins and three losses, while Marshfield has a record of five wins, one loss and one tie.

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## Sideline

A hip joint injury is one of those long-time healing disabilities that now has Hub Beamer almost completely sidelined at Oregon State. Nub is not even listed in the starting lineup for the Washington State game Saturday, and he is "doubtful" even to appear as a mid-week.

The hurt was serious enough last weekend to limit Beamer to just five running carries against Washington, and as a result, the Roseburg boy has dropped down to third place in the PCC rushing standings.

Heading the list now is the ex-Beaverton High boy, Chuck Shea of Stanford, who has 472 net yards and a 4.7 average per carry. Running behind are Oregon's Jim Shanley with a 467 net and a 4.4 average and Beamer with a 406 net and a 4.9 yard mark per carry. Beamer has carried the ball 83 times, compared to 105 times for Shanley and 100 times for Shea.

**IN TOTAL OFFENSE** for six games, Shea is fifth, Shanley sixth and Beamer seventh. Shanley has scored 36 points, Beamer 35 and Idaho's Howard Willis for first in the league, Shea has 30 and Beamer 24.

Punt returns give Shanley third place in the conference with 58 yards, and a 9.7 average per return and kickoff returns give him third place with 191 yards, for a 31.8 yard average on the latter in six returns.

If all goes well, both Beamer and Shanley should still be among the top three rushers in the conference when Oregon and Oregon State collide Nov. 30, and we will see another great duel between the two.

No exact figures are at hand, but when Jack Morris of Oregon reached the 260-yard mark in rushing for the season against California last weekend, he surpassed Jake Leicht's fifth best all-time Oregon rushing figure, like Shanley passed it when it was fourth-best earlier.

Like a lot of other people we take a real liking to this 1957 Oregon football team. We pick Stanford in our predictions below to spring one on the Ducks this weekend (and hope that Oregon wins), but there's a lot to be said for this team.

**THE ATTITUDE** of playing one game at a time, with absolutely no mention of the Rose Bowl, has paid off for the Ducks. In fact, Oregon press releases are now going out of their way to ignore the Rose Bowl, referring only to the conference title as at stake.

Accused all several of being the conference "purists" along with Stanford, it's these two ball clubs which are virtually playing for the title in their Saturday game now. And while the people to the south carry on their threats of dissolving the PCC, nothing would be place pleasing than to see the Ducks, with their "don't even know there's a grand daddy of them all Rose Bowl" attitude, continue losing in Saturday-by-Saturday.

In the face of the fuss being raised to the stir-happy south about the PCC being "sick," it might be noted that the man with the quote in his mouth figure, well, have known where he speaks.

A season's final score: University of Oregon 71, University of California System of Higher Education 6 (UCLA, San Jose State, California).

If any team ever represented the old-time "Ivy-League" traditional football appearance these days, what with their fundamental style of play featuring defense, rushing and passing in that order, and their titanic toward winning each game as it comes along, it's none other than the U of O.

**FOR EXAMPLE**, it's refreshing to see a team pass only when it has to in a game and then make good on it at that. The top team in the PCC is eighth in the league in passing offense with 63.7 yards per game and with only 30 completions. But of those 30 successes, six have been good for TD's, all of which adds up to five more points than the entire opposition has been able to get both running and throwing.

Hard to say what Oregon's present attitude toward collegiate athletics will someday reap, but there's no denying right now it's doing them a world of good.

The winner of the West Linn-McMinnville contest at West Linn, the feature game of weekend action, will be assured of nothing worse than a tie for the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League (district 4) championship.

Both teams are unbeaten and untied. McMinnville is No. 11 in the Associated Press poll. West Linn is 14th.

**Beavers Favored**  
Beaverton, No. 3, is favored to whip Parkrose and clinch a tie for the Metropolitan League (district 3) title.

South Salem, No. 2, can gain the same assurance in the Valley League (district 8) by beating Sweet Home. Milton-Freewater, undefeated and untied and 12th in the poll, needs a victory over The Dalles to nail down at least a tie for the Blue Mountain Conference (district 7) championship.

Powerful South Eugene, the state's No. 1 team, will play at North Bend. Springfield, tied with Grant of Portland at No. 6, will be host to Cottage Grove. A game between South Eugene and Springfield later will decide the Midwestern League (district 5) championship.

Marshfield, which had its string of 40 unbeaten games snapped by South Eugene last week, will meet Roseburg in another Midwestern League contest. Marshfield is tied with Jefferson of Portland for fourth in the AP' poll.

In Portland city league games, Jefferson will play Franklin and Grant will clash with Madison.

Milwaukie, No. 10 and still in the Metropolitan League title running, will travel to David Douglas of Portland.

Grants Pass, No. 8 and tied with Medford for the lead in the Southern Oregon Conference (district 6) race, will go out of the district to play Tillamook. Medford will meet Ashland.

Unbeaten and untied class A-2 teams will put their records on the line. Vale, 7-0, will tangle with Ontario. In other games, it's Willamina, 7-0, vs. Salem Academy,
