

Malpractice Suit Filed Against Reedsport Doctor

A malpractice suit asking for \$80,000 in damages has been filed against Dr. Marvin Amick, a Reedsport osteopath.

The suit was filed with the Douglas County Circuit Court by Mrs. Rebecca Carns of Reedsport.

The complaint charges that as a result of treatment by the doctor in January of this year, Mrs. Carns incurred infections that eventually caused her to undergo a total hysterectomy.

The complaint further charges that the physician was allegedly careless in following ordinary standards of care in his treatment of Mrs. Carns.

Mrs. Carns asks for the \$80,000 in general damages and the right to amend her complaint to show the full amount of special damages.

Woman Completes Vowed Pilgrimage

SAN JUAN, Tex. (AP) — Mrs. Manuela Carreon completed her 387-mile trip to the Our Lady of San Juan Catholic Church here Wednesday, arriving in her husband's pickup truck after walking the first 112 miles of the way to keep a vow.

She, her husband, and their son, Alphonse, 27, went immediately to the church to give thanks for the son's acquittal on a murder charge.

The three stayed at the church until after 10 a.m., praying and talking to Father Joseph Aspienza.

Admittedly weary of foot, the stocky, 46-year-old little mother stopped walking late Tuesday at the north edge of Palacios—seven days and 112 miles down coastal highways from her starting point at Galveston last Wednesday.

Mrs. Carreon set forth shortly after her eldest son, Alphonse, a longshoreman, was acquitted of murder in a tavern slaying at Texas City.

Sen. Johnson Views Space Age

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) said last night the nation has some catching up to do and "we must go into high gear at once to produce the weapons that will insure survival."

But, he said, most of us will live to see space ships. "Rockets to the moon are just over the horizon. Space ships are only a few years away and most of us will live to see them."

The scientists are already talking in serious terms—about the day when we will escape the solar system and explore the universe," Johnson said.

He said, "Recent scientific achievements by the Soviet Union have resulted in grave problems for the United States, that the nation has been completely outstripped in a field where we thought we were supreme."

Bergman Evades Query Of Quick Divorce Plans

LONDON (AP) — Actress Ingrid Bergman declined this week to discuss a report she and her estranged husband, Italian film producer Roberto Rossellini, plan a quick divorce.

"There is nothing I can say now," she said in a statement through a spokesman.

In Rome, Rossellini also refused to comment on the report published abroad that he and the Swedish actress agreed by long distance telephone to get a quick divorce.

The report said Atty. Ercole Graziadei, who arranged the couple's legal separation last month, had taken documents for the divorce to London to be signed by Miss Bergman.

Miss Bergman is making the movie "Indiscreet" at a studio outside London.

Unfair Labor Hearing Begun

PORTLAND (AP) — A National Labor Relations Board hearing opened Wednesday on a charge that the Salem Teamsters Union local violated the secondary boycott provision of the Taft-Hartley law in picketing beer truck deliveries in Salem last September.

The charge of unfair labor practices was filed by the Truck Operators League of Oregon. The league contends that the local prevented four Oregon freight lines from delivering to customers of Coast Distributors, Salem.

Clyde C. Crosby, Oregon Teamsters Union chief, who attended the hearing, told newsmen the union was in a labor dispute with the beer distributors and called a strike. He said that when the trucks were tied up, the company tried to use common carrier freight lines for deliveries. He called that an attempt to use the freight companies as "strike-breakers."

Richard W. Sites of the Sites Silver Wheel Freight Lines testified that he saw roving pickets at various places where beer was being delivered. He said Teamsters pickets followed trucks and produced picket signs at places where beer was delivered.

The operators league contends that the four trucking firms—Pierce Freight Lines, Wright Lines, Pacific Motor Freight Lines and Sites Silver Wheel Freight Lines—were making lawful deliveries. They said the picketing constituted a secondary boycott and thus violated the Taft-Hartley law.

Dairymen Elect Merrill Man As New President

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — Lawrence Geraghty of Merrill was elected president of the Oregon Dairymen's Assn. Wednesday at the final session of the annual meeting.

Geraghty, former vice president, also is president of the Klamath Basin Grade A Producers Assn.

Louis Weinstein, Ontario, was elected first vice president; Ray Meador, Beaverton, second vice president; Fred Roberts, Corvallis, treasurer. Harold Ewalt, Corvallis, was re-elected secretary.

Delegates earlier heard predictions that the number of farms in Oregon will continue to decrease.

Number Of Oregon Flu Cases Takes Big Drop

PORTLAND (AP) — The number of flu cases reported in Oregon last week totaled 1,932—a drop of 1,066 cases from the previous week—the state Board of Health said Wednesday.

This brought the total number of cases reported for the year to 43,910.

Dr. Sam Osgood, state epidemiologist, said the flu outbreak apparently is on a decline in Oregon. This is the fourth straight week that the number of reported cases has dropped since the week ending Nov. 2, when the all-time high of 6,585 cases was reported.

Midwestern Baptist Pastor Heads National Council Of Churches; Others Elected

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — A Midwestern Baptist pastor who likes to climb mountains, the Rev. Dr. Edwin T. Dahlberg of St. Louis, was elected president of the National Council of Churches Thursday.

He is the first Baptist ever to head the big cooperative Christian organization, which includes 30 Protestant and orthodox denominations with about 37½ million members across the nation.

Ten other top officers also were elected at the triennial general assembly, the council's chief policy-making convocation.

Strong Baptist Leader
Dr. Dahlberg succeeds the Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake of Philadelphia, administrative head of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

Dr. Dahlberg is a leader in the American Baptist (Northern) Convention and has twice been its president. His local congregation, the Delmar Baptist Church, is affiliated both with the American and Southern Baptist Conventions.

The Southern Baptists, along with the Roman Catholic Church and the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, are the only major U.S. denominations not in the council.

Dr. Dahlberg, a scholarly man, is an avid mountain-climber at 64. On vacations he often spends days alone, scaling 14,000-foot peaks in Colorado.

Eight vice-presidents at large also were elected. They were: Charles C. Parlin, New York attorney and Methodist layman, also named vice-chairman of the council's interim governing body, its general board. He is the first layman to hold the post.

Charles P. Taft, Episcopal layman and mayor of Cincinnati.

Mrs. Guy A. Benchoff, Woodstock, Va., national president of the Women's Guild of the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

Mrs. Theodore O. Wedel, Washington, D.C., an Episcopal Church member and president of the 10-million-member United Church Women.
