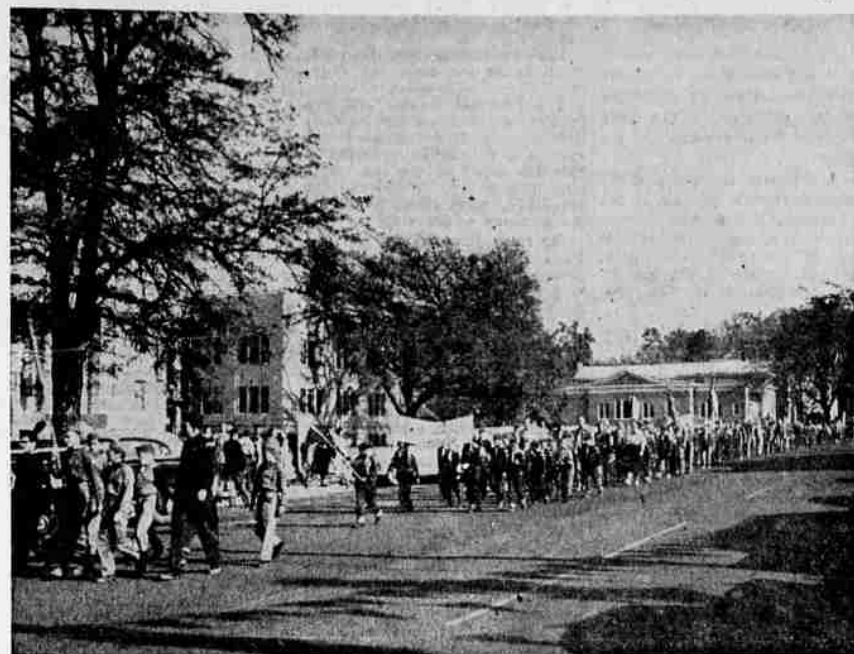


# Scouts Hold District Rally

## Lost Woman Found Alive; Condition Good

TOLLGATE, Ore. — Mrs. Marvin Walker, 48, the object of a widespread search in the Blue Mountains of northeastern Oregon, was found alive and well Monday. She had been lost since Thursday.

She appeared none the worse for her ordeal and state police said she planned to remain to continue the elk hunting expedition that was interrupted by her disappearance.

She had gone to the area, 20 miles northeast of here, late last week with her husband and Mr. and Mrs. Warren Wright, all of Newberg, Ore.

Benny L. Van Winkle, 27, a Weston, Ore., construction worker who had joined the search party, found her standing on a ridge beside a beacon fire.

The Walkers are familiar with the Umatilla National Forest area, where she became lost, from previous hunting trips there.

## Two Positions On Board Open

Two positions will be open on the board of directors of the North Roseburg Sanitary District Dec. 2, when the district will hold its annual election.

Petitions for the positions must be filed at the district office, 671 NE Alameda Ave., by 5 p.m. Nov. 12, according to Howard Harris, manager.

Both are for three-year terms. The terms of Milo Bell and Roy Allen will expire at the end of the year.

Harris said petitions must contain the names of 10 registered voters. Candidates must be property owners, registered voters and residents of the district.

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## Merlyn Pitzele Resigns Position With Magazine

NEW YORK — Merlyn S. Pitzele, who told Senate racketeers last week that he took money from the Teamsters Union while he headed the New York State Mediation Board, has resigned from the staff of Business Week magazine.

Pitzele was campaign labor adviser to President Eisenhower in 1952 and 1956.

The 46-year-old labor economist's resignation was announced Monday, three days after he told Senate investigators in Washington that he had collected \$15,000 from the Teamsters in a three-year period.

Pitzele had held the rank of senior editor on the staff of Business Week. He also had been chief consultant on labor books published by McGraw-Hill.

The publishing company, which also prints Business Week, said in a one-sentence statement: "Merlyn S. Pitzele has today resigned from the staff of Business Week and has severed all connections with the McGraw-Hill Publishing Co. Inc."

When the announcement was made Pitzele was in Austin, Tex., presiding at a seminar for business executives on industrial relations.

In testimony Friday before the Senate committee, Pitzele said he accepted the retainers from the Teamsters in the belief that its president, Dave Beck, intended to clean up the 1,400,000-member union.

The money was paid through the Chicago labor relations firm headed by Nathan W. Shefferman, whose activities also are being probed by the committee.

## Oregon Herford Steer Chosen Grand Champion

SAN FRANCISCO — A 1,050-pound summer yearling Herford from the Double M Herford ranch near Adams, Ore., is the champion steer of the Grand National Livestock show.

The award Monday went to M. M. Royak Larry 127, owned by Mrs. Faye Mann and Pat and Bob Hopper of the Double M.

The steer will be kept on display at the Cow Palace until Friday, when it will be sold at auction.

## Last Missionary To Leave China Will Speak Here

Sara E. Perkins, R.N., the last Protestant missionary to leave Red China, will speak at the First Presbyterian Church in Roseburg Wednesday at 7:30 p.m.

Miss Perkins returned from China in the fall of 1955. She had been held in a Communist prison camp for four and a half years.

A veteran of more than 30 years of missionary work in China, she also spent time in a Japanese internment camp during World War II. She was repatriated in 1943 but returned in 1946 to continue her work in China.

Miss Perkins first journeyed to China in the early 1920's.

She taught music and underwent training for medical missionary work, then returned to the United States for a brief stay. She went back to China in 1926 as a missionary of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.

Now a resident of Charleston, S.C., Miss Perkins has spoken in many parts of the nation since her return from China.

The talk is open to the public.

## World's Largest Battlewagon Ends Final Cruise

NEW YORK — The U. S. S. Wisconsin, the world's largest battlewagon and America's last battleship in operation, swept proudly into harbor Tuesday. The cruise from Norfolk, Va., may have been its last.

The mighty fighting ship will join its sister ships in the mothball fleet Friday at Bayonne, N.J. It may be the end of an era. Some say battlewagons have been made obsolete by the arrival of the hydrogen bomb and guided missile age.

As she sailed in, her nine 16-inch guns outlined against the morning haze, she was greeted by the city's fireboats, Coast Guard vessels and harbor craft.

A destroyer escort led her up the Hudson River to Pier 86 at 46th St., where she will rest until Friday.

## Navy Band Plays

A U.S. Navy band and a Marine honor guard were at the pier as a fleet of tugboats nudged the 45,000-ton vessel, 887 feet long, into her berth.

Capt. John O. Miner, commander of the battleship, was on the bridge while Rear Adm. Lewis S. Parks, commander of battleships and cruisers of the Atlantic Fleet, stood stiffly at attention. The Navy band broke into "On Wisconsin" and "Anchors Away" as the ship drew into the pier.

The big battlewagon fought in World War II and the Korean War. She was built at a cost of 110 million dollars and commissioned April 16, 1944. It has cost seven million dollars a year to keep her operating in peacetime — another reason, perhaps, why she's being mothballed.

Her retirement from active duty will mark the first time in 60 years that America's Navy will be without a battleship in the operating fleet. At the height of World War II there were 24 in service.

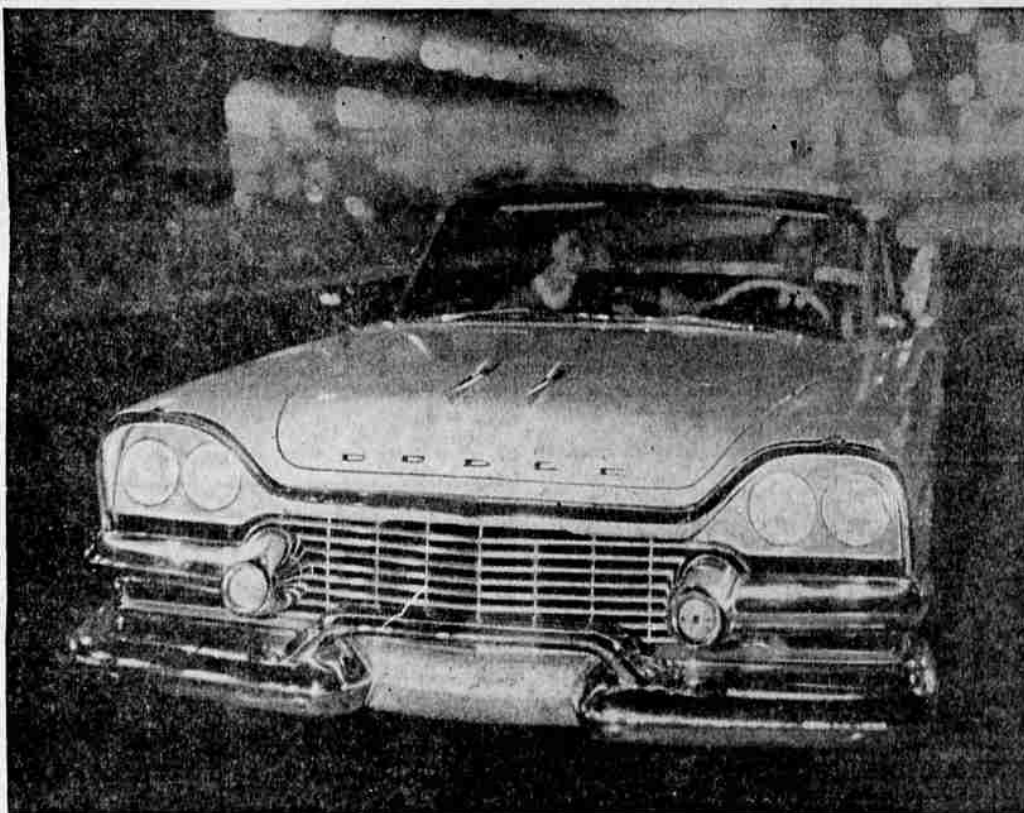
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
