**Locally Handwritten 'Book Of The Gospel' Planned By Adventists**  
Douglas County Library will soon have a unique, handwritten "Book of the Gospels." It will be written by the citizens of Roseburg and the surrounding area.

The unusual book is part of a community plan announced by the Roseburg Seventh-day Adventist Church, Military Street and Umpqua Avenue, as part of the annual observance of the American Bible Society's annual Bible-reading program, which began Nov. 29 and continues through Christmas Day.

The minister said opportunity will be given for each person writing a verse in the handwritten book to put his or her name following the verse, so persons viewing the manuscript in years to come can see who wrote in it.

There will be no offering taken for the church or its work for this is a "thank you" gesture from the Adventist Church to the community for help given in their mission drives. An offering will be accepted to pay for binding the completed book and any surplus will be turned over to the Muscular Dystrophy Fund.

**16-Year Old Boy Admits Slaying**  
NEW YORK — Police arrested a 16-year-old high school student today in the slaying of an eight-year-old Bronx girl.

Authorities said Robert Gelman, a stocky youth who lived across the street from the girl, would give no reason for the fatal assault.

The slight, dark-haired girl was found last night lying on her back, her small body stabbed many times, about six feet from the front door of her family's apartment.

Her mother, Mrs. Anna Pennella, 29, had left her in the apartment while she took her infant son John Jr., 3 months, to a nearby hospital for a checkup.

Mrs. Pennella returned with the baby and found her daughter's body. The mother's screams brought neighbors and, in turn, police. They then collapsed.

**Ritchie Meted 40-Year Penitentiary Sentence**  
TACOMA — A sentence of 40 years imprisonment in the state penitentiary was imposed upon Wesley L. Ritchie, 29-year-old former convict, by Superior Judge Frank Hale Friday.

He had pleaded guilty Thursday to a first degree assault charge in connection with the shotgun wounding of Deputy Sheriff Harold Knabel Jr., here Sunday night. He was captured later in Oregon.

**Snark Guided Missile Flies To Target Area**  
WASHINGTON — An Air Force intercontinental guided missile — the Snark — flew its full range in a test this week and hit a target area in the South Atlantic, the Defense Department reported.

The missile, essentially a pilotless jet bomber, has a range of about 3,000 miles and travels at about the speed of sound.

**Jury Deadlocked In Frank Trial**  
WASHINGTON — A jury which regards itself as hopelessly deadlocked has been given the weekend off. But it has been ordered to try again Monday to reach a verdict in the case of John Joseph Frank.

Frank, Washington attorney and former FBI agent, is charged with acting as an agent of the Dominican Republic and Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo without registering with the Justice Department.

The jury, which received the case Wednesday afternoon, sent a note to Federal Judge Justice James H. Kirkland late Friday saying:

"The jury fails to agree and there is no possibility of coming to a unanimous decision." As originally written, the note ended with the word "soon," but that was crossed out. The note was signed by Daniel M. Hale, foreman.

**Honolulu Pays Homage To Dead Of Arizona**  
HONOLULU — The skies over Pearl Harbor bore an ominous look Saturday as hundreds gathered to pay homage to 1,102 dead aboard the sunken battleship Arizona.

Instead of planes bearing the Rising Sun insignia, the skies were leaden from a rainstorm which swept Oahu during the night.

Chaplains of three faiths were to say prayers aboard the Arizona, sunk 18 years ago.

Representatives of the 48 states, the territory and the Philippines were to place wreaths or drop leis into the harbor during the ceremony. The Navy said hundreds planned to take boat trips around the harbor during the day.

# Bookmobile Librarian Describes How Rural Schedules Organized

How a bookmobile operates and how stops are decided on were items discussed by the Douglas County bookmobile librarian, Miss Charlotte Hyre, at the regular meeting of the Library Board this week.

She said that before making up a schedule, areas are canvassed to see if there is demand for the stop.

She reported that it is well to choose some stops where there is lighter demand for books, so the bookmobile staff can get books back on the shelves. Books are placed in boxes as they are returned and cannot be checked out again until they are properly recorded and shelved.

Miss Hyre said that at some places, such as Riddle, where hundreds of books are borrowed, it takes as long as 40 minutes to get the bookmobile ready to roll. Shelves must be full so books will not bounce out as the vehicle travels.

She stated that there are many things to consider in making the stops. There must be no traffic hazards which would be dangerous to those going to the bookmobile. There must be room for cars to park, and ample room to maneuver the bookmobile itself.

Popularity of this type of service is shown in its increasing use.

# More Older-Aged People Unemployed In Roseburg Area

Increased unemployment in the over-45-age class of workers is indicated in recent trends, F. C. Riley, manager of the Roseburg office of the Oregon State Employment Service, told Roseburg Lions Thursday night.

Of 2,000 registered applicants for unemployment payments by the end of November here, 749 were over 45 years of age. Of these 532 are over 45 and 65 years and 217 are over 65.

Riley expressed the opinion that total unemployment through whatever assistance is possible in accordance with the needs of the community and to provide unemployment benefits to those eligible claimants when suitable employment is not available. He listed other "special programs," including services to the handicapped, the veterans, the older workers and younger workers. The latter through school activities.

A question and answer discussion on unemployment claims and alleged abuses followed Riley's talk.

The Detroit players also will be awaiting the outcome of the Baltimore Colts - San Francisco 49ers game at Frisco. The Colts, leading the Western Conference, can clinch at least a tie for the championship by winning even if Detroit keeps pace with them.

On the other hand, Detroit and San Francisco victories can throw the race into a triple tie. All three teams would have 7-4 records.

school buses which carry 2,000 children over the highway meet as many as 40 loaded logging trucks a day.

And some sections of the road, they said, have as many as 160 curves per mile.

Highway Engineer W. C. Williams told the delegation that the Southern Oregon district receives 21.38 per cent of the 2½ million dollars the state spends annually on highways.

In the past five years, he said, \$900,000 has been spent on Highway 42.

The 42 women in the group had come here by bus to make their pleas to the commission.

The commission took under consideration a request by the Mid-Willamette Valley Planning Council that a 1.4-acre parcel of land near Market Street and the bypass in Salem be deeded by the state to Marion County for a park.

Commissioners agreed with the Bureau of Public Roads and the Forest Service on allocation of \$4,134,000 of forest highway funds for 1958 projects. They include:

- Paving 21.3 miles from Rock Creek to Apple Creek on the North Umpqua Highway, estimated cost \$475,000.
- Surfacing and paving 9.4 miles westerly from Mill Creek on the Umpqua Highway, \$419,000.
- Surfacing 20 miles of the Ukiah-Starkey Highway, \$300,000.
- Grading 5.3 miles south from Elk Lake on the Cascade Lakes Highway, \$231,000.
- Grading 2.7 miles from the end of present construction at Apple Creek to Marsters Bridge on the North Umpqua Highway, \$275,000.
- Grading and surfacing two miles of the John Day-Burns highway, south of Canyon City, \$275,000.
- Surfacing and paving 4.4 miles of the Belknap Springs forest Highway north of the McKezie Highway and surfacing and paving 6.6 miles of this road south from the south Santiam Highway. The cost for those projects is estimated at \$230,000. That still will leave a gap in the 19-mile route between the South Santiam and McKenzie highways.

**Logart Beats Ortega**  
CLEVELAND — Isaac Logart, the top-ranked waterweight contender, was a step farther along the road to the title today and ready to fight anyone to gain the championship.

The 24-year-old Cuban scored a unanimous decision over Gaspar Ortega of Mexico at the Cleveland Arena last night in the first of a series of elimination bouts for the 147-pound crown in 12 rounds.
