Pederson told state police he was headed north on Highway 42 and had attempted to make a left turn into the road for northbound Highway 99 traffic to enter Highway 42. Headed the wrong direction on one-way stretch, Pederson was unable to make the curve.

Missing after the accident, he told officers, was a German shepherd dog he had just bought. A third accident was not investigated. County Loses \$2.40 Suit On Reporter's Claim

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of the transcript at issue and said she had prepared it at the request of Robert M. Stults who had been appointed special prosecutor in a forgery case against George Bevel. The transcript was used in a trial charging Bevel with being an habitual criminal and was a record of Bevel's admissions of felony convictions which he had made in his forgery trial.

Stults took the witness stand to briefly tell the history of the \$2.40 transcript.

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly was called by the embattled court reporter. He identified his signature on Mrs. Handy's claim and said he had approved the bill.

Arguments Allowed
After examining the Bevel file obtained from circuit court, Judge Woodruff departed from the ordinary small claims procedure to allow the parties to argue their points.

Before handing down the judgment, he declared, "If anything is wrong with the law it is something not to be addressed to the courts but to the legislature."

S. Korea Backing U.S. Against Japs In Ryukus

SEOUL, (AP) — The South Korean government today backed the U.S. position on Okinawa and called for efforts "to prevent the rise of a Japanese colonialism which has been reaching out for the Ryukyus."

Government spokesman Oh Chae Kyung said in a statement, "Korea welcomes the U.S. decision to keep the Ryukyus islands under military administrative control."

Japanese demands for a civilian administration seems to have been part of a conspiracy to penetrate the islands preliminary to an attempt to re-establish Japan's former colonial control.

Oh denounced the idea the Ryukyus want to return to Japan as "a myth created by the Japanese themselves, and by themselves, and by their Communist emissaries and sympathizers on Okinawa."

Long Rest Held Needed
The new medical progress report and the Gettysburg trip together with Thursday's surprise burst of activity, added up to a signal of a faster recovery pace than had been indicated by Eisenhower's doctors.

But the White House is continuing to emphasize that the road to complete recovery still stretches a good distance into the future. The presidential physicians are pictured as still believing Eisenhower must have several weeks of rest before he can return to his job full time.

Eisenhower may go to the Dec. 16-18 Paris NATO Council meeting after all. The White House said Eisenhower's doctors will decide later. Vice President Nixon will head the U.S. delegation if Eisenhower can't go.

Average Temperatures Seen For Next 5 Days

According to the U.S. Weather Bureau's Roseburg station, the maximum temperatures will be in the low 50's, lowering to the mid 40's. The minimums are anticipated to be in the 30's.

A few light showers are predicted, mostly occurring Saturday night or Sunday. The total precipitation is generally expected to be half an inch or less along the coast and a quarter of an inch or less inland.

U.S. Embassy Guarded During Demonstration

DAMASCUS, Syria, (AP) — Police threw a heavy guard around the U.S. Embassy and Turkish Legation here Friday when 3,000 demonstrators demanded the Alexandretta district from Turkey and denounced the Palestine partition.

The demonstrators, mostly students, marched in the streets chanting "Death to those who accept Palestine partition" and "Long live the Arab struggle for Alexandretta restoration." There was no violence.

Friday was the 10th anniversary of the 1947 U.N. Palestine partition resolution and the 19th anniversary of annexation of Alexandretta by Turkey. The annexation had the consent of France, at that time the administrator of Syria and Britain.

Similar demonstrations took place in other Syrian towns. Syria's 100,000 students are to go on strike Saturday in protest against both the Palestine partition and the annexation of Alexandretta.

Canyonville Man Dies In Hospital

Andrew Mansfield Simmons, 81, Canyonville, died Wednesday morning at a Roseburg hospital. Simmons was born Dec. 14, 1873, at Sams Valley and moved to Douglas County eight years ago from Coos Bay. He was a commercial fisherman at Coos Bay for 30 years and had lived all his life in southern Oregon.

Survivors include a brother, Lawrence Simmons, Canyonville; and numerous nieces and nephews. He was never married.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Sunday in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek, with Rev. Frank Wagner, Riddle Church of God, officiating. Interment will follow in Willis Creek Cemetery, Dillard.

Weather Gives Texans Chance To Save Cotton

ELECTRA, Tex., (AP) — The thanks given at this northwest Texas town yesterday came from hundreds toiling in the cotton fields, thankful that clear skies gave them a chance to salvage some of the crop.

Farmers, schoolchildren and merchants in the town of about 8,000 worked harvesting cotton. The crop, delayed in planting by hard spring rains, was only about a third harvested before fall rains, sleet and snow set in.

Much of the cotton rotted on the stalks, but farmers hoped they might salvage up to 75 per cent.

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
