

Bureau To Complete Survey Of Olalla-Lookingglass Area By Next June, Letter Says

The U. S. Bureau of Reclamation says it will probably complete its reconnaissance survey of the Olalla-Tenmile-Lookingglass area by next June.

The tentative completion date was revealed in a letter to the Douglas County Water Resources Advisory Committee at the monthly meeting Monday night. The study was started in August.

The letter came from Lee McAllister, Salem, regional director of the Bureau.

He said the study would include subsurface exploration for a storage site (much of which has been completed), engineering field surveys, water supply, engineering and economic studies.

This exploration is the basis for a decision as to whether the final feasibility study should be made. A feasibility study would determine if it would pay to install a dam on Olalla Creek.

Good Will Story Filming Ends Up In Fight In Japan

KAWANA VILLAGE, Japan (AP) — A good will story being filmed by 20th Century-Fox was interrupted Monday night by angry curses, fist fights and the near-destruction of a Japanese fishing fleet.

True to his troubleshooter role in the movie, big John Wayne took charge in the bedlam and helped restore peace.

Wayne has the lead in "The Townsend Harris Story," which tells about the first U. S. diplomat in Japan. Explaining that he wants to boost U. S.-Japanese friendship the way Townsend Harris did, the actor contributed 50,000 yen (\$139) yesterday to a Christmas fund for Japanese children.

But the good will almost went up in flames a few hours later.

The film makers flooded a small ship with 50 gallons of kerosene for a scene in which Harris (Wayne) goes to the aid of Japanese villagers. The ship then was set afire for a dramatic sequence.

It drifted to fishing vessels nearby, scorching three of them and threatening the whole fleet.

Led by Wayne, the film makers hurried to fend off the flaming ship, and swimmers pushed it to med-channel.

By that time fishermen were shouting in anger. Japanese movie technicians tried to explain but were met with punches.

The melee continued until director John Huston ordered his crew to pack up and get out. He personally assured the fishermen they would be compensated liberally for any damage.

Ben Irving, chairman of the advisory committee, said he had been told by a Bureau engineer that if the dam is built, it will be 120 feet high. The Bureau reports that it might be possible to irrigate 9,400 acres in the area.

During the meeting Irving also reported on some precipitation figures from some areas of the county in last week's storm. He said the biggest concentration of rain was recorded at Reston where 2.44 inches fell in 24 hours.

Discuss Fishery

One other subject that took the limelight during the evening was a discussion between members of the advisory committee and Jerry Bauer, fish biologist for the State Game Commission.

B. A. Young, chairman of the North Umpqua District of the committee's operations, asked Bauer if the Game Commission was forming any conclusions on the tentative dam projects being studied.

Bauer said the commission was. He said the two main sites being discussed on the south Umpqua River, one above Tiller and the other above Days Creek, would hurt the fisheries most. He said spawning beds would be blocked off. But, he said, the commission is weighing the benefits to be gained by the fish from increased streamflows below possible dams.

Knight Returns Ending His Feud With VP Nixon

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Gov. Goodwin J. Knight headed back to his office at Sacramento today after ending an often-bitter feud with Vice President Nixon.

The governor, returning last night from a three-week absence, also issued what he called his final denials of rumors that his switch from the gubernatorial to the senatorial race involved deals with Nixon or Sen. William F. Knowland. Knowland is running for the Republican nomination for governor.

Such rumors, Knight told a hastily called press conference, were "shabby, unfounded charges... manufactured for cheap partisan political purposes."

"I have not discussed the matter with Sen. Knowland at any time nor with anyone purporting to act as his representative and no sinister influence was brought to bear upon me by party leaders or others."

"The very word 'deal' is repugnant to me," Knight said.

Search Planes Comb Area For Jap Fishing Boat

GUAM (AP) — Eight search planes and two destroyer escorts combed a 40,000 square mile area of the Pacific Ocean northwest of here Tuesday without finding a trace of a Japanese fishing boat reported in distress with 22 aboard Monday.

The Navy said chances of finding the Tachiu Ana Maru were becoming "slimmer and slimmer" because of very rough seas with 20-foot waves.

A Coast Guard vessel was also on the way to the area.

Government Claims Frank Acted Illegally For Trujillo

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government called witnesses Tuesday in an effort to prove that former FBI Agent John Joseph Frank acted illegally as an agent for Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo.

Trial of Frank, charged with failing to register as an agent for the Dominican Republic's strong man, went into its second day. Opposing attorneys estimated it may last two weeks.

FBI Agent Fred C. Woodcock told the federal district court jury Monday that Frank told him he had acted as a security adviser for Trujillo on three occasions. But he said Frank took the position that this did not make it necessary for him to register as an agent of a foreign principal.

Security Precautions

Woodcock said Frank told of setting up security precautions for a Trujillo visit to Spain in 1944, a visit to Kansas City in 1955 and for a Dominican fair in December 1955.

In an opening statement Monday, Chief Prosecutor William G. Hundley said the government would show that Frank made a personal investigation of the New York activities of Dr. Jesus Maria De Galindez and Nicholas Silfa.

De Galindez, a Columbia University professor, disappeared from New York City in March. Both he and Silfa have been identified as critics of the Trujillo regime.

Hundley told the jury the government also would prove that Frank worked with Gerald J. Murphy, Eugene, Ore., 23-year-old pilot who vanished in the Dominican capital last Dec. 3.

Claim Killed By Pilot

An official Dominican explanation of Murphy's disappearance said he had been killed by another pilot who later committed suicide. Strong doubts of the story have been voiced by Murphy's family and others.

Some reports said Murphy spoke of having some knowledge of the circumstances surrounding the disappearance of De Galindez before Murphy himself vanished.

'Little Rock Rebels' Being Held In \$400 Bail

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The self-styled "Little Rock Rebels," a group of six young white men accused of beating two Negro brothers, were being held in \$400 bail each today for the grand jury.

In ordering the six held, Magistrate Nathan A. Beifel told them, "you have little rocks in your heads."

Police testified the six, ranging in age from 20 to 27, broke a front window of the brothers' home and then fought with them in a wild brawl when the two came out on the street.

"We have enough trouble on an international scale," Magistrate Beifel said, "without going out of the way to cause racial trouble."

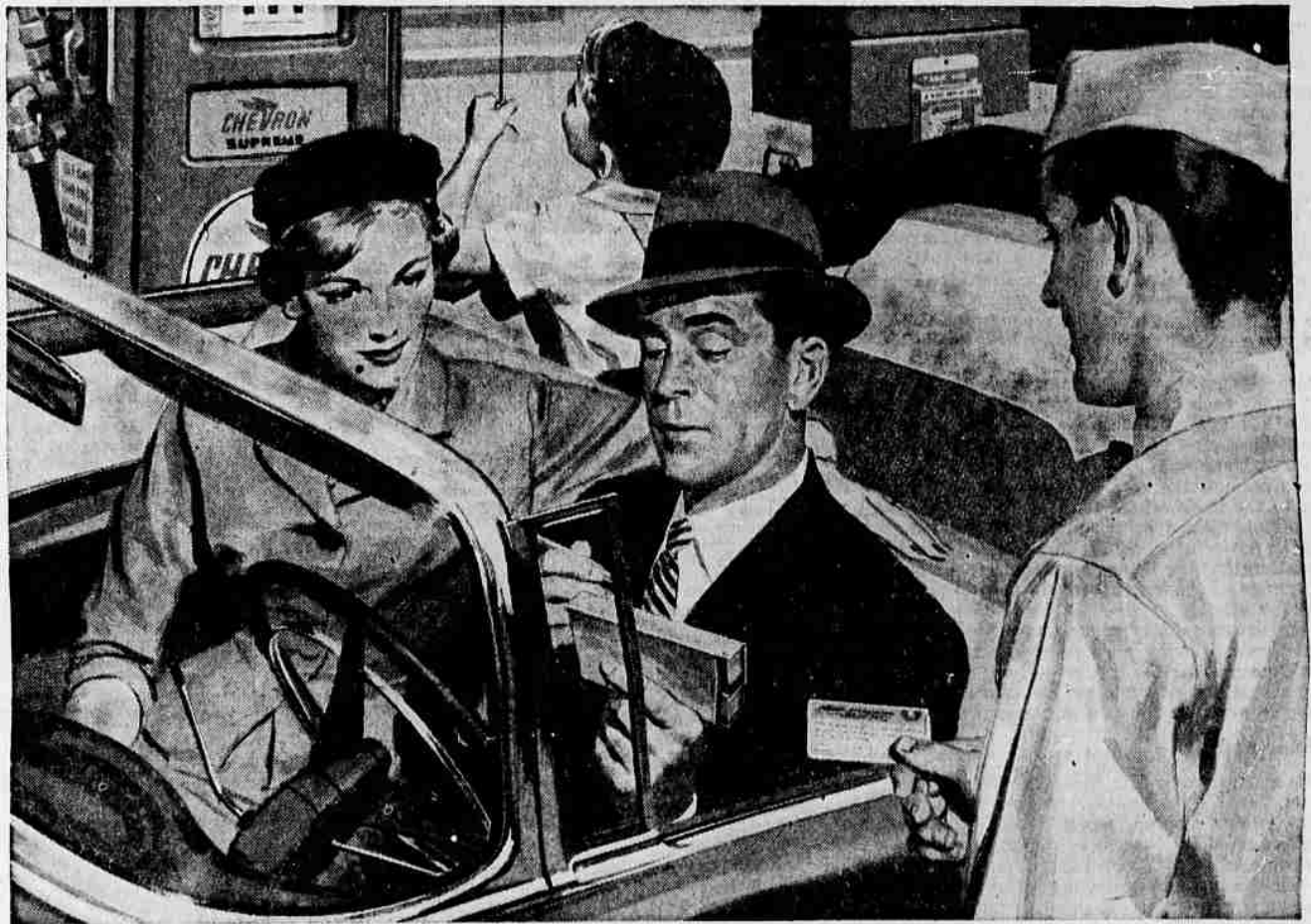

Rudolph Abel To Appeal Conviction And Sentence

NEW YORK (AP) — Russian Col. Rudolf I. Abel, 55, sentenced to 30 years in prison as a spy, has decided to appeal his conviction and sentence.

Abel was convicted in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn Oct. 25 on charges including conspiring to transmit U.S. military information to the Soviet Union. He could have been sentenced to death. Instead, he drew a sentence last Friday that could keep him in prison until he is 85.

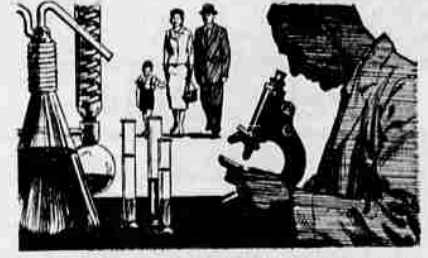
