Neuberger Opposes Proposal For Ike To Quit His Office

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said this week he was unalterably opposed to some recent suggestions that President Eisenhower step aside because of the burdens of his office.

The senator, in a statement released by his office here, said: "Such an abdication would never take place unless the most respected medical authorities in the nation would certify that the President had absolutely no hope of recovery from a disease which totally incapacitated him for service."

A condition ripe for intrigue of "The Man in the Iron Mask" variety would be created, he added, should the President resign in favor of Vice President Nixon.

Neuberger went on to say: "An untenable situation would exist in the nation if the elected president resigned his office because of illness and then, later, made a full recovery."

"To whom would the public look for leadership to the vice president occupying the White House, or to the real President, playing golf, shooting grouse at some retreat?"

"We would have a condition as ripe for intrigue and unrest as in Dumas' novel 'The Man in the Iron Mask' when France was supposed to have had two kings," he said.

Eugene Council Delays Action On 'Dry Zone'

EUGENE — The City Council here this week delayed further consideration of the "dry zone" around the University of Oregon, pending an opinion from Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton on the legality of the beerless area.

Councilmen tabled applications for 1958 package beer licenses submitted by three grocery stores inside the dry zone and by another store on the boundary of the zone. Four weeks ago, by a 4-3 vote, the council endorsed 1957 license applications submitted by the three stores inside the zone as well as a 1958 license submitted by the 19th St. Market, which is the boundary of the zone.

All four applications were returned by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission without action. Subsequently the OLCC indicated it will seek an opinion from the state's attorney general regarding the legality of the beerless area.

Wesley Bethje filed his complaint against Vern E. Kutz and Harry Olson for an accident that occurred Dec. 6, 1955. The accident happened three miles south of Myrtle Creek on Highway 99. Bethje charges that the Olson vehicle, in which he was a passenger, was struck by the Kutz car as Olson was attempting to make a left turn. Olson was traveling south.

The plaintiff allegedly received a twisted spine and injuries to his back that will permanently partially disable him and prevent him from pursuing his vocation as a construction foreman.

He asks for \$70,000 general damages and \$2,289 special damages.

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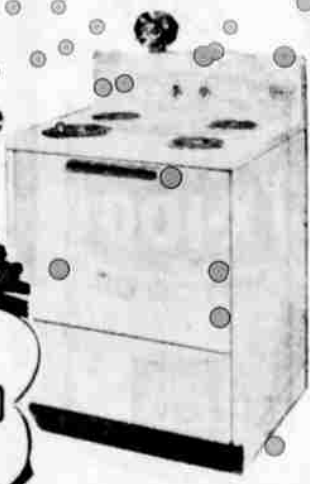
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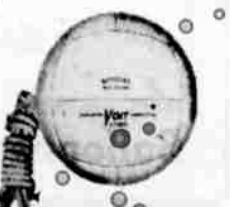
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
