California's Pete Elliott shook up his starting team Tuesday, dropping four starters to the third string.

Elliott said he believed in competition for positions and added that the loss to Oregon State showed there were some who deserved a crack at starting.

Coach Jim Owens said his Washington Huskies would have light workouts all week, avoiding body contact as much as possible as they get ready for a Pacific Coast Conference game Saturday at Cal.

Rain dampened many of the Northern PCC practice fields. Idaho sloshed through an hour-long scrimmage in preparation for its trip to Washington State. Washington State's Cougars went behind closed doors for their first secret practice of the season. Coach Jim Sutherland wouldn't say what went on other than work "tough and end."

Oregon also practiced in the rain.

Defense Stressed

Still leading the Rose Bowl race, the Ducks worked at defense, which Coach Len Casanova said would be the main diet for the rest of the week. The conference leaders met Southern California next at Los Angeles.

USC worked at field goals and conversions. The defense was directed at stopping Oregon backs Jack Morris and Jim Shanley. Flu put 10 Oregon State players on the sidelines. One of them was tailback Joe Francis, who was released from the infirmary Monday but was still too weak for practice.

Stanford, which has had conversion troubles the last two years, received some heartening news. Halfback Al Harrington, whose jaw was broken against USC, may be able to try for extra points at Oregon State. Harrington kicked two for two before he was injured. Collette of Pacific went behind locked gates to cook up new plays for UCLA.

The Bruins were worked on defensive tactics in preparation for the game at Stockton.

Tailback Doug Long was placed on the "doubtful start" list when the team trainer said a shoulder injury suffered in the WSC game wasn't responding to treatment.

Oregon And Stanford Share Statistics

LOS ANGELES — Total defense honors in the Pacific Coast Conference football chase went back to Oregon last week while Stanford continued as the leading offensive team.

Stanford has averaged 350.9 yards per game on offense, ahead of Oregon State's 332. Oregon has a total defense mark of 260, to 254.8 for Idaho. Oregon State's 247.8-yard game average is the top rushing figure. Stanford is second with 227.9.

Washington State has 167.4 average in passing, including 13 touchdowns scored via the air.

Defensively, Oregon has allowed the least yards rushing, 135.1, to 163.6 for Oregon State, while Southern California has yielded a mere 65 yards on passing to 87.6 for Idaho.

UCLA leads in punting and interceptions, 39.8 on punts and 17 interceptions.

Oregon leads in kickoff runbacks, with a 26.7 average, and USC leads in punt returns, 11.9 to 11.1 for Oregon.

HURRICANE JACKSON whirls into action

Tommy Jackson Faces Challenge In Machen Bout

SAN FRANCISCO — Boxing followers discover tonight if Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson has dropped from heavyweight title challenger to trial horse within the short space of two fights.

The tireless warrior with the not-to-potential punch battles the No. 1 challenger, undefeated Eddie Machen, in a 12-rounder at the Cow Palace.

It's the first outing for Jackson since July 29 when, as the top-ranked challenger, he was stopped by champion Floyd Patterson in the 10th round. Jackson went to a hospital.

Machen, a 25-year-old from Redding, Calif., is undefeated in 23 bouts. He says he wants to "win big" to gain the right to battle Patterson.

"If I can knock him out, I will," says Eddie. "If not, I'll go for the decision. I'm not going to let desire for a knockout go to my head and throw all caution to the winds."

Words Thrown
In-fighting of the boxing game that doesn't go on in the ring influences some of Machen's desire for a big win.

Cus D'Amato, who manages Patterson, has said Machen has forfeited any right to fight the champion. D'Amato feuds with the International Boxing Club and declares Machen's pilot, Sid Flaherty, has IBC associations.

Although the fight is copromoted by the San Francisco Boxing Club and the IBC, Flaherty says he would agree to a title fight staged by any promoter of D'Amato's choosing. Yet he says he feels it will take public opinion to force a Machen-Patterson bout.

Jackson, of St. Albans, N. Y., has ideas other than that he is being used simply to build up Machen. Hurricane's manager, Lippe Briegbart, asserts the Californian is still a year away.

"He's never fought a fellow in the class of Jackson. After this fight we'll be No. 1 again," says Lippe with Jackson nodding approval.

'Winning Season' Outcome For Indians Now Pending

"If we can beat North Bend we can consider this a good season," was the comment of Roseburg coach Brad Ecklund after Tuesday's football practice. Ecklund also pointed out that even though the Bulldogs have a good club the Indians should come through with a win to give them their first winning season in several years.

In Tuesday's practice the Indians ran through most of the North Bend offensive patterns and worked on ways to defend against them. Most of the team turned out in full force Tuesday after taking Monday off. This was the first day that practice has not been held since the start of the season.

Scouting reports from the North Bend school show that the Bulldogs will have one of the heaviest lines that the Indians have faced all season. They also have good speed in the backfield and if given the chance can break away for a scoring run. The Bulldog quarterback is also rated as a better than average passer.

Ecklund plans to work mostly on his running game the rest of the week if the rains fail to slow up. This gives the Indians a chance to work out some of the wrinkles that showed up in the Cottage Grove game last Friday which Roseburg won 33-13.

Player Noted

Singled out for a little praise for the fine work that they turned in last Friday were Jerry Humphries and Bob Steele on the offensive line.

Humphries ran for three of the Roseburg touchdowns in the game, besides adding two of the extra points. Steele starting his first game of the year in the right half, turned in a fine running job. Steele now has played and started in all four of the Indian backfield spots.

Croch and Simons were credited with blocking Grover punts during the game to set up two of the Roseburg touchdowns. Hunt had more for 971 yards and nine touchdowns.

Bobby Newman, Washington State College's passing ace, dropped to third in the nation's collegiate individual total offense race after last Saturday's football game.

Newman, who had been the nation's leader, gained the top spot in passing offense, however, with 75 completions in 140 attempts for a 536 average. He has thrown for 971 yards and nine touchdowns.

In total offense, Newman has gained 1,045 yards in 202 plays in eight games. The total offense leader, Tom Greene of Holy Cross, has gained 1,150 yards in 162 plays in seven games.

Bob Stranksy of Colorado is the nation's rushing leader with 861 yards gained in 146 tries at the line.

In Pacific Coast Conference statistics, Newman leads in total offense and passing offense.

The PCC rushing leader is C. C. Shes of Stanford. He has gained 641 yards in 127 carries. Nub Beamer of Oregon State is second with 589 yards and Oregon's Jim Shanley is third with 581 yards.

Don Ellingsen of Washington State is the leading pass catcher, with 34 receptions, good for 410 yards.

Beamer, Shanley, Jack Fanning of WSC and Don Long of UCLA share the scoring lead with 42 points apiece.

Third Best Passing Attack Claimed By WSC

Statistics released by the NCAA Service Bureau showed Wednesday that the Washington State College Cougars have the third best passing attack in collegiate football.

The Cougars have gained 1,339 yards via the airlines in eight games for a per-game average of 167.4 yards. WSC passers have completed 103 of 193 aerials.

WSC's Bobby Newman is the nation's top passer, with 371 yards gained on 75 completions in 140 tries.

Utah is the top passing squad. The Utes have gained 1,614 yards in eight games for a 201.8 yards per game average. They have completed 116 of 179 aerials.

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Keg Tournery Figures Righted; Bring Changes

Several corrections have been made in the final tabulations of the final Bowling Tournament that ended last Sunday night on the Roseburg alleys. All of the men's places remained unchanged, but two of the women's events were switched around by tournament officials.

Jewell Pritt of Roseburg moved into first place in the women's singles and all-events to displace Jean Malcolm of Brookings. Malcolm had her handicap for the tournament figured wrong and dropped clear out of the top five in the singles and down to third in the all-events. Pritt moved from third into first place, while Pat Daugherty of Cottage Grove stayed in second place.

The first place men's team, Morning Fresh Bread of Medford took home \$175 for their efforts, while the second place team of Hammers Sporting Goods of Grants Pass nailed down \$125. Nine teams in all took home money with ninth place receiving \$25.

Shroyer First

In the men's doubles the team of Art Guthrie and Gordon Olsen of Brookings took home \$100 and the second place team of Buzz Green and Jim Knopp of Medford \$75. A total of 18 doubles teams received cash awards with the top 18 men receiving \$17. A total of 26 singles players were in the money headed by Bob Shroyer of Roseburg, who received \$80. Second place Bill Bickers of Brookings received \$70, while the number 26 man took home \$6.20.

First place in the men's all-events was nabbed by Frank Wal-

ton of Salem, who took home \$40 for his effort, while Shroyer in second place nabbed \$30. Eighteen players in all received cash awards for all-events competition, with the number 18 man drawing \$2.

Only five women's teams were in the money headed by A & B Logging of Roseburg. Top team in the event took home \$100 for its effort. The second place Winston Five team of Roseburg nailed down \$80 for its effort, while the fifth place Cottage Bowl team of Cottage Grove received \$20.

The doubles combination of Doris Sidders and Flo Ann McDonald of Roseburg took first money of \$60, while Betty Guthrie and Ann Price of Brookings received \$40 for a second place finish. A total of eight places were awarded cash awards, with the eighth place team getting \$3.90.

Trophies Also
Jewell Pritt for her first places in the singles and all-events received a total of \$65. Of this total, \$40 was for the singles, and \$25 for the all-events. Pat Daugherty for her second place finish in the singles received \$30. A total of 12 places were awarded cash prizes with the final place receiving \$5.40.

Second place in the all-events was taken by Betty Guthrie and with it a cash total of \$15. Eight places were paying ones with the final place receiving \$4.

Also along with the first places in each event came a trophy. The prize ratio was one to each five teams, one to each six doubles, one to each singles and one to each 10 all-events.

Aggie John Crow 'Back Of Week'

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. — When John Crow was named back of the week in the nation's college football it was no surprise to his coach, Paul (Bear) Bryant of Texas A&M.

Bryant was already talking about Crow being All-America before his honor was announced, and he also declared that "if John Crow doesn't win the Heisman Trophy—whether we win another game or not—they ought to quit giving it."

The critics already are recognizing Crow as among the greatest backfield men in Southwest Conference history.

Abb Curtis, assistant secretary of the conference and long-time official who played football at Texas back in the twenties, calls Crow the best back since Doak Walker of Southern Methodist (1947-48-49). But he won't compare the two.

Can't Compare
"You can't compare them," he says. "One would run over you and the other would run over you. But they both would beat you and that's what counts."

Crow got his back of the week designation for what he did Saturday night against Southern Methodist — 89 yards rushing, 64 yards returning punts and kick-offs, 30 yards returning two intercepted passes, sparked two touchdowns drives and made one touchdown himself, kicked an extra point, "killed" an SMU hope by "stealing" the ball from a fellow who was catching it, blocked a pass and all-in-all played the finest game of the season in the Southwest Conference.

But he had done just about as well the week before against Arkansas when he gained 116 yards, scored the winning touchdown with a 12-yard run and intercepted a pass on the goal line to stop a great Arkansas threat.

Over all the 20-year-old Burkett played a tremendous game. He displayed great strength, catlike agility and terrific speed in stamping himself as one of Auburn's finest linebackers. In addition to his great defensive work, he threw clearing blocks for both of Auburn's touchdowns which came on short backs over center.

Tackle Carl Luna of Texas A&M and Dick Whalen, UCLA end, were high up in The Associated Press weekly poll on voting from sports writers and broadcasters.
