

England's Future King Observes Quiet Birthday

LONDON — The future king of England got up in a windy dormitory at 7:15 on his ninth birthday Thursday and went to school like any other boy.
His mother and father, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip, told the headmaster at Cheam School that no exception should be made of their son.
It was Charles' first birthday away from the royal splendor of palaces and carpeted castles. He spent it at the boarding school 30 miles south of London where he was enrolled this fall.
Instead of a big shindig, he had lessons.
There was little chance for a visit by his folks, either.
Prince Philip was off on a 10-hour visit to Cornwall (one of Charles' titles is Duke of Cornwall).
The Queen headed for a building exhibition in London.
To celebrate the birthday a tea party was scheduled for Charles and eight school chums with a cake. Every other boy at Cheam gets the same on his anniversary.
Rising in the half light just after a chilly dawn, Charles scrubbed himself and trotted off to chapel for prayers with the other boys.
Headmaster Peter Beck handed the Prince his presents and greeting cards at the breakfast table. All week long a weighted-down country postman had been delivering them.
Then, with very little ado, Charles was hustled off to the classroom.

PORTLAND — A planning commission for the whole Portland metropolitan area is nearing reality.

France Protests Arms Delivery To Tunis

PARIS — Foreign Minister Christian Pineau said today the French government will consider any American or British delivery of arms to Tunisia contrary to Atlantic solidarity.
Pineau told the National Assembly's Foreign Affairs Committee that Britain and the United States "are about to effect delivery of arms to Tunisia."
He said France "regretted this Anglo-American initiative."
Pineau announced the Cabinet's opposition to arms for France's former protectorate after an all-night series of meetings and exchanges between Premier Felix Gaillard and British and American envoys.

Sec. Weeks Urges A 'Less Butter More Guns' Budget

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Commerce Weeks called on industry Wednesday to support a "less butter and more guns" federal budget to meet the challenge of Soviet science.
Weeks strongly suggested the budget which President Eisenhower will hand Congress in January will call for stepped-up military and foreign aid spending and curtailment of civilian programs.
The secretary addressed 1,200 members of the National Defense Executive Reserve, opening a two-day conference here. The reserve is made up of businessmen who have served in government.
"The Soviet Union's sensational exploits in satellites has been the most serious challenge of this tension-racked age," Weeks said. "As President Eisenhower steps up the campaign to mobilize scientific and military resources, American business must move up into the front line of defense."
Support Budget
Naming ways by which industry can cooperate, Weeks headed the list with the exhortation: "Support a budget adequate for national security."
"Such a budget not only would reflect necessary defense and mutual security requests but also the

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
