

Bantamweight Boxing Title At Stake In Clash Tonight

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The international squabble over the bantamweight championship of the world should be settled Wednesday night when Alphonse Halimi of France and Raul (Raton) Macias of Mexico climb into the ring at Wrigley Field to fight 15 rounds or less.

Most boxing people think it will be less as these two hard punching 118-pounders, Macias the stylish and Halimi a man with a small bomb in each glove, square off to end a dispute that has existed for almost four years in the division.

The bout is set for 7 p.m. and will be televised throughout the nation.

Macias rates as a 10-8 betting favorite to gain a clear claim to the title. He laid claim and recognition from the U.S. National Boxing Assn. by knocking out Cham-berlain Songkhrat of Thailand in San Francisco March 9, 1955, in 11 rounds.

Halimi, the only time he traveled 15 rounds, outpointed Mario d'Agata of Italy in Paris April 1 of this year to win recognition by the World Boxing Championship Committee.

The fighters are in for the biggest payday of their lives and the richest purses of the bantamweight division.

Halimi gets a \$50,000 flat guarantee. Macias is guaranteed \$30,000 or a percentage of the gate on a sliding scale.

Macias, 23, already wealthy as a rancher, business man and movie actor in Mexico, has agreed to give the 25-year-old native of Algiers a return fight within 90 days in Paris if he wins.

Each fighter has lost but one professional fight — Halimi by a cut eye in London last June to Jimmy Carson, featherweight champion of Scotland, and Macias by knockout to Billy Peacock here in June, 1955.

Since the Peacock disaster Macias has won 14 straight for a total of 31 wins. Halimi has won 20. Macias has knocked out 19 foes, Halimi 12.

Macias is 5 feet 4½ tall, Halimi

5-3, while the Frenchman has a longer reach, 66 inches to 54½, and has the sturdier build.

Archie Moore Continues Winning Pace On Tour

SEATTLE (AP) — Ageless Archie Moore, the king of the light heavyweights, chalked up another victim on his barnstorming tour Tuesday night with a unanimous decision over localite Eddie Cotton.

Moore, weighing in at a bulbous 192, had Cotton on the deck three times, once in the fourth and twice in the fifth round. Cotton came in at 177½.

Cotton, a local favorite who has been fighting on the fringes of the big time for five years or so, was an easy target for the easy champion during the early going but had the best of it during the late rounds.

As Moore tired, Cotton launched a two-fisted attack in the seventh, eighth and ninth rounds, scoring with both hands. Moore caught Cotton with a hard right to the jaw early in the 10th and was in command the rest of the way.

Scientist Left Suicide Note Before Death

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — A territorial police officer said Tuesday that Richard C. Hubley, 31-year-old Tacoma glaciologist, left a suicide note before he walked out to meet death on an Alaska glacier eight days ago.

Relatives and friends of Hubley had expressed doubt in Tacoma Monday he took his own life. They theorized he either was ill or walking in his sleep when he left a research camp on the glacier Oct. 28.

Lt. William Trafton of the territorial police, who checked on Hubley's death, said "investigation at the glacier disclosed that there was a note left by Dr. Hubley."

"The note indicated that he was taking his own life and that none of the other associates at the glacier were aware of this or had any part in this action."

"The note was found there by Robert Mason, one of the men in the research party. Early the morning of Oct. 29, Mason awoke to find that Dr. Hubley was out of his bunk. He immediately radioed for help."

U. S. Commissioner LaDessa Nordale has scheduled an inquest, but it will not be held for about 10 days when laboratory reports will be available on a post mortem examination of Hubley.

Trafton said contents of the suicide note will be made public at the inquest.

Unemployment Higher In Klamath County

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — Unemployment is 37 per cent higher in Klamath County than a year ago, and it will become worse in the next 90 days, Guy Barker, manager of the state employment office here, said Tuesday.

Lumber employment dropped slightly in October, but held up better than in most timber-producing areas, he said. He said unemployment was running high because of a great number of new workers in the county.

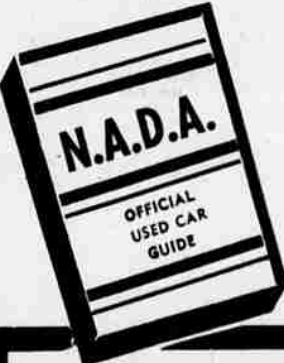
NEW PRESIDENT

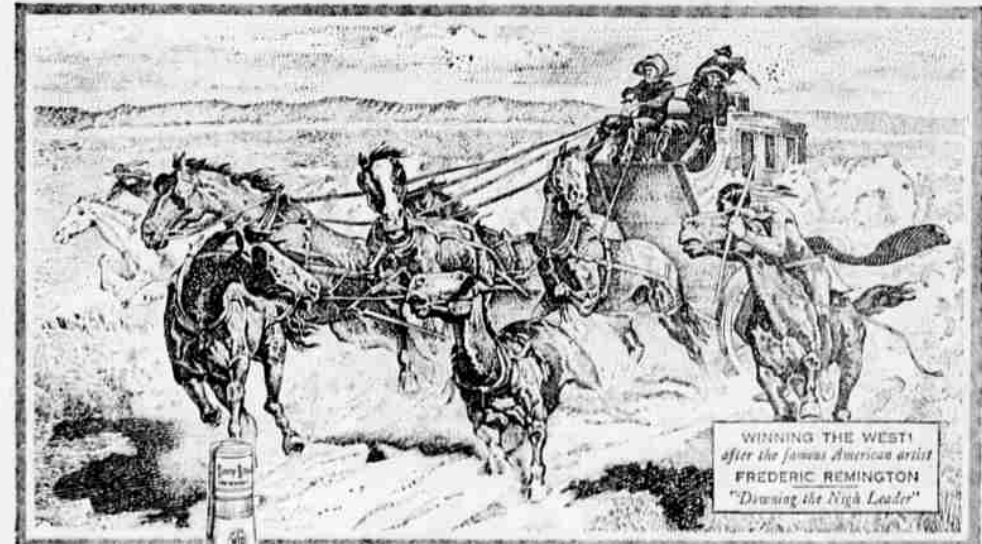
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
