

Sec. Dulles Holds Extra-Ordinary Meet Wednesday

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles held an extra-ordinary meeting Wednesday with a half dozen men who were officials and foreign policy experts in the Truman administration. The purpose was to discuss plan and seek ideas for U.S. proposal to the North Atlantic summit meeting in Paris in December.

One of the group was Paul I. Nitze, who served as chief of policy planning staff under Secretary of State Dean Acheson. Nit is now associated with the Foreign Service Education Foundation.

Officials Listed
Other officials included: Frank Pace, budget director under President Truman and later Army Secretary (1950-53). Pace is now with General Dynamics Corp.

William H. Draper Jr., under secretary of the Army in the Truman administration and special U.S. representative in Europe in 1953.

President Eisenhower will head the American delegation to the Paris meeting. The major aim there will be to promote greater allied unity in the face of Soviet weapons advances which have narrowed the West's margin of security.

In addition to the group of ex-officials of the Truman administration, those meeting with Dulles includes Harold Stassen, President Eisenhower's chief disarmament adviser and negotiator, and John C. Hughes of the Chemical Bank & Trust Co., New York.

Hughes was a special ambassador in Europe in the first year of the Eisenhower administration.

Oregonians Get First Initial Look At Soviet Mutnik

Oregonians got their first look at Sputnik II Wednesday morning.

Reporters and photographers went aloft in an airplane over Portland and watched Russia's second satellite for a two-minute period, beginning at 5:31 a.m.

The satellite also was sighted from the ground at Portland and Corvallis.

Occupants of the plane said they were flying at 24,000 feet when the satellite appeared in the southeast sky. In the two minutes the satellite was in sight, the pilot estimated the plane covered six miles, the satellite 600.

The satellite arched into the northeast sky, fading twice, then reappearing before it finally disappeared.

A moonwatch team at Portland saw Sputnik II briefly in the eastern sky at 5:32.

At Corvallis, Frank Naylor, an amateur astronomer, sighted the satellite low in the eastern sky at 5:31, traveling in a northerly direction. He observed it for about a minute through binoculars but said it also was plainly visible to the naked eye.

Observers said the satellite was bright, although not so brilliant as the morning star.

The satellite will be visible in Western Oregon again Thursday and Friday if clouds do not obscure the view. Clifford Moulton, Portland electronics engineer, said.

Yoncallans Asked To Burns Rubbish During Winter
Yoncalla residents were asked by Norman Stapleman, road commissioner, to reduce summer fire danger by burning papers and rubbish during the winter months.

Stapleman made the request during a regular session of the Yoncalla City Council Tuesday night.

The council granted a license to Mrs. Marge Schiemann, proprietor of the Loggers Tavern, for remodeling of the tavern. Mrs. Schiemann plans to add a family dining room to the building.

A class B dispenser liquor license was granted Joe Edmundson, proprietor of the Congusto Cafe, and a class A package license to Cliff Bice.

John Weber asked the council to clear up a surplus water problem on his property, claiming that water from West Park addition is flooding his land. The matter was turned over to Stapleman.

The council warned Henry Byron that a corner lot at Main St. and the highway must be cleared at once or legal action will be taken.

Alaskan Road Confab Concluded In Seattle
SEATTLE — The Alaska International Rail and Highway Commission, created to study the need for new rail and road links between the United States and Alaska, ended a two-day meeting Wednesday night.

One of the last persons to appear before the committee, former Gov. B. Frank Heintzleman of Alaska, said consideration of a U.S.-Alaska highway through the Coast Range should not have priority over improvement of the Alcan Highway.

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.), vice chairman of the commission, urged that the 1,500-mile Alcan Highway be hard-topped. Heintzleman also urged that a 160-mile road connecting the Alcan Highway with Haines, Alaska, be surfaced quickly.

State of Oregon, represented and acting by H. C. Safford, director of veterans' affairs vs. Eugene Oliver Clarkson, Johnnie Lou Clarkson, U.S.A. and Oregon State Tax Commission. Plaintiff asks for judgment of \$3,660.46 on allegedly unpaid promissory note from Sept. 15, 1953, that plaintiffs mortgage be deemed paramount lien on property of defendants and that mortgage be foreclosed.

Amphibious Jeep Adventurer Near End Of Long Trip

SEATTLE — An adventurer who sailed an amphibious jeep across the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans arrived here Wednesday with the hardest stretches of his round-the-world land-sea trip behind him.

Australian-born Ben Carlin, 51, was alone in the jeep, the "Half Safe," as he pulled in from Alaska. Boyde De Mente, Phoenix, Ariz., last of a series of partners who had accompanied Carlin at various stages of the trip, was forced to leave him in the Far North because of illness in his family.

Carlin said he planned to drive to San Francisco, then swing back northeast to Montreal, where he started seven years ago.

Started Out In 1948
Carlin recalled that he actually started his adventure with his wife in 1948 when they set out from Montreal to try to sail to Casablanca. After five attempts, they finally made it in 1950.

In the intervening years, Carlin slowly made his way around the world and popped up in the news again early this year in Japan. De Mente was his new partner, and together they sailed the "Half Safe" across the North Pacific from Japan to Alaska and overland from Alaska to the states.

Carlin said he is glad the long trip is about over. Asked if he would consider sailing in the jeep from here to San Francisco, the Australian said:

"Now why do you think I'd travel on that pitchin' sea when I've got tires on this thing that'll carry me the miles an hour on good dry land?"

Senator Urges Crash Program For Missiles
RENO, Nev. — Sen. Frank E. Church (D-Idaho), demanding "an end to the missile muddle," urged the administration today to press for a new Manhattan Project.

Manhattan Project was the code name for the World War II research that led to American development of the first atomic bomb, exploded at Hiroshima in 1945.

The 33-year-old senator, in a keynote speech opening the 10th biennial convention of the Young Democrats of America, warned that American failure to keep pace in the "fateful feud" with Russia "is to invite an attack upon us."

Church, a former young Democratic state president, accused the Eisenhower administration of complacency and of "spreading a barrage of bland hallelujah which has tranquilized our country for five long years."

His prepared speech emphasized it was under the Democratic administrations of President Roosevelt and Truman that the United States perfected the new atomic weapon.

Senate Bill To Lift Property Qualifications
SALEM — Legislation to remove the property qualifications for voters in fire protection districts was passed by the Senate Tuesday and sent to the House.

Sen. Donald R. Husband (R), Eugene, said the bill's purpose is to legalize fire districts created since 1939, as well as their bond issues and tax levies.

The Supreme Court, in ruling that no district can require that a voter own property, cast a cloud over the legality of fire districts created since 1939.

Husband said there are about 180 fire districts in the state.

Musa Denies He Wants To Abolish School Aid

SALEM — Sen. Ben Musa (D), The Dalles, said Wednesday he doesn't want to abolish basic school aid.

The senator offered a motion in the Senate Taxation Committee to end basic school aid to local districts at the end of the biennium 20 months from now.

His purpose, he said, was to end the system whereby school aid is a continuing appropriation. He said he wants each legislature to take a fresh look at the problem.

He said his remarks were misconstrued to mean that he doesn't believe in basic school aid.

Witness Says Diane Threatened Suicide

PORTLAND — Diane Hank once said she would kill herself if a boy stood her up again, a one-time cleaning woman testified in the second degree murder trial of Sherry Fong Wednesday.

Diane, a 16-year-old high school girl, made the comment before she vanished early in 1954. Mrs. Ethel Snell of Portland said.

Mrs. Snell was one of the first witnesses called by the defense in the trial of the 26-year-old Portland woman.

An earlier witness, Dr. William Lehman, said that on the basis of an autopsy report, he could not determine that Diane died of barbiturate poisoning.

That was the cause of death given by a physician who was called as a prosecution witness.

The Hank girl, an occasional babysitter for the Fongs, disappeared after spending a night at their home. Her body was found about a month later in a ditch near Washougal, Wash.

BPA To Supply Aluminum Plant

THE DALLES — The Bonneville Administration will start supplying power Friday to the 65-million dollar Harvey Machine Co. aluminum plant near here.

A seven-mile, 115,000-volt transmission line from Bonneville's Big Eddy substation, east of The Dalles, will go into service at that time to carry power to the plant, principally from McNary Dam.

A second line, via the Chenoweth substation, northwest of here, will go into service later as a supplemental power source for the plant, BPA said.

Bonneville will deliver 40,000 kilowatts of firm power to Harvey, plus up to 80,000 kilowatts of interruptible power when it is available.

Harvey plans to have its two power lines in full operation early next year. The plant will employ 500.

The company has paid the cost of power transmission facilities. They will be turned over to BPA.

Methodist Men Slate Turkey Dinner Soon

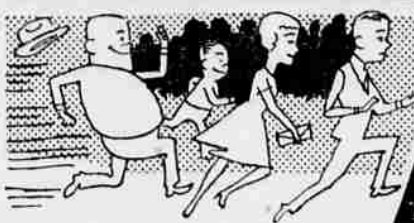
A Thanksgiving festival turkey dinner will be served Nov. 19 in the new social hall of the First Methodist Church on SE Main.
