

Tree Farming Represents Beginning In Intensive Forest Management, Claim

SEATTLE — Tree farming represents "a beginning in intensive forest management," a government official told delegates to the 48th annual forestry conference of the Western Forestry and Conservation Assn. this week.

D. C., an assistant secretary of agriculture, told the 600 delegates from the United States and Canada that fine progress has been made in tree farming to date, but he warned them not to be complacent.

Peterson said 30 million acres of forest land need planting and that four million owners of small woodland need technical help in managing their timber.

George C. Flanagan, Medford, Ore., association president, said tree farming now extends to 45 states and Canada. In the United States alone, he said, there are nearly 11,000 tree farmers.

"Tree farms," he said, "provide abundant watersheds, outdoor recreation and grazing areas for livestock as well as more trees." Peterson warned that aid to small woodland owners should come from state and private foresters, but if it is not provided,

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Softness In American Education Scored By Retired Professor

CORVALLIS — "Softness in American education" was criticized at the annual Oregon State College agricultural-home economics staff conference, now under way here.

Dr. E. C. Stakman, retired University of Minnesota professor who is consultant to the Rockefeller Foundation, said this country needs more self-imposed discipline in education.

"We can't buy brains outright; we need to have better teachers," Stakman said. He added that we must reinforce the old principle that "there is no royal road to learning."

The week-long conference includes all research, extension and resident instruction staff members in agriculture and research and extension staffs in home economics.

Delegates were welcomed by Gov. Rosellini. The conference will last through Friday.

Gov. Harriman Urges Teamwork Between States

NEW YORK — New York Gov. Averell Harriman Thursday urged teamwork between neighboring states to further baring of discrimination in employment.

Harriman, speaking before the 12-state governors conference on discrimination in employment, said in a prepared address:

"Our experience has shown that further gains are possible by a greater pooling of our resources, especially in dealing with industries which cross state lines."

"One example is the inquiry conducted by the New York and New Jersey agencies into the employment patterns of railroads which operate in the two states, and which employ more than 56,000 persons."

"During negotiations in this bi-state effort, the railroads affirmed a non-discriminatory policy and a study present under way... shows that Negroes have recently been hired for the first time in the industry's history as brakemen and in supervisory capacities."

Gov. Robert D. Holmes of Oregon said there was need for an intensified national and social program to combat discrimination in all fields. He said the intent of all anti-discrimination legislation, particularly in the field of housing, should be made clear throughout the nation. Such a program could best be carried out, he said, through cooperation of state and local agencies, in addition to civic, school and church groups.

Salk Advisory Committee Said Hurried By Mrs. Hobby

OAKLAND, Calif. — A member of a special federal advisory committee testified Wednesday that the committee was hurried by Oveta Culp Hobby when it approved release of Salk polio vaccine in 1955.

Mrs. Hobby then was secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

Dr. Howard Shaughnessy, director of the Illinois state health laboratory, said the committee was given only 75 minutes to reach a decision, but demurred and asked for at least another hour.

"Mrs. Hobby was waiting on the other end of the line and wanted an answer by 4 o'clock," Shaughnessy said.

Called By Defense

Shaughnessy was called to testify by the defense in a \$365,000 polio damage suit against the Cutter Laboratories of Berkeley.

Attorney Melvin Belli, representing Ann Gottsacker, 7, of Santa Barbara, Calif., and James Phipps, 4, of Monterey, Calif., has asserted that the two children contracted polio after being vaccinated with Cutter-made vaccine.

Shaughnessy said the committee learned just prior to meeting that the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis had tested the vaccine and found it satisfactory.

Congress May Give Benson Plan Cool Reception

WASHINGTON — Congress is expected to give a cool reception to a suggestion from Secretary of Agriculture Benson that a bipartisan commission be named to assist him in setting price support levels, if it doesn't trust him to do it alone.

Even colder treatment is likely from Congress for a further suggestion from Benson that it drop price support levels for the basic crops of wheat, corn, cotton, rice, tobacco and peanuts to range from 60 to 90 per cent of parity.

Benson now has the authority to set these levels anywhere between 75 and 90 per cent of parity. But he said in a speech in Chicago Wednesday he will seek the 60 to 90 per cent range when Congress returns in January.

He said if Congress felt the discretionary authority to set the levels should not be lodged in his hands alone, a bipartisan commission might be appointed to assist him.

Rep. Abernethy (D-Miss.) member of the House Agriculture Committee, said "there isn't the slightest chance that Congress will lower the support levels on the basic crops. It will not pass."

As to the suggestion that a bipartisan commission might be appointed to help the secretary in setting price support levels, Abernethy said he didn't see how such a plan could work.

West Coast Telephone Co. Declares Dividend

SAN FRANCISCO — The trustees of West Coast Telephone Co. Thursday declared a quarterly dividend of 24 cents a share on its common stock, payable March 1, 1958, to stockholders of record Feb. 10.

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Record Amount Being Paid Out For Unemployment

SALEM — The Oregon Unemployment Compensation Commission said Thursday that jobless payments this month would soar over the five-million dollar mark for the first time in history.

With 50,000 persons out of work, the commission's trust fund, of which benefits are paid, will fall to 41 million dollars, the lowest point since the end of World War II, and about half of what it was during the war.

The commission said that unless conditions improve greatly, the fund will fall to 30 million dollars next March, bringing into effect the provision that taxes on employers would have to be set at a flat 2.7 per cent of payroll.

The rate now ranges from .6 of 1 per cent to 2.7 per cent.

Unemployment now is the worst since 1949 in the state, and threatens to get much worse, the commission said.

The commission paid out more than a million dollars last week. Of the 50,000 jobless, 36,200 are covered by unemployment compensation.

The unemployment rate of those covered by unemployment compensation is 9.6 per cent.

The commission paid \$2,879,562 in benefits during November, a new November high, and 84 per cent more than the total for Nov., 1956.

Since the commission's fiscal year began July 1, benefit payments total 10 million dollars, compared with four millions in the same period a year ago.
