## Seaside's Gary Holmes Signs

SEASIDE, Ore. — Gary Holmes, left-handed pitching and hitting star of last season's Seaside Oregon class A-2 high school baseball champions, signed with the Cleveland Indians Tuesday. Carl Mays, Cleveland scout, said he received a bonus of less than \$4,000, but did not disclose the exact sum. That will permit the Cleveland major league club to farm Holmes, 18, to its Reading, Pa., affiliate in the class A Eastern League. But Mays said Holmes will train first with Cleveland. Mays called Holmes "one of the greatest young hitters I've ever seen," and added, "Even if he couldn't make it as a pitcher, which is most unlikely, he could certainly go all the way to the majors as a first baseman." Holmes pitched 11 of Seaside High's 13 victories in its undefeated 1956 season. Holmes is 6-1, weighs 180 pounds. He struck out 22 batters in the seven-inning title game against Glendale. Two reached first base on wild pitch strikes. He is a curveballer. Holmes enrolled at Oregon State College this fall but dropped out of school to await signing of a professional contract.

## Frank Lane Chosen GM At Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Ohio — An explosive 61-year-old baseball executive with a reputation for shrewd trading was named Wednesday as Cleveland Indians general manager of the Indians Tuesday. Frank Lane, appointed general manager of the Indians Tuesday night, Lane left St. Louis and his job as Cardinals' general manager to succeed fired Hank Greenberg. "Our first job," Lane said after he stepped off the plane, "is to find out what the team needs." "I'm going to do everything and anything I can to help." Ten days after he took over as Chicago White Sox' general manager in 1948 he got Billy Pierce and \$10,000 from the Detroit Tigers for catcher Aaron Robinson. Pierce has become one of the great left-handers in baseball, while Robinson faded. Lane said he wanted to get acquainted with the team and talk things over with Bobby Bragan, Tribe field manager, before commenting on any possible trades. He did mention, however, that "from a distance," the Indians looked as if they needed help around second base. He said he talked with John Mc Hale, general manager of the Detroit Tigers, by telephone in St. Louis Tuesday. Shortstop Harvey Kuenn who spent part of last season at third base for Detroit, was discussed. William R. Daley, chairman of the Indians' board of directors, did not disclose salary terms when he announced Lane's appointment Tuesday. Speculation was he will receive \$50,000 plus attendance bonuses from Cleveland under a three-year contract.

## Hunters Find Plane Wreckage

BIRKENFELD, Wash. — State police said Tuesday the wreckage of a light, single-engine plane had been found in a heavily wooded area three miles south of this Columbia County town. The state police said three elk hunters reported that the wreckage appeared to be that of a U.S. Army plane. Three Rainier longshoremen—Glen Sisco, Bill Neubold and Ed Ellis—reported finding the plane Friday. They said the craft was damaged severely and heavily overgrown with brush. Trees were sheared off in the area, indicating the plane came to earth in a shallow dive, they said. An Air Force spokesman at Portland said he had relayed the information about the plane to McChord Air Force Base, home of the 25th Air Defense Command. In previous years, hunters have found several wrecked planes which had been discovered previously, but not marked.

## Stolen Cattle Shipment End Aim Of Agreement

OLYMPIA, Wash. — The states of Oregon and Washington have agreed to a brand inspection program designed to stop the shipment of stolen cattle between the two states, State Agriculture Director Joe Dwyer said Tuesday. Under the program, each state will inspect the brands of cattle shipped into it from the other state. Proceeds from the sale of livestock not having brand clearance will be held up until clearance is obtained, Dwyer said. Dwyer said cattle shippers can obtain brand clearance from district offices of the State Agriculture Department or from local brand inspectors.

## Ex-Ambassador, Father Of Local Woman, Passes

The death of Maxwell M. Hamilton of Palo Alto, Calif., a former ambassador for this country, has been reported by Mrs. Charles (Judy) Church, a daughter living in Roseburg. Hamilton died at the age of 61 in Palo Alto Tuesday morning from a heart attack. He served in government capacities with the state department for some 30 years before his death. His positions included serving as a judge in the Chinese Federal Court, as an attaché to Russia in Moscow during World War II and as an ambassador to Finland from 1945 to 1948. He was also head of the Far Eastern division of the state department from 1948 to 1955. Hamilton was also chairman of a board of Far Eastern experts in the state department, headed by John Foster Dulles, which wrote up the Japanese Peace Treaty in 1955. He also was a veteran of World War I and retired from government service in 1956 with the rank of ambassador. Since retirement he has been in Mills College in Oakland, California.

## Illinois Senator Gets Public Award

CHICAGO — Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill) Tuesday accepted the annual \$1,000 Sidney Hillman Award for Meritorious Public Service. He immediately donated it to minority and welfare groups. One-half of the cash award, Douglas said, "is to go to the legal defense fund of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People." "This will be used," Douglas told an award luncheon audience, "to defend the just causes of the poor and weak who otherwise would not be able to invoke the equal protection of the laws." "The remaining half is to be divided into three equal parts going respectively to the American Friends Service Committee for their work-camp projects, to the Catholic Council on Working Life which has done such good work in the field of labor relations, and to the American Jewish Committee." The award, a memorial to the late Sidney Hillman who was for many years head of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, was presented to Douglas by Jacob S. Potosky, Hillman's successor as the union's president. Potosky described Douglas as "a rare sort of public servant."

## Manager Is Devine With St. Louis Cards

ST. LOUIS — Youthful Vaughan (Bing) Devine moves in as general manager of the St. Louis Cardinals Wednesday and becomes possibly the only general manager in baseball who works on a month-to-month basis. Devine is only 40 but he's been a Cardinal front office man for 18 years. His most recent job has been executive assistant to General Manager Frank Lane. Lane's last act before resigning Tuesday to become general manager of the Cleveland Indians was to recommend Devine as his successor. August A. Busch, president and owner of the Cardinals, took the advice. He called a press conference and announced Devine's appointment three hours after Lane suddenly bowed out. "I won't believe all this until I'm sure I'm awake," said Devine. "I'm afraid I'm dreaming." The new general manager's salary was said to be \$30,000 a year. Busch took the occasion to announce a new policy: From now on only the field manager will work under contract—a one-year contract—and the other members of the managerial team will be on a month-to-month basis. Devine told reporters that will make no difference to him—it's the same way he's been working since he first joined the Cardinals as a publicity man in 1938.

## War Hero Urges Money To Equal Red Space Twins

WASHINGTON — Beside the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a World War II hero called this week for money and effort to regain what has been lost to Russia's orbiting space twins. Gov. Joe J. Foss of South Dakota, speaking at Veterans Day observances at Arlington National Cemetery, declared that the American public, alerted by the Soviet feats, are "letting it be known that they prefer strength and national security to penny-pinching." The governor, who won the Medal of Honor in World War II and served with distinction in the Korean conflict, blamed the last Congress for yielding to a public clamor for economy "obtained at the expense of military strength and national security." The ceremony at nearby Arlington, Va., was the official national observance of Veterans Day—the date on which Germany surrendered 39 years ago to end World War I. At a similar observance at Welch, W. Va. former President Harry S. Truman said "character assassination" of government scientists is one main reason why the Russians beat this country into outer space. "Those scientists were so much abused that we lost a great many of them," Truman said in his prepared address. "They retired and went into schools and other places."
