

Catholic Church Clamps Down On Dating, Kissing

SANTA FE, N. M. — A series of directives forbidding steady dating, petting, necking and kissing have been issued for Catholic teenagers in the archdiocese of Santa Fe.

The directives were issued by Very Rev. O. A. Coggiola, archdiocesan chancellor, to priests and principals of Catholic schools of the archdiocese.

In a talk at Albuquerque Oct. 12, Archbishop Edwin V. Byrne announced that such directives were planned.

Excerpts from the directives: "Going steady" is a normal approximate preparation for engagement and eventual marriage. One in the teens and still in school is not usually prepared to enter the holy marriage state within a reasonably short time. Steady dating normally interferes seriously with a young person's success as a student. "Going steady" constitutes a definite moral danger. Hours regularly spent alone in the company of the same person can be and frequently are an occasion of sin for immature young people.

"Students must refrain from necking and petting, and even at times kissing, since doing so is sinful and usurps the prerogatives reserved for the state of holy matrimony which they are not yet prepared to enter. "Dances held under school auspices for elementary school children are forbidden. "Dances shall not last beyond midnight, excepting proms. Proper dress, in keeping with Christian modesty, shall be required of all who attend dances."

Firm Held Liable For SIAC Payment

An admittedly fraudulent accident claim filed with the State Industrial Accident Commission resulted in Roseburg Lumber Co. owner Kenneth Ford and some of his top brass being hauled into a commission hearing in Roseburg Thursday.

At the conclusion of the hearing conducted by R. G. Savage, assistant commissioner, the firm agreed to repay the commission \$261.36 which had been paid to a 16-year-old boy hurt while working on Ford's farm at Dixonville. In addition, Roseburg Lumber Co. is to pay the boy's \$45 doctor bill.

It was brought out in the hearing that the boy, David N. Argo, suffered a smashed finger while working on a hayrack on Ford's farm. A claim signed by Argo and E. H. Card, Roseburg Lumber executive, alleged the boy was hurt while working in the firm's plywood plant.

The claim stated Argo was earning \$15.84 per day which was used as the basis for his compensation. Argo told Savage he was earning \$1 an hour for the farm work.

It was brought out that neither Ford nor his company was covered for farm work insurance. This will be changed, Ford informed Savage and R. H. Lafty, assistant attorney general.

Testifying at the hearing were Argo, Curtis Charon, a boy who had been working with Argo; Card; Earl C. Plummer, company secretary, and Lynn Beckley, manager of Ford's farm.

Idaho Power Co. Allowed To Sell Finance Bonds

WASHINGTON — The Idaho Power Co. received approval from the Federal Reserve Commission Thursday to issue 15 million dollars in bonds and sell 225,000 shares of stock to finance construction of the Brownlee Dam on the Snake River, which already is about 50 per cent complete.

In approving the company's financing plans, the FPC rejected a request by Sens. Magnuson (D-Wash.) and Murray (D-Mont.) that the commission withhold its approval of the financing plans until Idaho Power could show Brownlee is economically sound.

Engine Trouble Delays Flights To South Pole

MCMURDO SOUND, Antarctica — More engine trouble delayed Navy flights to the South Pole Friday.

Lt. Robert Bolling, Fort Crook, Neb., made a hazardous forced landing on the ice airfield here after his Navy Neptune patrol bomber developed engine trouble a few minutes after takeoff. The right engine was burning and the left engine out of control.

Two of Bolling's 12 passengers were on a Navy DC-3 that lost the use of one engine halfway to the Pole Thursday. It made an emergency landing at Liv, a three-man station on Beardmore Glacier.

The two, Palle Mogensen, Alexander, Va., and Kirby J. Hanson, Washington, D. C., were flown back here to make another try for the Pole. Mogensen is to replace Dr. Paul Siple as scientific director of the U.S. South Pole Station.

Another Neptune stalled at the Pole Oct. 26, stranding 10 men there. So far bad weather and engine failures have prevented sending spare parts to repair the plane.

Water Mains Flood New York Streets

NEW YORK — Bustling Manhattan, one of the busiest places on earth, was thrown into a snarl of confusion Thursday night and Friday by a flood — from broken water mains.

The huge conduits snapped at five different places. Subways were shut down, forcing thousands of persons to seek other means of transit. Midtown basements were flooded, causing some buildings to turn off heating equipment. Water supplies of others were disrupted.

Torrents of water bursting upward from broken mains gushed down streets, ripping up pavement and cascading into subway tunnels.

At one point late Thursday night the famous Metropolitan Opera House was marooned on an island created by streets full of water all around it. Formally attired patrons leaving after a performance of "Faust" halted at opera exits in perplexity.

The opera management brought scenery trucks into use to transport patrons, artists, orchestra members and others to dry land. At nearby Times Square, theater crowds gathered on the fringes of the flood. Police had to divert much manpower to the task of keeping them clear of danger.

East said Oregon's Fair Trade Act is unconstitutional when applied to firms which have not signed pricing contracts.

Faint Object Seen Flying Ahead Of Sputnik II Friday

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — A Smithsonian scientist reported sighting a faint object about 10 or 15 seconds ahead of Sputnik II Friday morning.

Dr. John S. Rinehart, assistant director of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, said he saw moving in advance of the much more brilliant satellite-rocket.

Dr. Rinehart said he saw both objects low in the Western sky disappearing to the north.

Sputnik II was sighted by a moonwatch team on the roof of the Harvard Observatory as well as by other viewers in the East. It appeared low in the west due to its distance from the Eastern seaboard.

Question Posed No speculation was immediately available on the question—whether a mechanism set to return a chamber carrying the dog, Laika, back to earth might have gone wrong.

Such a mechanism might have been designed to eject the dog's chamber in a direction opposite to satellite's flight and thus slow it down for a return to earth. On the other hand, if tumbling motion of the rocket caused such a portion of the rocket to be thrust forward, it would become a satellite itself—traveling even faster than Sputnik II.

It was estimated here that the faint object sighted ahead of Sputnik II might be 50 or 75 miles ahead of the rocket satellite, on the basis of translation of the distance in seconds into miles.

Thursday, speculation included the possibility the rocket might be breaking apart but scientists described this probably was not so.

Tornadoes Deal Death, Damage; Many Injured

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said the winds of Hurricane Audrey "were nothing like the ones that moved through here last night. The trees in my front yard were flattened out."

Audrey raked the Louisiana coast June 27, leaving more than 531 dead and missing and damage in the millions.

Fires flared briefly after gas lines were snapped at Groves, but firemen quickly controlled the flames. Smoking and use of candles were forbidden.

The National Guard armory in Orange literally was blown apart. Nine of 130 mothballed Navy ships at Orange were whipped from their moorings. Three were blown across the Sabine River and three others, all large landing craft, were swept to midstream. Navy personnel escaped injury.

In Texas, destructive tornadoes struck Orange, a city of about 30,000 in the east Gulf area, killing two men and a woman and injuring more than 80 persons. Police said 100 to 125 homes were damaged or demolished.

In Louisiana, the most damaging tornado hammered Alexandria, a city of more than 40,000 in the central part of the state. Thirty persons were injured and heavy damage was reported.

Wilhelms, the only Republican on the conference committee, favors a 30 per cent cut. The other three want the 15 per cent compromise offer.

Reuther Wants U. S. To Revise Foreign Policy

SAN FRANCISCO — Walter Reuther urges a revision of United States foreign policy to provide what he called greater moral "leadership" in the H-bomb age.

The United Auto Workers Union leader spoke Thursday at the sixth National Conference on UNESCO, the largest conference on Asia ever held in this country.

Some 1,500 delegates split today into panels to discuss aspects of the theme — "Asia and the United States: What the American Citizen Can Do to Promote Mutual Understanding and Cooperation."

Another speaker, Stanley C. Allyn, criticized the economic techniques of Americans. Allyn is chairman of the conference committee.

Reuther urged a foreign policy revision "to provide greater leadership in the world." He said that "particularly we must provide greater moral leadership, for the crisis under the shadow of the H-bomb is essentially moral."

"You can't win the struggle for the hearts and minds of mankind with a bigger H-bomb," he said.
