## Russian Claims Rocket To Moon Still In Future

DES MOINES (AP)—Nikolai Kuznetsov, editor of the Soviet newspaper agency, Tass, told a Des Moines newsman Tuesday that Russia has not yet sent a rocket to the moon, but the flight "is something for the future."

Ray Carnay, news editor of Radio Station KIOA, said he talked to Kuznetsov in Moscow in a telephone interview in which the Russian editor shed some light on Sputnik II's travel through space with a dog as its passenger. Carnay reported the conversation, reported through an interpreter, as follows:

Kuznetsov said, "newest observations were made which characterize hygienic conditions in a hermetically-sealed basket, and also the basic functions of the animal."

He said these findings "will for the first time throw light on the problem of life (living action) in the conditions of the cosmos."

The Russian editor told Carnay that "at the present time, there has already been a check and studied the first data received during the past 24 hours." He said this data comes from the registration of blood pressure, pulse, breathing and other physiological findings.

Asked whether Russia already had sent a rocket to the moon, Kuznetsov told Carnay: "A flight to the moon is something for the future."

Carnay said the Tass editor refused to discuss whether the Russians had developed a super fuel.

## Canadian Claims Economy Hurt Severely By Recent U. S. Wheat Disposal Policy

SEATTLE (AP)—Canada's economy has been hurt severely by recent U. S. policies for disposing surplus wheat, Robert G. C. Smith, Canadian commercial minister in Washington, D. C., said here Tuesday.

"And to Canadians that doesn't make sense," said Smith, pointing out that Canada and the U. S. were "each other's best customers."

He explained that so-called "local currency" sales by the U. S. have effectively pushed Canada out of areas where they formerly sold wheat. The U. S., in an attempt to reduce her own wheat surplus, sells wheat to a foreign country, he said. The country pays in its own currency, which is immediately returned to it in the form of a "loan."

**Canada Can't Compete** "We can't compete with that kind of deal; we just don't have the money," said Smith. He said Canada still has a wheat economy and anything that hurts her wheat sales "strikes at the backbone of our economy."

### State Strengthening Case Against Mrs. Fong

PORTLAND (AP)—The state sought Tuesday to strengthen its charge that Sherry Fong killed her baby sister, Diane Hank, 16, with poison.

Monday, Dr. Joseph Beeman, Boise pathologist, testified the Hank girl's death resulted from a combination of alcohol and barbiturate poisoning.

Earlier, the jury heard read into the record testimony the late Police Capt. William D. Browne had given at previous trials of Mrs. Fong.

Browne's statement said Mrs. Fong on May 4, 1954, "seemed on the verge of telling us exactly how Diane Hank met her death, but then she wanted to see an attorney."

The Hank girl disappeared early in 1954. Several weeks later her body was found near Washougal, Wash.

Addressing the Chamber of Commerce and the World Trade Club here, Smith conceded that U. S. wheat surplus is bigger than Canada's.

"But, compared with your domestic consumption, your wheat surplus is less important than ours," the economist said. "Canada's wheat surplus is of staggering proportions."

Smith also commented on his country's unfavorable trade balance with the U. S. and said it amounted to 1 1/4 billion dollars annually.

"We would have been broke except for your capital investment in Canada," Smith said. He added that Canada recognizes her need of American capital investment to make up this deficit.

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## Reclamationists Work Out Story On True Picture Of Irrigation In West

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Directors of the National Reclamation Assn. worked Tuesday on a new program to tell the nation what they say is the true story of irrigation in the West.

A new permanent "Advisory Committee on Water Resources Development" was established to formulate an educational program and arrange for preparation of articles and other materials taking a positive approach to the value of irrigation.

This procedure was decided upon after earlier appointment of a special committee of directors to make recommendations on procedure to be followed in answering a recent published attack on federal reclamation.

**Leads To Appointments** An article entitled "The Case Against Federal Reclamation," published in the September issue of "Nation's Business," led to appointment of the special committee. Nation's Business is a publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Later, after consideration of another article published some weeks ago by the Wall Street Journal, the directors decided to plan a positive campaign instead of refuting critical articles.

Some directors said both critical articles were not based on complete facts and did not present an accurate picture of the value of irrigation to the West and to the whole nation.

Harold H. Christy, Pueblo, Colo., was made chairman of the permanent committee, as he had been of the special group. Continuing to serve with him will be: C. Petrus Peterson, Lincoln, Neb.; D. P. Fabrick, Choteau, Mont.; Lorin Markham, Spokane, Wash.; and J. W. Jarvis, Omaha, Neb.

**Convention Sunday** The board and resolutions committee, both of which started work Sunday in preparation for the NRA's 26th annual convention

opening here Wednesday, put aside work for most of Tuesday to join early arriving delegates for a tour of irrigated farms and other points of interest in the Phoenix area.

Vice President La Salle E. Coles, Primeville, Ore., reported a high advance enrollment of delegates and forecast "a very successful convention."

"It will be a convention, I believe, which of itself will help provide educational material to tell the West's reclamation story to the remainder of the nation," Coles told a newsman.

Coles is presiding at board meetings in the absence of President Guy C. Jackson Jr., Anaheim, Texas. Jackson has been detained because of the critical illness of a brother and there was doubt he would get to the convention.

## Romanian Premier In Plane Crash

MOSCOW (AP)—An airplane carrying Romanian Premier Chivu Stoica crashed in bad weather at Moscow Airport Tuesday.

An informed source said Stoica was not killed. Whether the other passengers escaped was not clear immediately.

The plane was carrying the Romanian delegation to the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution.

Moscow's Vnukova Airport has been wrapped in a thick, clinging fog for two days. This has seriously interfered with air travel, unusually heavy just before the Nov. 7 holiday celebrations.

Numerous foreign delegations were scheduled to fly into Moscow Monday and Tuesday. Many planes have been delayed or diverted.

The Romanian delegation left Bucharest for Moscow Monday.
