HONOLULU — Industrialist Henry J. Kaiser, showman Mike Todd and Pat Weaver got together in Hawaii and erupted Tuesday with plans to eridge the globe with aluminum dome theater auditoriums.

Kaiser built such a structure seating 2,000 in 20 working hours at a claimed cost of \$4 a square foot.

"These aluminum domes have amazing showmanship and entertainment possibilities," said Todd. Ex-Wisconsin Speaker Suspended From Practice

MADISON, Wis. — The Wisconsin Supreme Court Tuesday suspended Mark Catlin Jr., former speaker of the state Assembly, from the practice of law for six months for unethical conduct as an attorney.

The high court, acting on a complaint filed by the Board of State Bar Commissioners, also ordered the Appleton attorney to pay the \$1,700 costs of the proceedings against him.

Catlin, prominent Republican legislator who once aspired to the post of U.S. senator, was accused of offering to use his personal and political influence to gain clemency for inmates of the Wisconsin State Prison.
