

Factory-Suggested Prices For 1958 Automobiles Up Average Of 3.4 Per Cent

DETROIT — Factory-suggested list prices for 1958 automobiles are up roughly an average of 3.4 per cent over 1957 listings. This is about one-half the increase announced a year ago.

In dollars and cents most factory-announced increases range from \$35 to as much as \$225. It could be argued that some advances were smaller and some higher.

The prices announced by the car makers are the "suggested" list prices. They are not binding on the retailers. They do not include federal excise, state and local taxes, extra-cost accessories, shipping charges, dealer preparation and dealer handling charges.

Markup Different

A car in the lower-price bracket could have a factory-suggested tag of \$2,200 and cost the retail buyer \$3,100.

The suggested list price is the wholesale cost and the retailer's markup of up to 25 per cent. The markup is said by some makers to be of a size to permit the retailer to vary the delivered cost to meet price competition.

All this—taxes, optional, extra-cost equipment and competitive price discounting—means the intended car buyer hardly can figure what his delivered cost will be from the factory-announced price. Financing charges are another substantial item not included in the suggested price.

CAMP DREW, Japan — Haru (Candy) Girard, tears brimming from her eyes, said today her prayers were answered when her soldier husband escaped a prison term for the killing of a Japanese woman scrap collector.

"In my heart I am happy that the trial is over, but at the same time I am sad for the Sakai family," the Japanese wife of Specialist 3C, William S. Girard said.

Girard, wearing a fatigue uniform, stood beside his diminutive bride as the two talked with newsmen on the steps of the headquarters building at Camp Drew.

It was Candy's first public statement since a Japanese court yesterday gave Girard a three-year suspended prison sentence for shooting Mrs. Naka Sakai on a U. S. firing range last Jan. 30.

Candy smiled and put her hand shyly across her face when asked about family plans.

"All I can say is that I hope there is no more trouble," she replied and began weeping.

In all instances the Chevrolet, Ford and Plymouth prices are for six-cylinder models. Eight-cylinder units are \$100 higher for Chevrolet and Plymouth and from \$100 to \$124 higher for Ford models.

Price advances in the medium price field generally are in the same area as those in the lower price group.

Hatfield Won't Fight Unander For Governorship

PORTLAND — Secretary of State Mark Hatfield will not fight State Treasurer Sig Unander for the Republican nomination for governor next year.

Hatfield announced that Tuesday, possibly leaving the way clear for Unander to grab the Republican nomination and oppose the expected Democratic nominee, Gov. Robert D. Holmes, in the fall.

Both Hatfield and Unander had been mentioned prominently as likely Republican candidates, until Hatfield's announcement.

One other prominent Republican also has been mentioned as likely to seek the nomination. He is Rep. Walter Norblad, who came close to seeking the governor's chair last year.

"Although there have been other names under discussion, I have generally assumed Mr. Unander would enter the contest for governor," said Hatfield.

"If he does so, I cannot now conceive of circumstances under which I would enter that race or seek any other office in 1958. The job I have as secretary of State is an important one, and it is uppermost in my mind," he said.

Ex-GE President Gerard Swope Dies Of Illness

NEW YORK — Gerard Swope, 84, former president of the General Electric Co., died of illness Wednesday in his home.

Swope was president of the company for 18 years and later was honorary president.

He was chairman of the New York City Housing Authority from 1939 to 1942.

Swope, a brother of Herbert Bayard Swope, the journalist, started with General Electric in Chicago in 1893 as a helper at \$1 a day. He became president of the company in 1922.

It was under his direction that the company began extensive manufacture of electric appliances for home use. Until 1922, the incandescent electric lamp was the only GE product sold directly to the public.

He also guided the company through two distinct eras — one of seemingly limitless expansion of the nation's economy and one of prolonged depression.

Swope was born in St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 1, 1872.

While an undergraduate at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Swope visited Chicago in 1893 to see the World's Fair. He became a helper in the GE Chicago service shop during that visit. He returned to M.I.T. and was graduated in 1895 with a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering.

After graduation, he returned to Chicago, this time in Western Electric Co. shops. He served with Western Electric until World War I when he became a member of the War Department general staff.

In 1919, Charles A. Coffin, then president of General Electric brought Swope back into GE. Three years later Swope became president.

Swope married Mary Dayton Hill of New Brunswick, N.J., in 1901. They had five children, Henrietta H., Isaac G., Gerard, David and John.

Jury Convicts Driver; Jail Term Is Omitted

After deliberating for less than 20 minutes Tuesday evening, a district court jury found James Arthur Jones, 69, Singleton Park, guilty of drunken driving.

Judge Warren A. Woodliff fined Jones \$175, but said he was making an exception from his practice of coupling a fine with a jail sentence for drunken driving convictions. The exception was being made because of Jones' age, the judge told him.

In addition, his driver's license was suspended for 90 days—mandatory under Oregon law.

State police arrested Jones Aug. 30 on Carnes Road after he had run into a bridge. He had been free on \$500 bail.

The day-long trial was prosecuted by Dist. Atty. Avery W. Thompson. William Jones was defense attorney.

County Employee Sues To Collect On Transcript

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transcript of testimony prepared. Hearing Set on Claim

Mrs. Handy's small claims suit against the county is to be heard in district court Nov. 27 at 1:30 p. m. It cost her a dollar to file the claim — a sum which would be repaid by the county if she makes her point in court.

The claim is based on a transcript of a portion of a forgery trial in which George Bevel was convicted of a 4-H summer school scholarship. The case was prosecuted by Robert Stults, former district attorney who was appointed to press the charge because Thompson was disqualified as he had at one time represented the defendant.

Following the forgery conviction, Stults filed a charge against Bevel alleging him to be an habitual criminal. Stults ordered the transcript — covering Bevel's admission of former felony convictions — for use in the habitual criminal trial.

When Mrs. Handy was refused payment for the transcript after two appearances before the county court, she marched into the district attorney's office and retrieved her hefty package of typed pages. It could be ransomed by payment of her bill, she informed secretaries in the D.A.'s office.

The dickering over the dependency hearing transcript took place during September and October. Next, Mrs. Handy turned in her \$2.40 bill which was returned with the notation by the county court that okay was refused because it was "duplicate payment for services of an employee."

This set the stage for the small claims suit with service of copies of the complaint on the district attorney and Charles Doerner, county clerk.

Restitution Ordered For Breaking Windows

A 14-year-old Roseburg boy who appeared in juvenile court Monday on a charge of window breaking was placed on probation and ordered to share restitution for damage with another boy.

The other lad previously appeared in court and was taken from his parents' home and placed in a foster home. The boys broke windows in a vacant house. Repairs cost \$53 which is to be repaid.

Big Three In Auto Industry Predict Aluminum Uses

WASHINGTON — The big three of the automotive industry predicts an increasing use of aluminum in the manufacture of their cars.

The forecasts were given to a House Small Business subcommittee Tuesday by spokesmen for General Motors, the Ford Motor Co., and the Chrysler Corp.

The subcommittee, describing the production of aluminum as a growth industry, is interested in seeking that small business is permitted to share in the benefits of increased aluminum capacity.

M. F. Garwood, Chrysler's chief engineer for materials, said the corporation's use of aluminum in its cars has increased from nine pounds a car in 1946 to 100 pounds in 1957.

During the comparable period, Garwood said, the total average industry use for each car increased from two pounds in 1946 to 45 pounds in 1957.

John J. Cronin, a General Motors vice president, told the subcommittee: "We believe that aluminum will be an important metal in the production of automobiles for many years to come."

He said "it is entirely possible" that the average use of the metal may increase to 75 pounds a car by 1965.

The new 1958 Ford uses an average of 48 pounds of aluminum — an increase of 50 per cent over those of 1955, said Earl Crawford, Ford vice president.

And, Crawford added, the estimated aluminum content of his company's 1959 car will increase approximately 10 per cent over 1958.

Bulganin Pledges Additional Aid For Egyptians

MOSCOW — Egypt's war minister, Maj. Gen. Abdel Hakim Amer, today carrying home a new Soviet agreement pledging economic and technical assistance to President Nasser's government.

Premier Bulganin announced the aid pledge at a Kremlin banquet last night honoring Amer, who has been conferring with Soviet leaders and visiting military installations.

Bulganin gave no details of what Russia will supply Egypt, saying only: "In response to the desires of the Egyptian government and President Nasser, the Soviet government has expressed its readiness to render Egypt economic and technical assistance in the development of her national economy."

It appeared likely that a Soviet mission would be sent to Cairo to work out details with the Nasser regime. This was the procedure followed after Syria's defense minister visited Moscow last August and obtained an aid pledge.

Water Sufficient
The North Umpqua River, he said, seldom carries less than 700 second-foot of water. A 200-ton unbleached pulp plant calls for 7½ to 8 million gallons per day or about 12 second feet, he said.

Clofelter also remarked that "reasonably satisfactory" ways of disposing of effluent were available, without polluting streams.

U. S. And France Agree On Plan For Tunis Arms

WASHINGTON — The United States and France reportedly have agreed to a plan for supplying Tunisia with Western arms in such a way that French troops can cool and they can catch up the Atlantic Alliance.

Diplomats said Secretary of State Dulles and French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau reached the agreement during a three-hour talk at the State Department yesterday.

Dulles and Pineau covered other topics, including France's two-year fight against Algerian rebels and President Eisenhower's proposals to breathe new life into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic presidential nominee in 1952 and 1956, sat in on the NATO part of the talks. Stevenson is acting as Democratic consultant on plans to strengthen NATO.

Officials said Dulles and Pineau agreed that Western arms given must not be permitted to fall into the hands of rebels in neighboring Algeria.

Bitter Cold Grips Eastern Oregon, Fog Hits In West

Bitter cold continued to grip parts of Eastern Oregon early Wednesday, as heavy fog hit the western part of the state and for a time closed Portland International Airport.

No new snow, however, was reported in the mountain passes Wednesday as a high pressure ridge along the coast diverted Pacific storms northward into Alaska.

The Highway Commission said all highways in the state either were clear or sand.

A minor front, though, dropped light rain on Southern Oregon early Wednesday.

The cold front that continued to grip Eastern Oregon sent the mercury plunging to 13 at Baker and 17 at Bend.

The mercury hovered above freezing early Wednesday in Western Oregon.

The Weather Bureau said that the temperature in the Western part of the state will drop to 28 Wednesday night. More fog also is expected, the bureau said.

East of the mountains a general low of 15 degrees is expected Wednesday night. In some high valleys the temperature will drop to 10 degrees, the bureau said.

Local Man's Driver's License Is Suspended

Following a court recommendation after conviction for traffic violations, the department suspended the license of James Carl Veiden, 26, 2448 W. Harvard Ave. for 30 days. The suspension Nov. 4 was recommended after a reckless driving conviction.

U. S. To Speed Up Helium Production For Missiles Use

WASHINGTON — The government is planning a major expansion of its helium production capacity to meet expanding needs in the missiles and other defense programs, it was learned today.

High-level planning also was reported under way to develop a comprehensive, long-range program aimed at future extraction of all possible helium from natural gas before it is used for fuel, with consequent waste forever of the helium content.

These developments were reported by Interior Department officials, who also said that recently printed designs of the Russian dog-carrying Sputnik showed that it contained a helium carrier. They said this may be an indication the Soviet Union is now producing helium in some quantity.

The Bureau of Mines operates this government's four helium plants at Exell and Amarillo, Tex., Shiprock, N.M., and Otis, Kan. These produce virtually all the helium available to the free world.

The missiles program is a major user of helium. The inert, non-explosive gas is also used in atomic energy work, in titanium and zirconium production, in electronics and in testing of refrigeration and air conditioning systems.

2 More Escapees Are Captured

MATTOON, Ill. — Two more of the seven prisoners who escaped from the Lake County, Ind., jail Monday were captured early today after some 60 police virtually clamped a lid on this town.

State, county and city police had thrown up roadblocks at every exit from this central Illinois community after the pair abandoned their car last night when police closed in on them at the southern edge of Mattoon.

George R. Brown, 25, East Gary, and Mack Dow Keith, 28, Gary, were captured a short time later. Keith on foot and Brown in a car he admitted stealing from a Mattoon cafe operator. Both surrendered without a struggle.

Three of the escapees were captured Monday, and two others remain at large. State police expressed doubt that the remaining two came to the Mattoon area.

Imprisonment Is Sought For Anastasia's Godson By Federal Government

NEW YORK — The federal government has taken steps to put Vincent J. Squillante, self-styled godson of murdered mobster Albert Anastasia and reputed garbage racket kingpin, in prison for the first time in his career.

The 5-foot-11 silent witness at last week's Senate hearings on gangster control of the garbage carting industry here was hauled into federal court Tuesday and charged with violating probation by consorting with known criminals and hoodlums. He also was accused of concealing his 1956 income from the federal probation department.

Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman set Monday for a hearing on a petition to revoke Squillante's probation. Bail was set at \$10,000, which the former fruit peddler posted.

Squillante, 40, has been on probation since 1953, when he pleaded guilty to a 1950 government charge of failing to file 1948 and 1949 income tax returns. He also received a \$1,000 fine and a suspended sentence.
