

Sutherlin School Children Given Free Dental Exams

A two-year effort by Sutherlin PTA groups and citizens resulted this week in free dental examinations for Sutherlin Elementary School children.

Mrs. Bernice Smith, public health nurse in Sutherlin, said the program came about after application was made to the state Board of Health last spring. She said the PTA and interested individuals have striven for such a program for nearly two years.

Two dentists, including Dr. David Witter, director of dental health for the state Board of Health, are engaged in the program at Sutherlin. Assisting Witter is a Sutherlin dentist, Dr. Clifford Hein.

Witter said the program, completed at two Oregon locations and slated for five more cities, consists of examination only. After the examination, referral cards are sent to the parents of the children.

Would Curtail Tooth Decay

The objectives of the program, said Witter, are to curtail tooth decay and overcome poor dental hygiene.

Scientists Present Dream Of Future At Symposium

NEW YORK (AP) — Eight top scientists predicted Friday that science will create these thrills during the next hundred years: You'll be able to control the size, shape and function of your body. You'll talk with your mind, never moving your lips.

There'll be lavish excursions to hotels at scenic spots on the moon. The lunar surface will be subdivided among nations.

We'll be working a 4 to 8 hour week. You'll be able to pick the sex of your child and decide whether you want twins, triplets or just one.

Food From Sunshine

"We'll make food out of sunshine. Our raw materials and drinking water will come from the sea.

There'll be more than seven billion people in the world. But none of them will go hungry. Our mail will come in the form of radio signals carried by satellites high above the earth.

These were just some of the remarkable developments for the future dreamed up by eight scientific experts including two Nobel Prize winners, at a symposium here on "The Next Hundred Years." It marked the centennial of the industrial firm of Joseph E. Seagram & Sons, Inc.

Among the scientists were Dr.

Wernher Von Braun, director of development operations for the Army Ballistic Missile Agency at Huntsville, Ala.

Control Substances

Dr. John Weir, associate professor of psychology at the California Institute of Technology, said man should be able to learn to control the substance that governs the size of organs and systems.

By this means, he said, man could alter himself, make himself more efficient. He should be able to transmit thought to another person, without using words and gestures, he added.

Dr. Hermann J. Muller, Nobel Prize winning geneticist of Indiana University, predicted young couples could almost order their children. He said ailing or aged persons could have diseased or damaged organs replaced, from a spare parts bank.

Dr. Harrison Brown, professor of geochemistry at California Institute of Technology, said automation in the next hundred years would eliminate the difference between skilled and unskilled labor. He predicted we'd be down to a 4 to 8 hour week by then.

Dr. James Bonner, professor of biology from the California Institute of Technology, predicted deserts would be irrigated by purified sea water, and the world would go on a vegetable diet because of its huge population.
