

Problems Facing Planning Commission Told Chamber By Douglas Co. Coordinator

Various problems facing the Douglas County Planning Commission were presented to the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce by Bruce Elmgren, county planning coordinator, during the chamber's weekly forum luncheon at the Umpqua Hotel Monday.

Elmgren cited situations that have developed as a result of poor planning. He pointed to the Roseburg Airport as a good example. The airport shows had planning, he said, and the mill located at the south end of the field is a hazard to planes.

The residential area on the perimeter of the airport has suffered also, he said. Property values of homes in this area have decreased 10 per cent due to their proximity to the field.

On Luring Industry

On the subject of luring new industry into the Roseburg vicinity, he cited the work being done by a Cleveland, Ohio, electric power company in planning future development.

The company holds workshops to help communities promulgate good planning programs, Elmgren said. The company is interested in community planning because it has discovered it can serve power more economically to a well-planned area.

A second point this and other

companies are interested in, he said, is to get a stable labor force, and this is easier to achieve in a well-planned community than in an area that has grown in a perfunctory manner.

Elmgren also pointed out the initiative Reedsport has taken in cooperating with the State Dept. of Planning and Development for development of that community.

Various organizations, businesses and individuals in the Reedsport area recently sent letters to the department offering aid in any surveys to be made in that area.

Advised To Follow Plan
Roseburg would be wise to follow a similar plan of action, Elmgren said, adding, "We should welcome new industry by having well planned areas."

Peter Serafin, former chairman of the Roseburg city planning commission, told the group a coordinator or coordination group was needed as liaison between the county commission and the city commission to make sure both organizations are "pulling together" on development problems.

Serafin said Julius Jensen, director of the State Dept. of Planning and Development, recently requested information on industrial sites in this area. Roseburg should take advantage of this request, he said, and enjoin the state planning department to make a thorough study of this area, otherwise the information imparted will be incomplete.

No more forum lunches have been scheduled until after the first of the year.

Macmillan Fails To Iron Out All Of Rift

PARIS — British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and French Premier Felix Gaillard ended their two days of talks Tuesday but apparently did not succeed in smoothing over completely the basic differences that brought them together.

The two leaders were anxious to remove a thorn in the NATO alliance — the British-American supply of small arms to Tunisia which the French fear will wind up in the hands of Algerian rebels.

A communique said the two leaders agreed "that responsibility for a solution of the Algerian question lies with France."

But a spokesman said this did not mean Britain had agreed not to deliver any more arms to Tunisia.

However, the communique by Frenching the premier's "conviction to discharge her special responsibilities in North Africa where she has traditionally a leading position" was placating to this country.

A spokesman added that no special new machinery had been set up for consultation between the two countries.

The communique announced that the two ministers also agreed there should be a more precise definition of interdependence and solidarity of the NATO allies "in accordance with the spirit of equality" at the NATO summit meeting here in mid-December.

This was a reference to French fears that plans for pooling allied resources and knowledge to meet the threat of Soviet missiles and satellites would give to Britain and the United States predominance in nuclear power and assign inferior roles to the other members.

Standing with Gaillard in the Hotel Matignon, where the talks ended, Macmillan told newsmen: "I think we have made great progress. But of course there are a number of problems for the future."

Both premiers were almost stony faced.

ized cloud" which was visible hundreds of miles.

The purpose of the test, Domenic said, was to determine what effect such a cloud might have on radio transmission.

He said ham operators across the Western United States attempted to beam their radio waves at the cloud. He said reports from the ham operators will be filed with authorities at the missile development center.

Ham operators participating were spread from California to the Mississippi River and from the Canadian to the Mexican borders, Domenic said.

The Stanford Research Institute was a participant in the experiment along with the Air Force.

The spectacular orange cloud, accented by the rays of the sun striking it, was seen over a wide area of the Southwest by early risers.

Reports of sightings by early risers poured into radio stations and newspapers in several states.

Snark Missile Fired From Cape Canaveral

MISSILE TEST CENTER, Cape Canaveral, Fla. — A missile believed to be Snark was fired Tuesday from this test center.

The Snark is essentially a jet-powered pilotless bomber. It travels at about 600 miles per hour and has a range of around 3,000 miles.

There was no further word on reports that a third attempt will be made at launching the Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile.

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Juvenile Court Finds Youth To Be Incurable

One of three youths accused of burglarizing a Reedsport grocery store recently was found incurable in juvenile court Monday and will be treated as an adult.

Thomas Allen Dorsey, 17, Reedsport, who had been remanded to juvenile court on a charge of burglarizing the store, was ordered held in jail pending further action on the felony charge.

Two other boys, 16 years of age, faced with the same charge, were committed to McLaren School for Boys. Both had previous juvenile court records and one had recently been released from McLaren.

The trio was accused of taking money, fountain pens and watches from the store after breaking a window. A 16-year-old from Scottsburg said he was the only one to enter the store. His companions said they had waited for him across the street.

In other juvenile court action, two boys were released from probation. One was a 16-year-old Roseburg youth placed on probation in June for larceny of an automobile. The other had been on probation since June 1956 for stealing hub caps.

Probation of a 16-year-old Winston boy for burglarizing a fruit stand was continued. He had been given a 60-day trial probationary period in a Sept. 16 court appearance.

up three hours later. Six exhibits were put on display by Scott, illustrating the location of Douglas Veneer and including several copies of telephone lists of workers' names and other personnel items.

The argument Monday, as Card was cross-examined, was directed by Roll toward determining what is the position that Douglas Veneer Co. holds in corporate relation to Roseburg Lumber Co. Although Card admitted that an "informal atmosphere" prevailed in meetings where decisions affecting both companies were concerned, he maintained that they were separate entities.

He did point out, however, that whatever course was taken at Roseburg Lumber Co. usually followed at Douglas Veneer.

Workers Observe Line

On the strike date of Aug. 12, most Douglas Veneer workers did not cross picket lines. After the strike action had been instigated at Roseburg Lumber Co., it was testified.

Several other arguments were also raised in the opening session, mainly concerned with the disposition of the loss from both companies into the Douglas Veneer fund, the ownership of property around Douglas Veneer, the sale of green veneer by Roseburg Lumber to the area during the strike and the credibility of Card's remarks in speaking of the two companies he represents.

Card took extremely strong exception to this when questioned once by Roll, observing that the "practices of the company" and his "own thinking" were "synonymous."

Referring the hearing is Aubrey S. Tussing, Salem, while the unemployment commission counsel is F. J. Bradshaw, also Salem.

Soldier Charged With Strangulation Of Sailor's Wife

YOKOHAMA, Japan — The U. S. Army Tuesday charged Specialist 3c Gregory J. Kupski of Detroit with the strangulation death Nov. 17 of the Japanese wife of an American sailor.

An Army spokesman said a legal opinion would be required to determine whether the Army or Japanese authorities have jurisdiction over the case. A jurisdictional dispute in the William S. Girard case reached the U. S. Supreme Court.

Kupski was charged with unpremeditated murder of Kazuo Eikawa, 25, the wife of Robert Leslie Wescot. Officials at China Lake Naval Base in California said Wescot had been trying since he returned from Japan more than a year ago to bring her to the states.

Confesses Slaying
The Army says Kupski confessed killing the woman, who was found strangled with a blouse button in the neck. The Army charge carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment.

Japanese prosecutor Kishiro Katataka said he was investigating the case "on the assumption that Japan has primary jurisdiction over the soldier." Japanese police recommended Monday that Kupski be indicted for murder, a charge in Japan carrying from three years in prison to a death penalty.

The Army claims jurisdiction on the ground that the murder involved a U. S. soldier and the dependent of another American, although the spokesman said "the charge would have been filed anyway" had Miss Eikawa not been married to Wescot.

more planes, more men and more money.

In giving his opinion of present U. S. strength as compared to Russia, Doolittle said he does not believe the Russians have any weapon which will match this country's air-to-air missiles, including those with nuclear warheads.

Such missiles are fired from a plane at another plane. He said he thinks SAC is "ahead in capability" of Russia's manned bomber force. But he said the Russians probably are ahead in defense against air attack.

At one point in his testimony, Doolittle suggested that this country may have to come to a single military service.

Need For Rapid Decision

He had been stressing the necessity in this time of the hydrogen bomb for rapid decisions.

"Some day a rapid, proper decision will be the difference between surviving and not surviving," he said.

Such other opinions Doolittle gave the senators:

There are too many ups and downs in the U. S. budget over the years, causing the alternate starting and stopping of research and other projects with much attendant waste.

In the field of air defense, "we certainly need improved radar" and an extension of the SAGE system. SAGE is the Air Force's new rapid intercommunication system.

An improved educational system and spending of more funds for basic research is needed.

D.A. Convinced Gein Did Raid Cemetery Graves

WAUTOMA, Wis. — Dist. Atty. Earl Kileen says excavation of two graves convinces him that Edward Gein actually did raid cemeteries for parts of nine bodies found in his farm home.

Wautoma County authorities reopened two graves in the Plainfield Cemetery to check the story of the 41-year-old bachelor.

Gein, who is undergoing 30 days of mental observation, admitted killing two women and robbing the graves of nine other women.

He is charged with first-degree murder in the death Nov. 18 of Mrs. Bernice Worden, 58, a hardware store operator. He also admitted killing Mrs. Mary Hogan, a tavernkeeper, Dec. 9, 1954.

Authorities opened the graves of Mrs. Eleanor Adams and Mrs. Mary Everson, both buried in 1931. Their names were on the list of women whose graves Gein said he looted.

Mrs. Adams' casket was empty. The other coffin also was empty. But Kileen said a few bones and a small prying bar were found in the dirt above the empty casket.

Japanese Students March On Embassy

TOKYO — Seventy Japanese students marched on the U. S. Embassy today and demonstrated against the ouster of leftist Kammeiro Senaga as mayor of Haha, Okinawa.

The chanting, placard waving demonstrators were blocked 30 yards in front of the embassy gate by 150 Japanese policemen.

There was no violence. Three students were admitted into the embassy and handed a statement to political officer Martin Herz protesting "antidemocratic policy of ousting Naha's mayor," and "nuclear bases in Okinawa."

In Okinawa, President Moriarty Tomihara of the Bank of the Ryukyus predicted that within two or three days the United States would release civic reconstruction funds frozen since Senaga's election in 1956.

Fred Campbell Reed, a resident of Drain for the past one and a half years, died at the Cottage Grove hospital Sunday at the age of 85.

Sputnik I's Final Stage Rocket May Plunge Sunday

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — The final-stage rocket that launched Sputnik I, history's first man-made satellite, may make a flaming plunge to its death next Sunday, Dr. Fred L. Whipple, director of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, said Tuesday.

Dr. Whipple said Sunday is the most likely day, although it may be a day earlier or a day later.

The calculations were based on new moonwatch sightings reported Monday night and the day before from more than 85 stations in the United States. The new calculation advances the expected day for the death of the Russian rocket by more than a week. The observatory had originally estimated it be within the period of three days either side of Dec. 11.

Excellent Opportunity
Observers in the United States should have an excellent opportunity to see the rocket-satellite after sunset Tuesday night, and for the next two or three days, a spokesman said.

Tuesday night's third passage will begin near Bellingham, Wash., about 4:48 p.m. PST and be near Boise, Idaho, and Gallup, N. M., before the rocket leaves the country near El Paso, Tex., at 4:53 p.m.

Wednesday night's third passage will begin near Astoria, Ore., at 4:32 p.m. PST and be seen near Lovelock and Las Vegas, Nev., before the rocket leaves the United States five minutes later near Nogales, Ariz.

Dr. Whipple said the rocket should burst into flames when it hits the denser atmosphere about 35 to 40 miles above the earth and will make a spectacular sight if the final plunge comes at night.

Since the low point of the rocket-satellite's orbit around the world is in the Northern Hemisphere, there is a greater possibility that it will fall in the "upper" half of the world, Dr. Whipple said.

Launched Oct. 4 by Russia when it fired Sputnik I into an orbit, the rocket always has been a more brilliant object for viewers than the sphere, Sputnik. Although its dimensions have never been officially announced, Smithsonian officials assume it is about as large as Sputnik II, which the Soviets said weighs more than half a ton.

In a trial before the judge, Alpha Louise Morat, 27, Portland, who had pleaded innocent was found guilty. She was sentenced to ten days in jail and fined \$150.

Grace E. Hunt, 39, Oakland, changed her plea from innocent to guilty and received the same sentence and fine. She was given credit for seven days served in jail since her arraignment.

Eldred Lipscomb Jr., 32, Glendale, pleaded guilty to drunken driving and received the usual ten-day sentence and \$150 fine. He was arrested Sunday on Glendale Road by state police.

Appearing on a charge of being drunk on a public highway, Loyd Windel Whitaker, 46, Portland, was fined \$50. A companion, Thomas Edward Jones, 62, Portland, was handed a \$25 fine.

After serving with a suspended license, Billy Wallace McClain, 22, Winston, was fined \$70. He pleaded guilty to driving in July although his operator's license had been suspended April 2. McClain was arrested by Winston police.

Peter B. Kyne, Fiction Writer Of West, Dies

SAN FRANCISCO — Peter B. Kyne, who wrote today's best seller of big business dealings in ships and timber, died Monday at the Ft. Miles Veterans Administration Hospital here. He was 77.

Kyne's best known fictional character was Cappy Ricks, whose prototype was reputed to be the last Capt. Robert Dollar. Dollar founded the steamship line now operating as American President Lines.

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
