State Drops 3 Vice Charges

PORTLAND — The state dropped three more charges Thursday in the Portland vice investigation.

One of the dismissed charges was against ex-Dist. Atty. William M. Langley, the only major figure convicted so far in the investigation. Langley was removed from office after being convicted of failing to enforce a gambling law. He has appealed.

The charge dropped against him was one of maliciously procuring a search warrant for a 1956 raid on the home of an employee of gambler Big Jim Elkins, the state's principal witness in the vice probe.

Arthur G. Higgs, assistant attorney general, in moving for dis-

missal, said there was no doubt in his mind that Langley had acted with "probable cause" in getting the search warrant.

Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding dismissed that charge and two others, accusing a Portland policeman, Jack E. Childers, of perjury and false swearing.

Research Administrator Of State Resigns Post

SALEM — William W. Collier, administrator of the management research division of the state Department of Finance and Administration, announced his resignation Thursday, effective Jan. 15. He said he plans to enter private business.

Collier has been with the department since it was created six years ago.

John F. Richardson, director of the department, said he would announce Collier's successor in a few days.

Laborers Union Head Is Fined

PITTSBURGH — Nicholas A. Strone head of a common laborers union, is fined \$5,000 and given a 3-year federal prison term Thursday for extorting \$31,274 from a contractor.

Strone was sentenced by Judge John L. Miller in U. S. District Court. Strone's attorney, Vincent M. Casey, said he will file an appeal.

Strone, president of Laborers District Council and Local 1058 of the AFL Construction, General Laborers and Materials Handling

Union, was convicted under the Hobbs Anti-racketeering Act. The act makes it a federal offense to extort money by threats of strikes or other labor troubles.

At Strone's trial, William S. Rider, a concrete contractor, testified that Strone demanded money as a guarantee that Rider would have no labor troubles.

At the time, Rider said, he was supplying concrete for construction of a new steel mill. He said Strone demanded 30 cents on each cubic yard of concrete delivered to the construction site.
