Dave Beck Jr.'s Trial Continues

SEATTLE — The grand jury trial of Dave Beck Jr., continued Saturday with the prosecution attempting to prove that he embezzled \$4,650 from the sale of two automobiles belonging to the Teamsters Union.

A witness testified in King County Superior Court Friday that he gave the son of the fugitive Teamster Union president, a \$2,800 cashier's check to pay for a Cadillac car. Kenneth L. Buckley, a Seattle fireman, said he saw Beck put the check in his pocket.

John L. Stratton, president of a Seattle hotel supply company, told of the purchase of another Cadillac with a \$1,850 check made out to Dave Beck Jr.

The grand jury indictment against Beck says both cars were owned by the Teamsters Union. Trial of Dave Beck Sr. on a similar charge of grand larceny involving the sale of a third Teamster-owned car is scheduled to start Dec. 2.

21 Foot, 200-Pound Python Loose On Desert

MESA, Ariz. — A 21-foot python, weighing more than 200 pounds, was loose near a residential area of this central Arizona town early today.

The huge reptile escaped from a roadside alligator farm just east of Mesa last night.

Police and volunteers were to start a search of the area at daybreak. Several housing developments are located nearby, but some of the area is undeveloped desert land.

PAYLESS WINS SUNBEAM SUIT

On the 24th of October, 1957, Sunbeam filed a suit in the Circuit Court of Oregon for Marion County at Salem against various Payless Drug Stores in Oregon, seeking to restrain and enjoin these stores from selling Sunbeam merchandise at less than the retail price to the consumer demanded by Sunbeam.

Accompanying the filing of the suit was a request for a temporary restraining order which was granted by Judge Sloper of the Marion County Circuit Court upon condition that Sunbeam post a bond for the protection of the defendants and fixing a date for the appearance of the defendants in an answer to the request for a continuance of that injunction.

The defendants Payless appeared before Judge Sloper, by counsel, and presented the law applicable to situations of this kind and arguments in favor of the right of Payless to fix its own resale prices to the consuming public. After hearing arguments of counsel for both parties and considering the matter, Judge Sloper, on November 8th, issued an order vacating the restraining order that he had theretofore issued and refused to enjoin the Payless Stores from their right to sell this merchandise at prices fixed by them alone.

Judge Sloper further sustained a demurrer of the defendants to the plaintiff's complaint and issued a decree and order on November 8th forever dismissing plaintiff Sunbeam's complaint against these defendants and rendered judgement in favor of the defendants against Sunbeam Corporation for their costs and disbursements. Train Derailment Kills Man, Injures 37 Others

WHITE PIGEON, Mich. — One man was killed and at least 37 other persons were injured early today when 11 cars of the New York Central's eastbound flyer, "The Chicagoan," were derailed. Hospital officials at nearby Sturgis and Three Rivers said 27 of the injured were released after first aid treatment.

The man killed was tentatively identified by Sturgis Hospital as Henry Nickols, foreman in a mail car. Eight of the derailed coaches carried passengers. One of the eight overturned and other cars were jackknifed into a heap as the train went through the crossing at State Highway 103 one mile south of White Pigeon in southwestern Michigan.

Washington Sealed Off From Russians, Portland Reopened

WASHINGTON — The United States Friday sealed off the entire state of Washington to Soviet travelers but reopened Portland and other major cities to Red visitors.

In a note sent to the Soviet embassy Nov. 11, the State Department informed the Soviets the off-limits area for them in this country had been increased about 14 per cent to include more than 30 per cent of the U.S.

The cities of Seattle and Tacoma and 16 Washington counties were added to the list. All other parts of the state had been closed previously.

The new counties closed were: Skagit, Whatcom, San Juan, Island, Kitsap, Clallam, Jefferson, Mason, Grays Harbor, Pacific, Wahkiakum, Chelan, Okanogan, Stevens, Ferry and Pend Oreille. The State Department said the action was in retaliation for Soviet action Aug. 28 that closed about one-third of the USSR to U. S. travelers.

In the same note, however, the U.S. proposed that both countries waive the travel bans but there was no indication the Soviets accept.

Lions Club Hears Talk On Copco

John Eddy, director of employee relations for California Oregon Power Company, discussed his company's operations and problems of public relations the company faces at Thursday night's Roseburg Lions Club meeting.

Eddy said private utilities such as his are facing new problems in light of recent criticism by public power advocates. He discussed costs of operation, political criticism, and the government's role in power. He said the company can do anything better, and other items listed under a miscellaneous heading.

He said Copco served 70,000 customers in an area of 5,000 square miles, compared to 208,000 in a 13,000 square mile area served by Power & Light, 208,000 in 2700 square miles by Portland General Electric and more than two million customers in 500 square miles of Consolidated Edison. The large area served causes much greater cost in transmission, yet local rates are favorable to the others, Eddy pointed out.

Eddy Bryant, chairman of the recent light bulb sales, announced that more than \$600 had been netted by the club. The money will be used for sight conservation.

Legislators Accept 20 Per Cent Compromise

millions a year, there shall be an automatic tax decrease of 1 per cent for each million dollars collected above that figure.

But that "decelerator clause" probably could not go into effect. The compromise bill reduces taxes on income tax collections from 91 to 74 millions.

The estimated surplus at the end of the biennium on June 30, 1959, now will be 31 million dollars, compared with 74 millions before the special session started. The Legislature voted several days ago to boost base school aid from \$85 per school census child per year to \$105. The effect of this is to provide 5 millions a year of property tax relief, starting next year.

Final Debate Brief

The final debates on the income tax bill were brief.

In the House, the four negative votes were cast by Reps. Carl Back, Sixes; Keith D. Skelton, Eugene; and Don Willner, Portland, all Democrats; and Graham Kilam (R), Portland.

Sen. Monahan (D), Sweetland (D), Milwaukie, cast the only Senate vote against the bill.

The Democrats who opposed it expressed fears that the tax cut would leave insufficient surplus funds to help finance the next biennium. Kilam was unhappy because the cut wasn't bigger.

The bitter partisanship prevailed to the very end. Skelton castigated the "willful" Senate Republicans who are willing to destroy the state to get at the governor. This bill means we are adopting deficit spending for the first time.

Slap At Governor

Kilam took a slap at Gov. Holmes for ever calling the special session in the first place as long as the governor had originally proposed an income tax reduction of out 6 per cent.

After Sen. Walter J. Pearson (D), Portland, and Lee Ohmart (R), Salem—authors of the 20 per cent compromise—explained how they didn't like the bill but thought it was the best that could be done, Sen. Ben Musa (D), The Dalles, provided the "comedy" relief.

It was Musa's bolting of his party's position that gave the Republicans strength to dominate the evenly divided Senate.

Musa lit a three-foot peace pipe and smoked it with Pearson.

shortly after it took off from Southampton for Lisbon, Portugal, with 50 passengers and a crew of 8. Many of the passengers were beginning vacations.

All those on the plane were Britons, an Aquila spokesman said. The dead included the entire crew of two of the stewardesses. Forty of the bodies were recovered in the grey mist of morning.

All 15 survivors were taken to a hospital, six of them seriously injured. A spokesman for the Civil Aviation Ministry said the pilot had radioed he was turning back to Southampton because one engine failed. He apparently crashed about 15 minutes later. The plane had set out on its usual route in cloudy weather.

Fire Levels Home Near Glendale Friday Morning

A fire at the country home of Mr. and Mrs. Renu Michel, about six miles north of Glendale, burned the house to the ground Friday morning about 11, with loss estimated at over \$15,000.

The house, built about eight years ago, sat on a small hill behind Michel's Feed and Building Supply Store at the corner of Barton Road and Highway 99.

Michel said he believed the fire had started from one of his chimneys. Both he and his wife were at home at the time, but the flames spread so rapidly they were unable to save any household furnishings.

Employees of the Schmidt-Crewe Logging Co., located about one-half mile away, were instrumental in saving the barn on the Michel property, according to Michel. The loggers and several members of the Douglas Forest Protective Assn. joined in to put out the blaze with extinguishing equipment.

Michel estimated that the loss amounted to over \$15,000. He said it was only partially covered by insurance, according to News-Review correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

Broken Bodies, Debris Returned

HONOLULU — Carrying a grim cargo of 19 broken bodies and considerable debris, the aircraft carrier Philippine Sea headed for her home port of Long Beach, Calif., today.

The bodies and debris were all that could be found after an intensive week-long search for survivors of the Pan American Stratocruiser "Romance of the Skies." The carrier radiated that it had exhausted all possibilities of finding any survivors.

The big Stratocruiser disappeared a week ago Friday with 44 persons aboard. The mute evidence taken from the sea indicated the airliner and its passengers met a swift and violent end. Most of the bodies were shoeless and in life jackets, suggesting the 36 passengers and eight crewmen were preparing for a ditching.

Girard's Trial Cost \$85,000

TOKYO — The trial of GI William S. Girard, in which a verdict is expected Tuesday, was estimated Saturday to have cost the U.S. Army in Japan about \$85,000 so far.

The figure will go higher if there is an appeal from the ruling on Girard's manslaughter trial. The Illinois soldier is accused of killing a Japanese woman scrap collector on a firing range last Jan. 30.

The trial has cost Japan far less — perhaps only one-tenth the Army's cost — because salaries of its officials are low. The Army estimate was based on careful calculation of the manpower, vehicles, airplanes and supplies used in investigating the case, defending Girard and providing services to the Japanese court and the press.

The expenditures out of existing budgets "will force us to tighten our belts on other things we might have been able to do," one U.S. officer said.

Gaillard Calls For Vote Of Confidence Tuesday

PARIS — Just 10 days after he was voted into office to end France's longest postwar cabinet crisis, Premier Felix Gaillard was forced today to demand a vote of confidence to push financial reforms through the National Assembly.

The Assembly is expected to vote Tuesday on Gaillard's proposals to raise taxes and cut expenditures in an effort to lift France out of a financial morass. Observers said Gaillard probably would win.

Gaillard asked for the confidence vote about dawn today after an all-night Assembly session. Earlier in the session he warned that such agreements within the NATO alliance as the raging dispute over Atlantic allies might split up the Atlantic allies.

17 Persons Die In New York Fire

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. — Seventeen persons, including a mother and her eight children, perished early Saturday as fire billowed through a narrow three-story apartment housing two Negro families.

Fourteen of the dead were children. Nine others were injured. Flames surging through stairways and halls trapped many in their bedrooms. At least one was killed in a jump to the ground.

The victims, besides the mother and 14 youngsters, included two adults reported staying with the two families.

The frame building, once the Moonglo Hotel, was a splintered, charred tomb.

Mrs. Mary Ewing, 25, died with her eight children.

Also dead were six children of Mr. and Mrs. Sanford Reid.

The other victims were Jack Thomas and John Johnson, roomers.

Horses Stop For Shoeing; One Runner Drops Out

HEBER, Utah. — They stopped the horses for shoeing Saturday after the nags plodded 10 miles ahead in the marathon race against two humans.

But one of the runners, Terry Jensen, 18, Idaho Falls, Idaho, dropped from the race because of a tight leg tendon.

His partner, Albert Ray, 24, St. Albans, N.Y., buffed up a tortuous hill on the 8,000 foot high Daniels Summit and trailed the two horses by about 10 miles, with about 75 miles left to go to the 138-mile race from Salt Lake City to Roosevelt.

Kasper Meted 6 More Months

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — U. S. Dist. Judge Robert L. Taylor told John Kasper he must have respect for the law, then sentenced the lanky segregationist Friday to another six months in prison.

Kasper was sentenced after he and the six co-defendants from the nearby Clinton, Tenn., area had been denied a new trial in their contempt of court convictions arising from racial disorders last year at Clinton.

Taylor meted the six months in addition to the one year Kasper already is serving for his activities at Clinton.

The judge was easy on the other six, convicted by an all-white jury last July of conspiring with Kasper to violate the injunction. The five men and one woman were placed on probation ranging from one to two years. Maximum penalty was a \$1,000 fine and six months in prison.
