

Records Reveal Douglas Co. May Be One Livestock Dist.

Douglas County might be one big livestock district.

This was revealed Wednesday in a hearing held by the State Department of Agriculture in the courthouse. In presenting evidence of livestock districts, County Clerk Charles Doerner came up with a record of an election held in 1918 in which voters approved making the entire county into a district by a vote of 2,227 to 1,046.

Geo. Gardner, 94, Dies Wednesday

George Gardner, 94, a resident of Douglas County for more than 50 years, died at a local hospital Wednesday.

He was born Aug. 18, 1863, in Maine and had resided in the Dillard area for about 30 years. He was a member of the Catholic Church.

Gaillard Wins Confidence Vote

PARIS — Premier Felix Gaillard today won a fifth confidence vote from Parliament on his demand for a special economic powers bill but there was danger his Socialist ministers might bring down the Cabinet by resigning later in the day.

First unofficial figures gave the count as 222-185 on the second reading of the economic powers bill first approved by the Assembly Nov. 19. The Communists and extreme right Poujadists cast most of the votes against the government.

There were moments of panic when the hall opened because few government supporters were present in the Assembly and the Communists and Poujadists were on hand in force.

The message, it by the S.S. President Monroe, indicated the weather was improving in the area of the storm-tossed Chandris as hurricane Nina swept by. It said nothing about the freighter's earlier mechanical trouble.

The Chandris reportedly has nine days' fuel left in her bottom — presumably enough to carry it to Honolulu.

Controls Livestock

When livestock districts are formed, owners of certain animals are required to keep them from running at large. Voters of an area can create districts by elections setting forth boundaries and types of livestock to be confined by fences.

Voters also may, in elections, withdraw areas from an existing livestock district.

Attending the Douglas County hearing in addition to Doerner and agriculture department representatives, were Bert Burgoyne, deputy district attorney, and about six persons in livestock businesses.

Israeli Convoy Crosses Border To Mt. Scopus

JERUSALEM — The first Israeli convoy to Mt. Scopus in two weeks crossed Jordanian territory Thursday carrying 14 barrels of gasoline and other supplies.

Jordan stopped convoys to the demilitarized Israeli enclave last month with a claim that gasoline constituted military cargo. The Israelis said it was necessary fuel. The supply run started again Thursday under an agreement worked out by U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld.

U.N. observers in the presence of Jordanian officers checked the food, gasoline and other supplies in the trucks before they set out. The convoy carried 45 policemen plus a number of civilian caretakers.

At a Jordanian demand, a number of meat and biscuit tins were opened for inspection purposes. Police kitbags were also inspected.

In the usual pattern for convoys over the last eight years, a tony-munyon-armed Jordanian force with each armored bus in the procession. One U.N. observer sat next to each Israeli truck driver. Leading the way were several U.N. jeeps and an Arab legion jeep.

Klansman Convicted Of Mutilating Negro

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — A 45-year-old former industrial worker became the third Ku Klux Klansman convicted of mayhem and sentenced to a maximum of 20 years for mutilating a Negro man.

Jesse W. Mabry was convicted and sentenced Wednesday by a Circuit Court jury which deliberated about 38 minutes. His attorney filed notice of appeal and bond was set at \$20,000.

Two others previously were convicted and given the maximum sentence in the castration of Judge Aaron, 34-year-old Negro handyman who was kidnapped, beaten and mutilated by Klansmen Labor Day night.

Three others remain to be tried.

Formula Change For Forest Road Funds Requested

WASHINGTON — Members of the Washington and Oregon congressional delegations demanded Wednesday that Congress examine an order changing the formula for the distribution of national forest road funds.

The order was issued by the Departments of Agriculture and Commerce and became the target for sharp criticism by several members of Congress from the Western states, including Sens. Neuberger of Oregon, Magnuson and Jackson of Washington and Rep. Porter of Oregon, all Democrats.

Neuberger, member of the Senate Public Works Committee, said that committee would look into the formula change, which he said discriminated against Oregon.

"Oregon national forests constitute one-third of the value and bring in one-third of the income of the entire national forest network," he said. "Her forests provide 20 per cent of the timber cut, but Oregon gets only 14 per cent of the highway money."

He said the formula change would cost Oregon \$1,000,000 a year.

Magnuson said the change would cost Washington about a million dollars a year. An aide said Magnuson and Jackson may ask Congress to rescind the order.

Bomarc Missile Bases Announced

WASHINGTON — Four East Coast Air Force bases have been selected for construction of the first launching sites for the Bomarc, the nation's newest missile designed to knock down enemy bombers.

The Air Force reportedly feels about 15 such sites would provide anti-aircraft coverage for the East and West coasts and the nation's northern boundary. The Bomarc can cover a wide area and travels faster than sound.

However, although it is designed to intercept enemy bombers as far as 300 miles and as high up as nearly 12 miles, the Bomarc would not be effective against ballistic missiles.

Plans to build the first Bomarc launching sites were announced last night by the Air Force. It said it had signed contracts totaling \$46 million for work at Dow Air Force Base, Maine; McGuire Air Force Base, N.J.; Otis Air Force Base, Mass.; and Suffolk County Air Force Base, Long Island, N.Y.

British Train Crash Toll Will Exceed 100

Carried Commuters, Shoppers

The two wrecked trains were carrying about 2,000 commuters and Christmas shoppers bound for the suburban town of Hayes and the English Channel towns of Folkestone and Deal, 30 miles to the southeast.

Trains were not operating on schedule because of the thickest fog in recent years which enveloped Britain and parts of the Continent for two days. The disarranged timetable and lack of visibility were blamed by some for the wreck; but railway officials declined to speculate before a full inquiry.

It was the worst train wreck in Britain since 112 persons died Oct. 8, 1953, in a three-train pileup at the suburban London station of Harrow.

Kidnaping Feared As Girl Missing

SYCAMORE, Ill. — The community-wide search for a missing 7-year-old girl continued today as the FBI joined the hunt and police expressed belief evidence indicated a kidnaping or sex crime.

Police said they had found no clues in the search for the child, Maria Rudolph, who was reported missing early Tuesday night while playing near her home.

FBI agents declined to comment on the case but reportedly they questioned operators of filling stations, merchants and teen-agers in Sycamore and nearby communities.

Hundreds of volunteers in this northern Illinois city of 7,000 aided authorities in hunting for the little dark-haired girl. Airplanes the two-way radio cars also have been pressed into the search.

Both Police Chief William Hindenburg and Sheriff Alfred Diesz said it appeared almost certain Maria was kidnaped. Her mother Frances said she believed her daughter, who was last seen in company with a strange man about 24 years old, is dead.

Carlessly Tossed Match Causes Big Explosion

NEW YORK — An explosion attributed to the careless tossing of a lighted cigarette butt into a big gas main undergoing repair Wednesday touched off a tower of flame and injured three persons. Flames shot five stories high after the blast near Times Square, at 40th Street and Broadway. Thousands gathered at the scene despite a snowstorm.

Firemen put out the blaze by pouring water into the trench—15 feet long, 3 feet wide and 4 feet deep.

Meany Denies Making Deal With Teamsters

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. — AFL-CIO President George Meany told the opening session of the federation's convention Thursday there would be no deals in the federation's drive to eliminate labor corruption.

Meany flatly denied reports the AFL-CIO high command is in any way willing to water down its cleanup demands on the Teamsters and other AFL-CIO unions accused of corrupt leadership.

There had been some speculation Meany was now willing to let James R. Hoffa remain in a subordinate position in the Teamsters Union and escape an AFL-CIO convention expulsion move, if only Hoffa would quit as Teamsters president-elect.

In the past Meany had said Hoffa's ouster from any sort of post in the Teamsters was the prime requisite to the trucking Union's staying in the federation. The Teamsters, already under AFL-CIO suspension, have one tenth of the AFL-CIO's 15 million members. The United Textile Workers Union was suspended Wednesday night.

Hoffa and other top Teamsters officers, including retiring president Dave Beck, have been under constant fire from the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee practically all year.

Beck and Hoffa have been linked in the committee's hearings to misuse of vast amounts of Teamsters' funds and dealings with racketeers.
