

29 Teams, 150 Bowlers To Round Out Final Week Of Timber Tourney

The third and final weekend of the third annual Capital Bowling Tournament will get under way Saturday at 7 p.m. as the final 29 teams go into action. This will bring the total number of teams that have participated in the tourney to 68.

Along with the 29 teams will come an estimated 150 bowlers to also compete in the doubles and singles events. This will bring the total number of bowlers that have competed in the tourney to almost 400.

Of the 29 teams entered in this

weekend's activities, 18 will be men's teams and 11 will be women's. Medford will have the largest number of teams entered during the weekend with six. Roseburg will have five teams entered.

Roseburg, Coos Bay, Medford, Salem and Albany each will have three teams entered in the men's events, with Cottage Grove, Brookings and Grants Pass each having one. From Roseburg it will be Barcus Dodge, Hamer Corp. and Todd Building Co. Teams from Coos Bay will be Mohican Hyster Co., Sargent and Sons and ONC

Fast Freight.

Medford will have Lanport Sporting Goods, Morning Fresh Bread and Tru-mix. From Salem it will be U-Bowl, Cherry City Bowl and bring Eagles Lodge, Hartsock and Thorp and the Albany Lanes.

Thrifty Station from Cottage Grove, Hammer's Sporting Goods from Grants Pass and B & G Produce from Brookings will round out the men's teams.

Medford and Cottage Grove each will bring three women's teams to the tourney, while Roseburg with two and Brookings, Albany and

Coos Bay with one round out the rest.

General Petroleum, Hammond Piling and Cottage Bowl are the three teams from Cottage Grove in the women's teams. Crater Inn Motel, Wooden Shoe and the Union Club will be the three entries from Medford. From Roseburg it will be General Service Center and Roseburg Bow.

Single entries will be Azalea Lanes from Brookings, Hartsock and Thorp from Albany and Embaco Bowl from Coos Bay.

Individual bowlers will also be

out to take over the leads in each of the three separate divisions of the men's and women's events.

After the first two weeks of bowling, Fritz's Coffee House of Coos Bay is the leader in the men's team events with 2,851. Next in line is Marshall Lounge of Salem with 2,937. In the ladies teams, A & B Logging of Roseburg holds down first place with 2,700. Close behind is the Winston Five with 2,697.

Topping the men's doubles are Art Guthrie and Gordon Olsen of Brookings with 1,286. Buzz Green and Jim Knopp of Medford hold down the next spot with 1,282. For the women it is Doris Siders and Flo Ann McDonald of Roseburg in first place with 1,182, followed by Betty Guthrie and Ann Price of Brookings with 1,131.

Heading the list of singles competitors for the men is Bob Shroyer of Roseburg with a huge 717. He is followed by Dick Nichols of Roseburg with 706. Leading the women is Jean Malcolm of Brookings with a 624 followed by Jewell Pritt of Roseburg with a 596.

In the all-events it is Frank Doyle of Salem in first place, for the men with 1,904. He is followed by Shroyer with 1,895. Jean Malcolm leads the women's all-events with 1,752 followed by Betty Guthrie of Brookings with 1,710.

Most of the teams will bowl on Saturday night, with the singles and doubles slated to take up most of Sunday's time.

Eaton Ready To Try Again For Marathon Kegling Mark

"I'd sure like to try it again" was the answer that Bus Eaton, Roseburg's marathon bowler answered this week after learning his three-week-old record of 280 straight games had been broken by Tom Baird Jr. of Middletown, Ohio.

Eaton had earlier broke a 26-year-old record of Paul Garfield of St. Louis of 261 games. Eaton completed his games in the time of 48 hours and 15 minutes, while Garfield of St. Louis of 261 games, set by Baird took 65 hours. This means that Eaton completed only six less games in 17 less hours, without a rest stop. Baird in his record stint took a "coffee break" during his record, but drank his in between balls.

Marathon Exhibition?

Baird's record might fall under the heading of an exhibition marathon. In 1942 in Los Angeles, a Frank Stiller rolled a total of 325 games in only 56 hours, but he also rested in several spots. Several others have rolled as high as 275 games in only 66 hours, but they took a 15 minute break every four hours. Even this falls under the heading of either an exhibition marathon or one with no regular rest periods.

Eaton has stated that he would like to bowl for a new record some time in the near future, if not on the Roseburg alley then in some other city. Roseburg mayor and owner of the Roseburg alleys, Arlo Jackson, has told Eaton that he feels he can not stand the expense of another stint right now, but might be able to in the future.

"I don't think it was quite fair to let him have a rest" was Eaton's statement on the rest periods of Baird's, "but nevertheless I'm glad the interest is still there."

Eaton Average Higher

During his 280 games Eaton bowled an average game of 168 compared to the 141 average of Baird's, all this and without a break.

The first thought of Eaton's during his marathon was the hope of finding himself a job in the off season. He is a truck driver during the summer and fall months, with his own truck. Failing to find a job in the Roseburg area Eaton traveled to California to join the Merchant Marines, but also failed in his try there. He then returned to Roseburg, where he now is employed by the city.

So anxious is Eaton to start again that if he doesn't find an alley in the Roseburg area he may travel to Portland in an effort to set a new mark.

Influenza Cuts Grid Schedule

Oregon Could Claim Rose Bid Saturday

Coach Len Casanova's Oregon Webfoots can wrap up the Pacific Coast Conference Rose Bowl bid Saturday in Portland with a victory over the University of Washington Huskies.

A triumph would give Oregon a 6-0 record and in the PCC and a two-game lead with only two games left—against Southern California and Oregon State. Even if Oregon lost those last two, which is doubtful, the Ducks would get the Pasadena bid.

Washington State and Stanford, already losers of two games, have each been defeated by the Webfoots. They are the only other two teams in the running.

Washington State plays host to UCLA Saturday while Stanford meets USC in Los Angeles. California seeks an upset at Berkeley against the Oregon State Beavers in the other PCC game. Idaho goes out of the loop again to play Utah State at Logan.

Idaho On Way Out?

LOS ANGELES, AP — A Los Angeles sports editor says there are rumblings Idaho may be dropped from the Pacific Coast Conference as part of a move to avert a mutiny by penalized conference members.

Paul Zimmerman of the Times wrote Friday that his information indicates the conference may talk about such action at a meeting of member school presidents in San Francisco next Sunday.
