

Local Jayvee, Frosh Defeat CBA Quintets

Roseburg High School's basketball teams got off to an official start Friday afternoon as the Indian freshman team edged the Canyonville Bible Academy Jayvee team 26-22 in the opener and the Indian Sophomore and Jayvee teams trimming the CBA varsity, 30-27, in games played on the Roseburg floor.

The two freshman basketball teams of the Indians split up the first game, with each one playing a half, as did the Indian sophomore and Jayvee teams the second contest. During the two games a total of 42 Roseburg players saw action.

In the first game of the afternoon the CBA JV jumped off to a quick 8-1 lead at the end of the first quarter against the first freshmen, on the strength of six first-period points by Ted Oldham. The Chiefs picked up a little in the second quarter, when with an entire different lineup, managed to drop six points through the net against the two points for Canyonville.

Braves Lead The Way

The second half of the contest saw the freshmen Braves team, consisting of the top 15 players in the freshmen class, hit the cords for 15 points and take the first lead of the game, 22-14 at the end of the third quarter. Eldon Davis with six points and Bernard Fenn with four points took the top men in this period. Canyonville was held to only four points in the period.

With another new team on the floor for the start of the fourth period, CBA managed to cut the margin to three points at the end of the game on two baskets by Hooley and Bill Dollard.

The second game of the day started a little different as the Roseburg sophomore team took a brief 9-7 lead at the end of the first quarter. Barron with four points was high for the Indians. Another complete team took the floor at the end of the first quarter and the CBA varsity moved out into a 19-13 lead at half-time. The Pilots collected 12 points in the quarter, with Alfred Copeland nabbing eight of them.

With CBA holding a 13 edge at half-time, the Roseburg team took the floor against them the second half and slowly edged ahead.

Locals Overtake

Six points by Ed Lorenzen in the third quarter and a single basket by Eugene Endicott narrowed the score to 23-21 at the end of the quarter. Another new Roseburg team took the floor in the fourth quarter and proved to be a Leroy Roberts made the tying basket with two minutes left to play and Lorenzen put Roseburg out in front to stay a few seconds later with his final points of the game for a 30-27 victory.

Camas Valley Nabs Tourney Lead Off Win

Second round action of the District 4-B basketball tournament action Friday, at Yoncalla, saw the Camas Valley Hornets take their second straight win of the season, 42-39, over Canyonville in an overtime contest and Yoncalla trim Days Creek, 47-38.

The first game of the evening ended in a 37-37 tie at the end of regular playing time as the Hornets overcame an early Canyonville lead in the late seconds. Byron Baker, for the second straight game, proved to be the man of the hour as he connected for all five of Camas Valley's points in the three-minute overtime period.

Hornets From Behind

Canyonville led throughout the game until late in the fourth quarter when two baskets by Ray Looney tied the score. Another basket by Looney put the Hornets out in front for the first time, but Bob Burns of the Tigers connected from the field with 10 seconds left to force the game into overtime.

John Patterson, who was high for the Tigers with 15 points for the game, added the only two points for Canyonville in the overtime. Burns, with 10 points, was second high scorer for Canyonville.

Mac McClellan connected for six straight baskets during the second and third periods to spark the Hornets in their comeback. McClellan ended with 12 points, high for Camas Valley, followed by Baker with 10.

Eagle Score Largest

The second game of the evening saw Yoncalla run up the largest score of the second tourney as they beat Days Creek 47-38. The Eagles ran up a 25-18 halftime lead and then played the Wolves on even terms throughout the rest of the contest.

Ron Revelle with 14 points was the top point getter for the Eagles with Leroy Noffsinger, Ted Bowman and Bill Snider all chipping in with eight points. Revelle added eight of his points in the first half to lead all scorers, while Noffsinger with seven points was the main man in the second half.

Days Creek had nine men break into the scoring column during the game, while Yoncalla had seven to spread the points around among more players than in any game played so far in the tourney.

Third Round Set

Jim Hendrix with nine points was the leading scorer for Days Creek followed by George Williams with eight.

The third and final round of the tournament will be played Saturday at Elkton, with Days Creek meeting Camas Valley in the first game at 7 p.m. and Yoncalla playing host Elkton at 8 p.m.

Using front line players for the first time in the second period the Trojans wiped out an 11-8 first quarter lead by Glendale to take a 28-11 edge at the end of the first half.

Led by Don Grass and Walt Schroeder the taller Douglas team completely bottled up the Glendale offense in the second quarter as they hit for 18 points against none for Glendale. Schroeder and Grass each chipped in with four points during the quarter and Bob Carlson with three.

Both clubs failed to hit the net in the second half with any regularity except for Ray Munyon of the Pirates who tallied all of his 10 points in the final two quarters of action. Included in the 10 points was eight in the third quarter, the total point output for the Pirates.

Lose In 2nd Period

Cal Schools Threaten Again To Blow PCC Lid

Sproul, And Regents Still Kicking Up Fuss

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Administrators and a regent of the University of California have hinted that the university's schools may quit the Pacific Coast Conference.

President Robert Gordon Sproul, whose authority extends to both Cal and the university's schools, and Chancellor Clark Kerr of California expressed disappointment in the PCC winter meeting results.

But Edward W. Carter, a regent of the university, went further in a statement issued at Los Angeles saying "it's a self-evident possibility that we will get out."

'We've Set Standards'

"I'm disappointed in the action of the conference," Carter explained. "We've set standards and the conference hasn't chosen to accept them."

Representatives of California and UCLA suffered defeat on 13 of the 18 major issues at the winter meeting. Two of the defeated proposals were among five the regents had stated Berkeley and UCLA were committed to "whether within the PCC or outside it."

The regents will receive a report Friday when they meet at Los Angeles.

When asked if the regents would back down, Carter said, "the regents aren't composed of the kind of people who back down."

"Considering the magnitude of the problem it would be pretty fast if we got out by Friday."

Moral Aspects

"In the event of a decision to depart," he continued, "the time of announcement and the date of departure would have to be picked carefully. The legal and moral aspects would have to receive careful consideration."

Three rejected proposals were an aid to athletics program including the "need" factor, higher scholastic requirements and institutional responsibility for policing its own programs including free exchange of information between schools.

A principle for more liberal standards to aid athletes allowing tuition, board and room and with work and scholarship the main factors was adopted over the opposition of California, UCLA and Stanford.

'Hired Gladiators'

Dr. Kerr urged near equal treatment for athletes and non-athletes and said the "free ride" for athletes was turning them into "hired gladiators."

Dr. Kerr said he will report on the conference action early next week to his nine-man Intercollegiate Advisory Board in Berkeley and confer with President Sproul and Chancellor Raymond B. Allen of UCLA before the Friday regents' meeting.

Drain Warriors Defeated In Emerald Jamboree

The Drain Warriors, playing in partners with Creswell, were downed by a 38-35 score in the District 5-A-2 game at Eugene Friday.

Drain was edged by Willamette of Eugene, 11-7, in the second quarter of the four team affair and then returned to trim Pleasant Hill 11-9 in the third period.

Creswell had an about-face as they edged Willamette and were beaten by Pleasant Hill.

Ray Heaton with three points was high against Willamette, while Frank Jacobs with three points was high in the quarter against Pleasant Hill.

The remaining four teams in District 5-A-2 played at St. Francis.

Duck Beats Utah State By Comfortable 65-53

EUGENE (AP) — The University of Oregon broke away from an early tie to coast to a 65-53 victory over the visiting Utah State basketball team Friday night.

The teams met again Saturday night. The score was tied six times in the opening minutes before Oregon left Utah State behind. The last tie was at 12-12. Then Oregon sank four consecutive baskets for a 20-12 margin, and Utah State never came close again.

Guy Bud Kuykendall led the victors with 15 points, followed by forward Charley Franklin with 12. High point honors for the game went to Harold Theus of Utah State, who tallied 23.

The strong Roseburg wrestling team opened its season Friday with a convincing 28-17 win over Marshfield in varsity team events and a 26-15 Jayvee action on the Roseburg mat.

Gaining four of their victories by pins and two on decisions, the Indians won the first five matches of the meet to take a lead that stood up throughout the rest of the evening. Included in the string of five wins was a 2-2 draw between Frank Walters of Roseburg and Jack Hackett of Marshfield in the 114-pound class.

Outside of the draw by Hackett the only wins for Marshfield came on five decisions out of the 12 matches.

One of the fastest matches of the meet was the 145 first round pin of Bill Rice of Marshfield by Russ Pinard in the 197-pound class. Gene Walters was another first round victor, pinning Ted Parks of the Pirates in 1.00 of the opening go-around in the 129-pound event.

Two other top flight bouts took the evening were in the 177-pound class where Gene Jenkins of Marshfield edged Stephan John of Roseburg 2-1 and in the heavyweight event where Tom Jenkins of the Pirates upset C. B. Simons of Roseburg by a 2-0 decision.

Other Indian pins were by Felix Raddatz in the 165-pound match and by Dennis Batsch in the 147-pound class. Gaining decisions during the meet for the Indians were John Antonien in the 122-pound event and Jim McGhehey in the 97-pound match.
