

Robert LaFollette, Relative Of Wisconsin's Political Figure, Teaches At Sutherlin

Charles LaFollette, a relative of one of the more controversial figures in 20th Century American politics, now is residing in Sutherlin, where he teaches English and vocal music at Sutherlin High School.

The Douglas County man is related to the late Sen. Robert LaFollette Sr., founder of the now defunct Progressive Party. His paternal grandfather was a first cousin of the famed politician.

The 28-year-old Army veteran hails from Colfax, Wash. Married and the father of a two-year-old daughter, he has taught at Sutherlin High since September.

Although he says he doesn't take an active interest in politics himself, he related some interesting tidbits concerning the late Wisconsin senator and other relatives who were prominent in politics.

These include his father, Warren, who was active in politics on the state level in Washington state; his grandfather, William, a Republican representative during World War I; Robert LaFollette Jr., the senatorial predecessor of Sen. Joe McCarthy; and Robert Senior's other son, Philip, a former Wisconsin governor.

The Sutherlin man also revealed how, in the family's opinion, Robert Sr. saved the life of his son. During the pre-World War I days, related LaFollette, Robert Sr. was being harassed in the press and hanged in effigy because of his opposition to declaration of war.

Meanwhile, Robert Jr. had been stricken with a very serious throat infection. "While all this derogatory publicity was going on, Robert Sr. was at his son's bedside trying to pull him through," said LaFollette.

"The family believes that the senator literally saved his son's life through sheer determination not to let him die."

Later, Robert Jr. became a Republican senator from Wisconsin. He was defeated for re-election in 1946 by McCarthy.

But, said Douglas County's LaFollette, "I believe he lost to McCarthy because he didn't campaign extensively at home. He was involved in his work in Washington, D.C."

"It's well-known that Robert Jr. was not the great man that his father was, but I believe that he had the best interests of the country at heart," concluded LaFollette.

Broken Toy Leads To Double Shooting
SIDNEY, Ohio — Chester Daugherty, 34, an unemployed construction worker, shot his wife, Flora, 36, to death, then killed himself late Tuesday night in an argument over a broken Christmas toy for one of their four children, police said.

According to accounts from relatives and friends, police said, Daugherty and his wife were wrapping Christmas presents when Daugherty broke one. He and his wife began arguing, and Daugherty left to go drinking.

He returned home later, police reported, and the argument resumed. Daugherty reached for a shotgun, shot his wife in the stomach, and then fired into his own temple, officers said.

The two died shortly afterward in Wilson Memorial Hospital here. Their children, ranging in age from 4 to 7, saw the shootings, police said.

Grocers Reject Sunday Closing At Meet Here.
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session. Several of the small store owners contended that shelf prices of many supermarket items are under wholesale prices.

"We have to carry this on like any war—seven days a week," said Webster.

Representatives of two big markets in Roseburg, Archie White of Safeway and Herb Tolman of City Drive in Market, indicated they were willing to close if other stores in town do. L. E. Medford, from Mark's Market said his store had already closed. Lester Nielsen of Nielsen's Market said he thought "no material loss in net profit" would be noticed by a closure on Sunday.

One man who owns a small store also pooh-poohed the idea of a loss of profit from Sunday closures. He said he had been in the grocery business 20 years and "I've never missed a meal. You make it up on Saturday and Monday," he contended.

Vote Split
When it came time to vote on a proposal that stores in Roseburg close for a three-month period to determine if profits would be sliced, the split was almost even among those willing to vote. Those in favor numbered six and those against five. To bring about a closure, all would have had to vote in favor.

Those who opposed the plan, however, did make the concession that they would meet again to discuss the matter if a similar Sunday closure move now being promoted in the Albany-Lebanon-Corvallis area went into effect.

O. L. Hinnicutt, owner of the South-Southwest Market, said this would help bring a cut in profits results from Sunday closures.

The Rev. Mr. Morgan said he would urge a study of the results if the stores in that area do start closing Sundays.

Those voting against the closure in Roseburg also snatched any Sunday closure on a broad scale in Oakland, Sutherlin and Myrtle Creek. The Rev. Mr. Morgan said stores in those areas had been contacted and had indicated they would "go along" with any decision at the Roseburg meeting.

Russia Said Indicating Willingness To Resume Talks On Disarmament

OTTAWA — The Canadian Press says it has been learned that Russia has indicated privately to Western nations it may be willing to resume disarmament negotiations next spring.

Authoritative informants said the Soviet Union gave the understanding to some members of the U.N. Disarmament Commission but stressed that Moscow could countermand the move.

The informants said the Russians gave the impression they want to conduct negotiations exclusively with the United States and would go over the heads of the commission, of which Canada is a member, if they could get U.S. agreement for direct disarmament talks.

The Russians have announced publicly they will not participate in deliberations of the commission, recently increased by the U.N. Assembly from 11 to 25 members.

But privately they indicated they might be prepared to resume the negotiations in four or five months if they do not get agreement for direct U.S. talks.

Weyerhaeuser Mill Closed By Strike

RAYMOND, Wash. — A walk-out of 222 workers in a dispute over duties of firemen shut down the Weyerhaeuser lumber mill here Wednesday.

The men, members of the International Woodworkers of America, quit work Tuesday afternoon after a fireman's helper was fired for refusing to perform cleanup duties. Picket lines were set up Wednesday.

William Ryan, secretary of the union's Local 30 here, said the company notified firemen three weeks ago that during slack work periods they must perform other duties such as cleanup work.

Ryan said the union notified Weyerhaeuser it felt the orders were a breach of contract. Saturday, he added, the union met and decided to strike if men were fired for failing to carry out the orders.

Neither the union nor company would release the name of the dismissed worker.

N. B. Hazen, mill superintendent, declined immediate comment.

Stock Market Drops Following Illness Of Ike
NEW YORK — Wall Street braced itself today for the possible effects on the stock market of President Eisenhower's illness.

News the President has suffered a closure of a small artery in the brain hit the New York market Tuesday 20 minutes before the opening. In those last 20 minutes stocks were dumped at steadily declining prices.

After the New York market closed, the drop continued on the Pacific Coast Exchange.

Some Wall Street experts, however, felt the selling may have been more hysterical than realistic. These analysts insisted there was no change in the administration's program, which has been leaning toward increased expenditures for defense.

Thus it was felt the market might get good support from those who felt the price break offered an alluring buying opportunity.

The market's break yesterday carried leading stocks down as much as \$7 a share. It cut an estimated \$4 billion dollars from the quoted value of all stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

This drop in value was based on the Associated Press average of 60 stocks, which fell \$3.60 to \$154.60. There were 171 advances and 362 declines. New highs for the year totaled 7 while new lows amounted to 72.

Volume expanded to 3,650,000 shares compared with 2,600,000 shares on Monday.

Syria Accuses Israel Of Plans For Aggression
DAMASCUS, Syria — Syria has accused Israel of planning new border aggressions and has warned Turkey to withdraw troops massed along the Syrian frontier or face a new fight in the U.N. General Assembly.

A Syrian army spokesman said the U.N. truth observation organization has been notified of "increased Israeli provocations for further . . . aggressions being prepared against Syria now."

The spokesman said Israeli fire repeatedly had been aimed at positions inside Syrian territory.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman told a news conference that 60,000 Turkish troops are still massed along the northwest Syrian border. If they are not withdrawn, the spokesman said, Syria is determined to renew border Christmas.

Its complaint against Turkey in the U.N. General Assembly. These developments, along with a new Soviet note to Turkey warning against continued pressure on Syria and fresh tension between Israel and Jordan, shaped up into ominous preludes for U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld's Middle East peace mission.

Dave Beck Denied Motion To Delay Larceny Trial
SEATTLE — King County Superior Judge Malcolm Douglas denied a motion by the attorney for Dave Beck Sr. Tuesday that the grand larceny trial of the International Teamsters Union president be postponed. It is scheduled to start Monday.

The attorney, Charles S. Burdell, based his motion on grounds that adverse publicity would make it difficult for Beck to get a fair trial now.

Burdell also said Beck is due in Washington, D.C., Monday as a witness in a civil suit involving the eligibility of James Hoffa to succeed Beck as president of the Teamsters Union.

In denying the motion, Judge Douglas said a civil case should not take precedence over a criminal case and that Dec. 2 was suggested by Burdell as the starting date for Beck's trial when Burdell received a previous delay.

Beck is charged with misappropriating the proceeds from the sale of a union-owned automobile. His son, Dave Jr., was convicted Saturday on two counts of grand larceny involving the sale of two other union-owned cars.

TOLL CLAIMS UP
RABAT, Morocco — A Moroccan rebel communique claimed Wednesday 50 Spanish soldiers were killed and 65 wounded in four days of fighting in the Spanish colony of Ifni. It said 45 Spaniards were taken prisoner.

The Spanish have said they put down an uprising there Saturday and that only five Spanish soldiers were killed and 30 wounded. They said Spanish troops inflicted heavy casualties on the rebels.

Nixon Steps Into Part-Time Presidential Substitute Role

WASHINGTON — Vice President Nixon stepped gingerly into the role of a part-time substitute for ailing President Eisenhower today, giving clear notice Eisenhower would continue to call the signals on government policies.

A proposal by Sen. Bridges (R-NH) that Nixon take over for the stricken President at two scheduled briefings of congressional leaders next week seemed likely to get Eisenhower's approval. Nixon said the meetings will be held but added he did not know whether he would preside.

Bridges, who heads the Senate Republican Policy Committee, said he thinks Nixon "should take over the leadership in routine matters for the President, carrying on the known general wishes and policy of the President."

Vice Agreement
Sen. Saltonstall of Massachusetts, chairman of the Conference of All Republican Senators, indicated general agreement with this view.

"Things have to go on," he said. "The government can't stop." But Sen. Carroll (D-Colo.) commented that "it's one thing to carry out policy and another to make it."

Nixon scheduled further conferences with presidential staff members today at the White House — where he spent most of yesterday without seeing the ill President. He told newsmen when he emerged he might preside over Cabinet and National Security Council meetings.

But in response to what he called "a hypothetical question" about who in the government would make a decision on retaliation if Russia suddenly attacked Western Europe, the vice president replied: "Any decision requiring presidential action could be made by the President. Major problems that require presidential decision, where the President alone can act, will be put to the President."

NATO Powers Urge Go-Ahead For Planned Summit Conference
PARIS — Britain, France, West Germany and Italy urged Wednesday that the scheduled NATO summit conference take place next month despite President Eisenhower's illness.

The chief executive's place. These countries — chief European members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization — made their views known in answer to queries from the U.S. delegation to NATO here. Similar views were expressed by The Netherlands and Turkey. Greece suggested a postponement.

Nixon Offered
The United States offered earlier Wednesday to send Nixon, if this was agreeable to the other members of the alliance.

The U.S. spokesman said the American offer would be communicated to other NATO nations Thursday at the regular NATO Council session here.

He said those instructions were relayed to Frederic Nolting, deputy U.S. representative for NATO. Nolting will be substituting at Thursday's meeting for the permanent U.S. delegate, W. Randolph Burgess who is now in Washington.

It was not disclosed who in Washington issued the instructions to Nolting. Presumably they came from Secretary of State Dulles and Nixon himself, with Eisenhower's approval.

French Approval
French official sources said the French government sees no reason for postponing the session or for downgrading it to an ordinary NATO ministerial council meeting.

Normally the foreign, defense and finance ministers of the 15 nations meet here every December for their annual review session. This meeting, which would be held concurrently with the summit talks, fixes the NATO alliance military preparedness goals for the coming year.

Secretary Mitchell Pinch Hits For Ike In Tuesday Speech
NEW YORK — Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell, speaking for ailing President Eisenhower, urged the nation last night to accept the "austerity and privations" required to give military and economic aid to other countries of the free world.

Mitchell digressed from a prepared speech of his own to deliver the gist of the "chins up" talk that Eisenhower had planned to broadcast last night from Cleveland.

The main topic of the Cleveland talk, canceled because of the President's illness, was the importance of international cooperation in halting Soviet imperialism.

Mitchell, whose speech before a dinner of the Manufacturing Chemists Assn. was not aired, said the administration believes "no investment can make pay greater dividends than reasonable economic aid to friendly nations."

Mitchell listed three specific points that the President had indicated to make in the Cleveland speech. They were:

1. Eisenhower administration believes the people of the United States owe full support to the mutual security program in both its military and economic phases.

2. Eisenhower will recommend to Congress in January that the expiring Trade Agreements Act be broadened and be extended for a period longer than the present three-year term. The proposal would provide for broader authority for the negotiation of reciprocal trade pacts.

3. A call for United States participation in the Organization for Trade Cooperation. Mitchell described the agency as "a business-like unit" to guarantee maximum benefits from the negotiation of trade agreements.

Grace, Rainier Have Lunch Date

LONDON — Prince Rainier and Princess Grace of Monaco lunched Wednesday with Queen Elizabeth and her husband, Prince Philip, at Buckingham Palace.

The luncheon came as a surprise since Rainier and his consort — Hollywood's Grace Kelly — arrived here only Tuesday on a short private visit.

The luncheon was the first time that Queen Elizabeth had received Rainier and Grace, now expecting her second child, since they were married in April, 1956. Neither the queen nor Prince Philip attended the marriage in Monte Carlo.

At that time there was some muttering here that Princess Grace was being given the royal snub because of her movieland — and commoner — background.

Since the wedding there has been an appreciable thawing in protocol surrounding Britain's royal family, with the queen and Prince Philip regularly inviting figures from all walks of the nation's political, social and entertainment life to lunch at the palace.

Much of this democratization of the monarchy has been attributed to Prince Philip.

Youth Pleads Guilty To Decency Outrage
Pleading guilty to a seldom invoked statute — Doing an act which openly outrages the public decency — Kenneth Francis Eckley, 19, Charleston, was sentenced to 90 days in the Douglas County Jail Tuesday.

In handing down the sentence, Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodruff ordered that credit be given Eckley for time already spent in jail. He has been in jail awaiting trial since Oct. 11.

Eckley, indicted by the grand jury, previously had pleaded innocent to the charge. He withdrew that plea Tuesday.

He was arrested in Washington where he had taken a 14-year-old Redwood girl and was returned here to face criminal charges.

Eckley's attorney, William Jones, asked the court to be lenient in sentencing him. He claimed Eckley had no criminal record and had meant no harm by his action. Bert Burgoyne, deputy D.A., asked for maximum punishment and pointed out that the only reason Eckley was faced with this charge was because his conduct did not fit any of the possible felony charges covering minors.

The statute covering the charge carries a maximum sentence of six months in jail and a fine of \$200.

Air Force Beats Navy Speed Run
NEW YORK — The Air Force took back the coast-to-coast speed record from the Navy Wednesday flying from Los Angeles to New York in 3 hours, 17 minutes, 29.2 seconds.

A sleek Voodoo jet piloted by Capt. Ray W. Schreengost Jr., 31, roared by the control tower at Floyd Bennett Field at 1:15:29.2 P. (EST) to set his record.

The previous record was 3 hours, 22 minutes, set by an F8U Crusader last July.

Two minutes later, a second Voodoo jet piloted by Capt. Robert J. Kilpatrick, 32, Bristol, Conn., swept past the control tower to complete the flight in 3 hours, 19 minutes, 2 seconds and lower the mark by another seven minutes.

SALEM — High school teachers of driver education will attend instruction sessions here Friday and Saturday, the state Department of Education announced.

State Hospital Patients To Receive Flu Vaccine
SALEM — The state Board of Health ordered the Oregon State Hospital Wednesday to give Asian flu vaccine to its 3,000 patients, despite protests from the hospital's doctors.

Dr. Dean K. Brooks, hospital superintendent, argued that the flu vaccine is only 50 per cent effective, and that the 70 cases the hospital has had so far have been mild.

The board issued its order upon receiving Wednesday a recommendation from the state Board of Health that the patients be vaccinated. Inmates of all other state institutions already have received the vaccine.

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Ike's Pastor Calls Nation To Prayer
WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower's pastor called on the nation Wednesday to join in Thanksgiving Day prayers for the President's recovery.

The Rev. Dr. Edward L. R. Elson, minister of the National Presbyterian Church to which the Eisenhowers belong, suggested the prayer between 11 a.m. and 12 noon Thursday, Dr. Elson's statement said.

"We invite all people who believe in God and the efficacy of prayer to join with the congregation of the National Presbyterian Church between eleven and twelve o'clock on Thursday, Nov. 28th, to ask God's blessing upon the President and to offer intercessory prayers for all who attend him in the ministry of healing that a complete and speedy recovery may be accomplished."

Riddle Man Succumbs In Roseburg Hospital
Silas Andrew Harris, 89, of Riddle, died at a Roseburg hospital Nov. 26 following a lingering illness.

He was born Sept. 25, 1868, in Iowa. He was married to Minnie Mae Mundle Oct. 21, 1896, at Grand Island, Neb., and moved to Douglas County in 1924. Mrs. Harris died April 18, 1956.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Florence Helms of Riddle and Mrs. Louisa Finlayson of Shoshone, Idaho; one son, Robert A. Harris of Glendale; seven grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; and two sisters, both in Nebraska.
