

Highway Commission Opens Oregon Road Project Bids

PORTLAND (AP) — The state Highway Commission Thursday approved purchase of 30 acres of land on the Redwood Highway in Josephine County for use as a park.

The land is to be purchased from the Bureau of Land Management under terms of the federal recreation act. The state will pay about 30 per cent of the appraised value of the land and the full value of the timber on it.

The commission also approved installation of a bronze marker on the Coast Highway at Neahkahnie Mountain in northern Tillamook County.

The marker is to commemorate the placing of Oregon beaches permanently in public ownership, an act that took place when Oswald West was governor.

The commission opened bids on 18 projects, totaling nearly four million dollars.

Freeway Contracted
The largest brought a low bid

of \$1,142,973 from the Kuckenberg Construction Co., Portland, for grading 2.7 miles of the Baldock Freeway extension into southwest Portland. That will leave only 1 1/2 more miles of the freeway for construction in Portland. The freeway runs to Salem.

Douglas — Widen existing overcrossing of Southern Pacific tracks near Myrtle Creek, Sig Anderson, North Bend, \$77,741.

Douglas — Grade and oil 1.02 miles of Dompier Creek section of Forest Boundary-Tiller road, 3 miles northeast of Tiller, Earl L. McNutt Co., Eugene, \$146,440.

Gilliam — Grade 19.9 miles and

oil 20.06 miles of John Day River-Hay Creek section of Wasco-Heppner Highway, between 5 and 25 miles northwest of Condon, Rogers Construction Co., Portland, \$417,487.

Jackson — Grade and pave .79 miles of eastbound route of Medford - Provolet highway between Elm and Front sts. in Medford, M. C. Leininger & Sons, Medford, \$106,850.

Jackson — Install traffic signals on Pacific Highway at Siskiyou Blvd. and Wightman St. on Pacific Highway in Ashland, Steeck Electric Co., Medford, \$7,119.

Sherman — Grade 5.22 miles and oil 8.24 miles of Wasco-Heppner highway, 9.2 miles southeast of Wasco, Earl L. McNutt Co., Eugene, \$292,886.

Umatilla — Produce 12,600 cubic yards of crushed materials on three highways near Hermiston, Cartwright Construction Co., Durkee, \$36,362.

Washington — Install traffic sig-

nals on Beaverton-Hillsdale highway at Hall St. and Broadway Ave. in Beaverton, Trowbridge Electric Co., Roseburg, \$3,490.

Roseburg Post Office Ready, But Early Christmas Mailing Is Urged Of Local Residents

Postal facilities have been expanded, extra help has been added and everything is geared to handle the expected rush of Christmas mail at the Roseburg Post Office, according to Clyde Carstens, postmaster.

But despite this, Carstens warns that the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas is early mailing, requesting that mailing be taken care of as soon as possible by patrons.

Besides the main office and Station No. 1, which operates at the Fairhaven Variety Store, a temporary mailing station will be operating in the basement of the Miller Mercantile Co. from Monday Dec. 9, through Saturday, Dec. 21.

First-class postage should be used, inasmuch as two-cent unaffiliated greeting cards envelopes are not forwardable nor returnable to the sender. Each year more than one thousand greeting cards fail in delivery in the local post office, Carstens estimates, because of insufficient postage to be forwarded to their destination when the addressee has moved.

In preparing parcels for mailing, the postmaster suggests that good, heavy fiberboard cartons, wrapped with heavy brown paper and tied securely with stout cord, be used. The parcel should be addressed directly on the wrapper with ink. Adhesive address labels should be well-moistened in applying to the wrapper and the label outlined with scotch tape.

Office hours at the mail office will be extended from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. for the transaction of postal business and the mail post office will be open all day Saturday, Dec. 14, and Saturday, Dec. 21.

Carstens recommends several suggestions to help speed up the mail and improve service.

He suggests that quantities of greeting cards should be separated into bundles labeled for local delivery and out-of-town delivery. The bundles should be tied with either twine or rubber bands. Regular printed labels are available at the post office, or the information may be written on a slip of paper.

As a local help, cards addressed for delivery in Roseburg should be made out to the street numbers in effect since the change was made a year ago. The old numbers are obsolete and carriers no longer have them on their cases, Carstens says.
