The body has been removed to the Long & Orr Mortuary, Roseburg, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

A pretty doll that may be among her last toys has brought a flood of joy and laughter to a cancer-stricken two-year-old girl in a family caught by double misfortune at the holiday season.

Yellow-haired Teresa Postlewait lives in a world growing darker each day. Her tiny face is scarred by an operation that removed one eye last year. And a swelling shows the operation didn't remove all the cancerous growth.

"I called the doctor in Portland," her mother said. "He said nothing could be done."

Teresa's father, Harold Postlewait, sat uncomfortably in a straight chair. He's been disabled since he broke a vertebra in an accident more than a year ago—shortly after the family had made a down payment on a house.

"The doctor won't tell me," said the father, "when I can go back to work."

Mrs. Postlewait and Teresa's four older sisters and a brother work when they can. Even Eugene, 12, and Nina, 9, help by selling newspapers.

Carol Lund, Walla Walla Union-Bulletin reporter, visited the family a few days ago.

"What would you like to have, Teresa," she asked as she left.

"Big doll," the girl replied.

Spencer was arrested after a stakeout federal agent saw him take his bedroll from the frame house. He said he was clearing out because "I got scared."

His fear started one night this week when he saw someone prowling around, he told officers.

Confiscated by the federal officers was Spencer's 1951 pickup truck. There was a bottle of the moonshine whiskey in the vehicle, the agents said.

Spencer will be prosecuted on charges of operating an unregistered distillery and being in possession of untaxed liquor. He was lodged overnight in the Douglas County jail and was taken to Portland this morning where he will be arraigned before a U.S. Commissioner.

Communism's Top Leaders Issue Mobilization Orders For Next Supremacy Wave

Communism's top leaders have issued mobilization orders for the next wave of their war for world supremacy. They have demanded complete unity of action and purpose from all Communists to protect the Soviet Union from interference as it spearheads the new phase of the global drive.

This is the essence of the communistic produced in Moscow after several weeks of talks by the rulers of the Communist world. All the rest is jargon, intended to conceal the real aim behind the meetings.

The communistic restates many of the principles laid down by V.I. Lenin for furthering the world revolution, with minor embellishments to bring these principles in line with the facts of life in a world threatened by nuclear bombs and long range nuclear warhead missiles.

But the real unity it calls for is not unity of the left wing, but military discipline for all Communist Parties in the world. The communistic is directed at communists, not at Social Democrats in other countries, as was the case before World War II when Stalin sought to protect himself from rising fascist power by the creation of popular fronts in the West.

The stage, thus, is being set for what might be called the fifth wave of world revolution. The first came with the Russian revolution in 1917 and the establishment of the Communist International as a world staff. The second came with the popular front drive in the mid-1930s. The third came with the installation of Red governments by Soviet arms as a result of the war. The fourth wave was marked by the Soviet smiles offensive which led to the Geneva summit conference of chiefs of government.

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Accused Slayer Of 2 Policemen Is Captured

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)—"I'm Wetzel. I was in an asylum in New York for awhile."

A dozen words spoken by a man serving 30 days in jail for vagrancy. But they spelled his last night to a week-long nationwide manhunt for Frank Edward Wetzel, mental institution escapee sought in the killing of two North Carolina state patrolmen.

Wetzel confirmed his identity after fingerprints on file with the FBI were matched with those taken from a stolen car parked near an alley where he was arrested here Tuesday night.

Wetzel had been the object of an intense manhunt since Nov. 14, when his prints were taken from another stolen car—one of several found along a trail leading from the scene of the double slaying in North Carolina.

The governor of Mississippi called out the National Guard after Wetzel, 36, escaped from the Willard, N. Y., mental institution Oct. 21. Wetzel had announced that he intended to free his brother, William, 37, who is under a death sentence in the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman.

Wetzel originally had been arrested Sept. 26 and charged with the burglary of a Batavia, N. Y., gun shop. He had been sent to the mental institution for observation.

Dave Beck Irate Over Charges Against Junior

SEATTLE (AP)—An irate Dave Beck Sr. Thursday told a King County Superior Court jury trying his son for grand larceny "my boy has not done anything wrong."

Beck's statement, shouted from the witness stand during a duel of words with Deputy Prosecutor Lawrence D. Regal, came after Regal had asked the president of the Teamsters Union if "you were testifying in this fashion because your boy is on trial."

Young Beck is charged with misappropriating the proceeds from the sale of two union-owned automobiles. His father is scheduled to go on trial Dec. 2 on similar charges. A total of about \$6,600 is involved in the charges against both Becks.

The tiff between Beck Sr. and Regal was touched off when Regal asked Beck to question Beck closely about his testimony before the grand jury which indicted Beck and his son and testimony given by Beck during direct examination.

Apparently miffed because Beck repeatedly shied away from giving strict yes and no answers, Regal asked sharply if it was because Beck's son was on trial that Beck was "testifying in this fashion."

"My boy has not done anything wrong," Beck shot back as his son's defense attorney, Charles S. Burdell, attempted to squeeze in a few calming words.

"I certainly will testify to the truth about my boy," Beck said. "I certainly will stand back of my boy. What he did was at my order, and if anybody was wrong I was wrong."

Earlier Beck had backed up completely his son's story that young Beck had sold the cars at his father's orders and had given the money to Fred Verschuere Jr., bookkeeper for Teamsters Union Joint Council 28 here. Verschuere has testified the money is in the union's vault.

At least the first day was expected to be spent in picking the jury.
