The high school winners, selected by the three central Douglas County chapters, are Ronnie Lake, a senior from Canyonville Bible Academy; Sally Hill, a junior from Roseburg High School; and Barbara Clark, a senior from Yoncalla Union High School.

For his "Voice of Democracy" script, Lake won a trophy and his school won a plaque for having the highest percentage of the student body participating.

COLOMBO, Ceylon — A fresh wave of labor unrest spread across the island Monday.

A strike threat by a Communist dockworkers union alarmed political leaders.

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The Communist-controlled harbor workers union threatened to call out its dockhands for work and to persuade others to join in a sympathy strike.

The communists have been trying to hold down the strike movement lest it topple Ceylon's government, which is friendly to the Soviet Union.

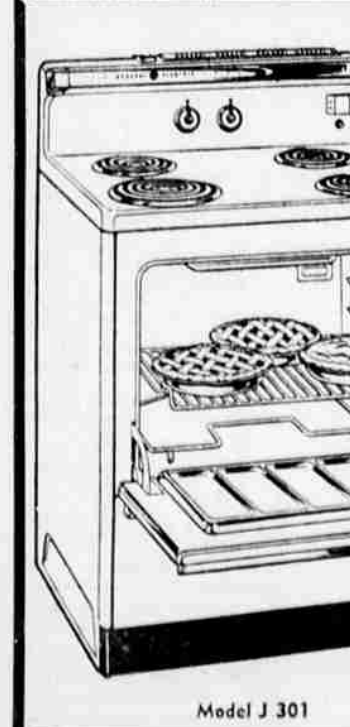

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Landslide Toll Listed At Seven; 25 Others Flee

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. — With seven persons already dead in the mud and rock of a gigantic mountain slide here, 25 persons fled their homes Sunday as a steady, drenching rain brought the threat of new slides.

A pounding rain — five inches in 36 hours — driven by gale winds tore the top off a small mountain Friday noon and swept three homes and eight persons into a nearby creek. Only one person, an 18-month-old girl, was saved. Searchers still probed the slide for the bodies of six of the seven dead.

The homes were at the base of 2,300-foot Mt. Hayes on the outskirts of this British Columbia coastal city when the slide struck them.

Trees Start First

"First of all, the trees started to slide about 1,000 feet up the mountain, then she gained speed and started to pile up like a big snowball," said John W. Krug, shovel operator who witnessed the tragedy.

"It was 50 feet deep when it hit the houses and just pushed them ahead and crumpled them and buried them."

The miraculous rescue of Selma Murray, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Murray who died in the slide, was told by Lee Intermela, a truck driver.

"I heard a child crying," he said. "We had been blocked off by the slide and we had to go through the woods to the creek where the houses had been pushed. I saw a hand sticking up out of the water and when I tore some shingles and debris away I saw the baby sitting there as if she had been carried down in a crib or something."

The baby suffered from shock and cuts but her condition was described as good.

Jordan Demands Removal Of U. S. Truce Observer

JERUSALEM — Israeli charged Syrian troops opened fire again Monday on Israeli civilians near the Syrian border.

Israeli spokesmen said there were no casualties. They added that the shootings occurred near a border area where an Israeli field worker was killed Sunday.

The Israeli charges said the Syrians penetrated Israeli territory near Dan village and fired on persons within the settlement.

Meanwhile, Jordanian authorities returned the bodies of two Israelis killed in Jordan last week. Israel said the victims were hikers.

The new shooting incidents were the latest in a series of border clashes that started last week.

Demand Removal

In an atmosphere of increasing tension, a demand from Jordan for the removal of U. S. Marine Col. Byron Leary as acting U. N. truce observer threatened to break down the mediation of disputes along the Jordan-Israeli border.

Jordan's demand for Leary's removal apparently was prompted by the officer's mediation efforts in an Israeli convoy incident last week which touched off a series of border clashes.

Jordan charged the Israelis violated the armistice agreement by sending a convoy with highly flammable benzene to a hospital in the Mt. Scopus demilitarized area within the Arab part of Jerusalem.

Israel then asked to negotiate with Jordan, citing a section of the armistice agreement applying to the movement of traffic on roads in the Bethlehem - Jordan area.

Leary relayed the request. Jordan rejected it.

Refusal To Answer Series Of Related Questions Ruled Single Contempt By Court

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court ruled 6-3 Monday that a witness's refusal to answer a series of related questions constitutes a single contempt.

The court so decided in upholding the criminal contempt conviction of Mrs. Oleta O'Connor Yates, a California Communist leader. The contempt charge followed her refusal to answer questions while on trial in 1952 with 13 others on Smith Act charges.

The questions dealt with Communist Party affiliation of her co-defendants.

All 14 were convicted of conspiring to teach and advocate violent overthrow of the government. But the Supreme Court last June ordered acquittal for five of the group but left open for the government to re-try the remaining nine, including Mrs. Yates.

Separate Appeal

Mrs. Yates filed a separate appeal from her contempt conviction. She had been sentenced to a year in prison for each of 11 separate refusals to answer questions, but U. S. Judge William C. Clegg said she would have to serve more than one year for contempt.

While it upheld the contempt conviction Monday, the Supreme Court said she should have been sentenced for a single criminal contempt, rather than 11.

Accordingly the court sent the case back to Judge Mathes in Los Angeles for reconsideration of her sentence.

Accused Murderer Sought After Escaping Jail

GOLDEN, Colo. — Discouraged officers said today they had no trace since Friday noon of Albert Kostal, 37, accused slayer who escaped from the Jefferson County jail Thursday night.

Kostal and Arthur Watson, 30, brandished a dummy gun made of soap to bull their way out of jail in this suburban town 13 miles west of Denver. They were charged with murder in the shooting of a merchant policeman at Wheat Ridge, Colo., last Dec. 9.

Watson was recaptured a few hours later in South Denver, where their stolen car crashed.

Kostal escaped by forcing a householder to drive him to downtown Denver. Kostal was armed with a real pistol by this time.

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Sputnik Still Up In Space, Despite Earlier Reports

WASHINGTON — U.S. scientists prepared today to feed new sighting data into an electronic brain in an effort to predict more accurately when Sputnik I's rocket carrier will fall.

Predictions during the weekend that the rocket's fall was imminent were not borne out. One British astronomer who had made such a prediction revised it to say the rocket is expected to last for several days.

Last night, the rocket was sighted by skywatchers over northeastern United States.

Dr. John White, staff scientist at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass., said those and other sighting reports would be used in a new computation of the rocket's present orbit.

White said the new data, fed into an electronic brain at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, may present a more accurate forecast of when the rocket will take its fatal plunge.

Some scientists have expressed a belief that Sputnik I, a 184-pound sphere, will stay in course for several weeks longer than its carrier rocket because the drag on it is much less than on the rocket.

Estimates are the rocket, now traveling closer to the earth than Sputnik I, has covered more than 20 million miles. The rocket carried the world's first earth satellite into orbit on Oct. 4. A second Soviet satellite was fired aloft Nov. 3 with a dog as a passenger. There has been no definite prediction when Sputnik II will drop.

Considerable excitement was generated Friday night when British Prof. A. C. Lovell announced the rocket's end might be only a short time away. Lovell is director of the Jodrell Bank station, which boasts the world's largest radio telescope, which has been tracking the space travelers.

Observer Sees Object Traveling Toward Moon

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — A report by a Swedish officer of a shining object traveling on a spiral course toward the moon was under examination at Sweden's defense headquarters Monday.

"The best guess so far seems to be it might have something to do with Russian satellite or missile experiments," a staff spokesman said.

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point at the upper side of Illumination Rock, a familiar landmark on the mountain's west face.

"They reported by radio to Jack Grauer, co-ordinating the search for the Mountain Rescue and Safety Council, that they immediately came upon tracks heading upward and assumed them to be those of Palmer and Lovin."

Yokum Ridge was described by Grauer as one in which "volcanic mud holds the rocks together. Very Poor stuff with extremely steep slopes."

Deep crevasses cut through the glacier, which lies on the path to the ridge.

The route over the ridge is the only one on Mt. Hood which never has been scaled, Grauer said.

He said the good visibility was helpful in aerial scanning of the mountain slopes.

Even the young climbers—both of them familiar with the mountain—set out Sunday, the day was clear. Toward noon, clouds drifted over and in the afternoon rain and snow fell. The freezing level dropped to 8,500 feet at night. The area around Yokum Ridge is above that elevation.

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Heavy Snow Hits Texas Areas Sunday

DALLAS — A snow called the heaviest in 30 years struck deep into western and southern Texas over the weekend, stalling traffic, spreading beneficial moisture and giving the kids a thrill.

A record 14 inches of snow paralyzed Concho County in lower west central Texas Sunday. An estimated 300 motorists were stranded, jamming cafes and the two hotels in Eden, Tex.

Laredo on the Mexican border had its first snow in a dozen years. The tomato crop around Laredo was ruined and the chill weather nipped at winter vegetables in the lush lower Rio Grande Valley area at the southern tip of Texas, but it was too early to assess damage.

Constable A. C. Paris of Eden said 200 vehicles were marooned between Eden and San Angelo. No loss of life was reported nor were any motorists hospitalized.

Paris said all highways were reopened and all the stranded motorists on their way by noon yesterday.

Eden Weather Bureau observer G. H. Stiser said it was the most snow he had seen in 30 years on the job there.

Stiser said he thought sleep may have suffered but said there would be no loss to grain crops in the area. The snow melted rapidly as temperatures rose to the low 50s.

Mohammed V Welcomed On Arrival Here

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower warmly welcomed Mohammed V of Morocco on a state visit Monday, declaring he hopes the King's trip here would "result in strengthening relations between the two countries."

Eisenhower, who has scheduled two long talks with the royal guest, welcomed him to Washington's National Airport to meet him. Also on hand were Gen. Nathan Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, an honor guard and a large diplomatic delegation.

The 48-year-old King, wearing a long hooded coat and a jellaba, told the President he was certain American-Moroccan relations would be reinforced by the visit.

The king got the full "red carpet" treatment. He had flown here directly from Rabat.

During the next three days, the Moroccan King and an entourage of 17 persons including his ranking cabinet members will discuss with American officials a series of matters including U. S. military and economic aid, U. S. bases in Morocco and France's bitter dispute with Algeria.

Must Accept Danger

"We must accept the danger," he said. "The danger of not cooperating would be greater."

In urging greater exchange of information with U. S. allies, Teller said that when the United States had an atomic monopoly "it is a fact that some of our secrets leaked to Russia."

"I would not suggest the Russians caught up with us because they stole secrets," he said. "They caught up with us because they worked harder."

It is best not to think that the Soviets are bluffing, he added.

Teller said that Russia's launching of the Sputniks shows that the Soviet Union "is very far along in rocket development."

These launchings, he testified, "have great military significance," as well as tremendous scientific significance.

Teller is a University of California scientist who played a major part in the development of the H-bomb.

scientific needs can be accelerated by closer cooperation among the armed services, among companies working on the missile programs and among companies which could be brought into the program, and by cooperation and sharing of secrets not only with Great Britain but with other NATO countries and with other allies.

Teller said there was some "danger" in sharing secrets with other countries, but said that in view of Russian advances and scientific knowledge this was not a danger such as might be the case in a field in which the United States has a monopoly.
