WASHINGTON — The Marine Corps is turning to electronic brains to help keep track of the 250,000 separate items in its \$1,700,000 inventory.

The Marines said this week they are beginning installation of computers at key points in their interconnected supply information systems and expect to have the new equipment in operation by July 1. The first computer is to be installed at Albany, Ga.

The machines, among other things, will compare stocks on hand with lists of needs and furnish guidance to officers responsible for keeping the shelves filled.

Gov. Holmes Protests Tuna Quota Reduction

SALEM — Gov. Holmes protested Wednesday against any move to reduce the quota or increase the tariff on imported frozen tuna.

The governor advised his office that he had made the statement before the U. S. tariff commission in Washington, D. C.

He pointed out that Oregon's tuna canning industry depends upon tuna imported from Japan.

"We believe in Oregon that this has been a splendid example of our Oregon wheat, barley and lumber products on a 4 to 1 basis. Both directly and indirectly, the trade with Japan furnishes employment for Oregon citizens," the governor said.

'Assorted' Bowls, Part Of Holiday Scene

A discussion of the "Sugar Bowl" on New Year's Day does not center around the sweets dish — as all sports-minded Americans know!

But how did the change in meaning for the words "sugar bowl" on this day take place?

It began in 1902 with another "name-switch," "rose bowl." On the first day of that year, as a part of the Tournament of Roses, the first "east-west" game was played as the "Rose Bowl Game."

For several years, chariot races were run in the Rose Bowl as a substitute for the football game of the initial year. However, the public lost interest.

In 1916, collegiate football returned and has remained as a Rose Bowl event every New Year's Day since.

The interest in these games increased encouraging other regional contests to be held around the country.

Today, in addition to the Rose Bowl and Sugar Bowl, there are many others. Among them are the Orange Bowl, the Sun Bowl, the Gator Bowl and even a Pineapple Bowl in Hawaii and an Ice Bowl in Alaska.

Bowl games have become such a solid tradition, most Americans cannot imagine New Year's Day without them.

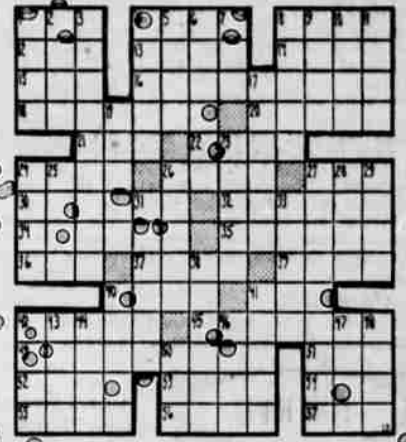

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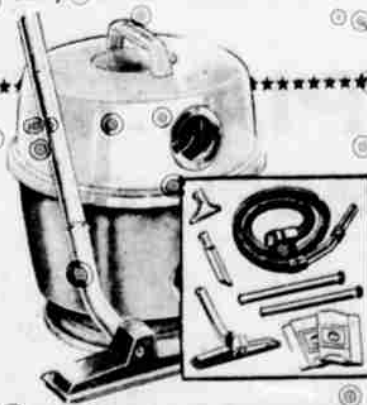
