Big Major League Trade Is Brewing

DETROIT — The Detroit Tigers and the Kansas City Athletics today will announce a trade that may involve as many as 10 or 12 players.

Infielder Billy Martin and catcher Tim Thompson of the A's and center fielder Bill Tuttle and pitcher Duke Maas of the Tigers are reportedly included.

One Detroit official calls it "the biggest deal in our team's history."

The Tigers' biggest previous player transaction was an eight-player swap with Cleveland in 1953.

The deal is said to involve no cash.

It is likely the Tigers will give up Tuttle, a sharp fielding but weak hitting outfielder; Maas, a 26-year-old right-hander who has been an in-and-out for several seasons; and several other players. Possibilities are that utility player J. W. Porter and a catcher, either Bank House or Red Wilson, will be involved.

Martin, Thompson and veteran slugger Gus Zernial reportedly are headed for Detroit. The Tigers also are known to be interested in shortstop Joe DeMaestri.

Last week after a meeting between General Manager John J. McHale and Manager Jack Tighe's staff the Tigers said bluntly, "We are anxious to trade."

"We must trade," said McHale. "Even if some of our players improve, that still won't be enough. We have to make some moves."

The Tigers finished in fourth place last season, getting a first-division berth for the first time since 1950, although they failed to win as many games as they did in 1955, when they wound up in fifth place.

Cleveland, Kansas City Major Loop Trade Fails

CLEVELAND — Two trades involving the Cleveland Indians' Vic Wertz, Al Smith and Rocky Colavito for Kansas City infielders Billy Martin and Vic Power failed to come off Tuesday night, the Cleveland Plain Dealer reported.

Frank Lane, Indians' general manager, was quoted as saying for Martin trade was rejected by Arnold Johnson, president of the Kansas City Athletics. Smith is a speedy outfielder who spent part of last season at third base for Cleveland.

Lane said Johnson then asked for Wertz, a first baseman who batted .282 last season, and Colavito, a strong-armed outfielder, in exchange for Martin and Vic Power. Lane said he was reluctant to part with Colavito and would make no deal involving Power. Wertz would only be traded for a hard-hitting infielder, he added.

Kansas City is dickering with several other clubs including the Detroit Tigers. Lane quoted Johnson as saying, "Martin is the key man in the trade talk."

Lane was reached in Havana, Cuba, where he is meeting with Bobby Bragan, the Indians' field manager.

Evashevski's Retirement Comments Taken Lightly

WATERLOO, Iowa — Iowa Athletic Director Paul Brecher says he doesn't believe Forest Evashevski has any immediate plans to leave Iowa or to quit the coaching job.

When Evashevski remarked Sunday on a television show that "the coaching sands are running out in my hour glass," it gave rise to speculation that he may be planning to quit.

Brecher, in an informal talk to Waterloo sportsmen Tuesday night, commented:

"I thought when I heard him say that it was the result of his keen disappointment over the outcome of the Iowa-Ohio State game."

"Evy often has said publicly he would not grow to be an old man coaching."

"However, so far as getting out of coaching this year, I don't believe that means it."

"I hope he continues to coach for a long time, and I hope it's at Iowa."

Iowa, although tied by Michigan, suffered its only loss of the current season in a 17-13 game with Ohio State at Columbus, Ohio, last Saturday. Iowa plays Notre Dame at South Bend this Saturday in the season's finale.

The Ohio State loss knocked Iowa out of the Big Ten title and Evashevski, in his weekly television show, said:

"A coach only gets so many chances at a national title and it would have been great to bow out with a winner."

Evashevski, a former Washington State College coach, has seven years go on a 10-year contract at Iowa.

But Coast League problems, our spies report, are beginning to shake down into a mere dilemma. If you think the Northwest clubs are giving up just call the team office at Portland, Vancouver or Seattle and offer to buy a season ticket for 1958. Have your money ready.

Cagey Answers
Club officials are very cagey about answering questions. They insist they don't know what's going to happen, now that the Dodgers and Giants have moved west and busted up their loop. They're telling the truth, but nobody believes them.

You (and they) can look for the Coast League to open the 1958 season as a six-team circuit including the three Northwesters, Sacramento and San Diego, plus Phoenix. Denver may be added to make it seven, although numerous baseball technicians must be unraveled before the PCL can snatch Denver away from the American Association.

The Northwest trio isn't overly fond of Sacramento and San Diego and their small crowds—but neither do they like the idea of jumping clear to the Corn Belt for a schedule. The Sacramento situation may improve with a new stadium, construction of which was halted when the major league teams stole San Francisco and Los Angeles.
