Gov. Williams Not Convinced Ike's On 'Level'

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Gov. G. Mennen Williams said Wednesday he was not entirely convinced the Eisenhower administration is "leveling with the people" on the seriousness of Russian scientific advances.

Williams, four-time governor of Michigan and mentioned frequently as a possible Democratic candidate for president in 1960, called a meeting of state department heads to discuss possible steps of civil defense in the state.

He told the conferees: "I am not entirely convinced our top leadership has levelled with the people as to what the gravity of the situation really is. I would like to urge the national administration to take the people completely into confidence."

"If we have a grave situation, as I personally suspect we have, the American people would welcome the opportunity to know all the facts that can be revealed safely."

Williams said the Soviet Union has proved it has "an awesome military capacity" and "never has denounced its fundamental proposition of world domination."

Dumont Lumber Timber Buyer

Dumont Lumber Co. of Glide paid almost \$2,000 above the appraised price to win an Umpqua National Forest timber tract from four other bidders at a sale in the Roseburg supervisor's office Tuesday.

Dumont paid \$17,630 for 620,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$15,707.50. The tract is located on 14 acres 45 miles northeast of Roseburg.

Other bidders were Sabola Logging Co. of Winchester, Lumber Sales Co. Inc. of Roseburg, L and H Lumber Co. of Sutherlin and R. J. Standley Logging of Glide. The next Umpqua National Forest sale in Roseburg is scheduled Thursday.

The winning bidder paid \$28.80 per thousand for \$610,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$25.50 and \$4.20 per thousand for the 10,000 feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$8.10.
