TB Seal Sale Had Start In Denmark

Ask the "man on the street" who originated the Christmas Seal and his answer will probably be "the National Tuberculosis Association."
The first seals sold in this country for the purpose of raising money for charity were to help start out TB. However, this was four years and thousands of miles away from the point of origin.
The idea of seals for the in charity fund raising was conceived by a post clerk in Denmark in 1903.
Einar Holboell mentioned his plan to his fellow workers who enthusiastically began to help him. The idea was passed to King Christian, who approved, and the idea of Queen Louise was placed on the first seals in 1904.
Jacob R. Danialson, an American, saw the seals on letters and packages arriving in the country. In 1907, a magazine article, which Rik wrote about seals attracted the attention of a Red Cross woman, Miss Mary Bissell. She was concerned about the fate of a small subscription and decided to use the idea in this country.
The first seal in America, designed by Miss Bissell, was a wreath of holly enclosing the words "Merry Christmas."
She promptly had 50,000 of them printed, but had no place to sell them. The idea of a communist on Philadelphia newspaper existed. Within a few weeks, 30,000 were sold.
The following year, a nationwide sale was held. It was supported by publications and groups all over the country—and sponsored by the American Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis Association.
Tens of thousands of dollars are raised each year by the sale of one seal. In addition, dozens of our groups have taken up the idea. Many kinds of vital charities are now aided by the sale of seals.

The problem of providing transportation for pupils who are taking part in extra-curricular activities after dark at Glide High School gym, was discussed at length at the school board meeting this week.
Many patrons of the school contended that this transportation should be provided by the parents. Others believe the district should provide the transportation.

Committee Appointed
A committee appointed by the PTA, Mrs. Orville Reese, Mrs. Dale Hatfield and Mack E. Brown attended the board meeting to discuss the problem. No action was taken by the board members as they felt they did not have accurate data on the problem, and Supt. Harry Harvie was asked to furnish the desired information as

to the number of students attending basketball and wrestling practices, the number of practices held weekly, the localities the school bus would travel to pick up the pupils, and estimated cost of such transportation.
Board members said they have been aware of the problem for some time, but due to the complexity of the problem and the lack of funds to provide the transportation, the board has found no practical solution. Supt. Harvie stated that when the transportation costs have been estimated, that most probably, the problem will be put up to the district voters when next year's budget has been compiled.
Meanwhile, Mrs. Reese reported today that the PTA committee had met with the Deer Creek parents of the student athletes, and they agreed to take turns furnishing transportation for the boys.

To Purchase Shades
The board voted to purchase shades for the windows of the drafting room in the new shop building.
The board also discussed at length the problem of pupils leaving the school grounds during the lunch hour and causing an undesirable hazard as they walk along the highway. It was pointed out that some trucks and cars are exceeding the speed limit on the highway near the school.

ASABLANCA, Morocco—Three U. S. Navy helicopters Thursday rescued the 32 crewmen of the French ship, the Pei Ho, driven aground in a storm Wednesday night.
The 11,000-ton ship struck the off (Lebanon) and was pounded by giant waves until the crew was broken in two.
The helicopters from U.S. bases at the Lajes and Sidi Bouan brought off the crew four at a time.
The Pei Ho had called Casablanca and was bound for Genoa when she was swept southward by the storm.

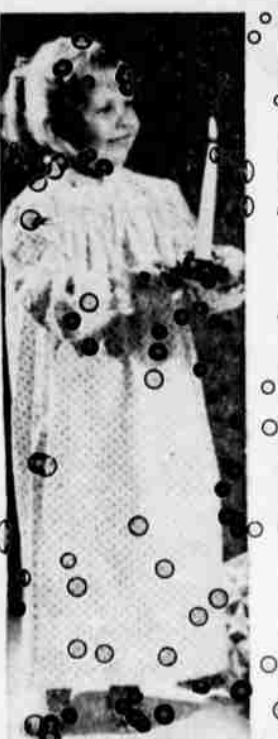
Cub Scout Pack 29 of Oakland will have its Christmas program after school Dec. 17, at the Presbyterian parish home, to be followed by caroling on the streets.
