After having watched the new foul rule applied in the Roseburg-Sutherland basketball encounter Tuesday, we are sure that it hasn't hurt the game any. The new rule may work out to provide just the "adequate return" that should be acquired upon being fouled.

ITS MAIN PURPOSE, of course, is to keep the game turning into a four-thrown contest, and yet provide a penalty for fouling. For the initiated, the new rule provides the fouler team an extra free throw after having been fouled five times in a half. It removes the one-and-one rule of past years on the personal foul.

Actually, Tuesday night's game was not a good one to determine the effectiveness of the new rule. It was a closer game, it would be easier to determine its popularity, for sure. But as to its workability, it seems to have enough teeth in it to prevent some fouling and at the same time still leave its mark on the fouling team.

If the rule is as good as it sounds, then it will probably be around a lot longer than those tried and failed in recent other seasons. The long grind will tell.

DRAIN, which finished in sixth place in the state A-2 tournament last year, has taken the mythical title the past two years, each time with a final regular season mark of 18 wins and four losses. It may be remembered that last season, also, Glide placed second in Drain in the regular season win-loss standings, but went on to edge Drain 45-43 in the fourth-place playoff game at the state tourney—which all-in-all shows that the win-loss rating system is comparatively accurate in team-rankings.

Winners in previous years, incidentally, have been Myrtle Creek (17-5) in 1954-55 and Reedsport (16-5) in 1953-54.

The list has grown so that nine schools are included now, Ridge having attained A-2 status this year and Oakland the year before.

Defending Champion Drain is now in a three-way tie for fourth place with Reedsport (which lost to North Bend, 47-47) and beat Siuslaw, 52-47, at Ridge. Roseburg and Douglas are the only unbeatens on the list, despite the earliness of the season, but even that mark is sure to go out the

Bulldog Matmen Win 12 Matches To Beat Indians

Sutherland firmly established itself as one of the top wrestling teams in the area Thursday night with a sound 25-18 thumping of the Roseburg varsity and a 29-19 walk-away of the Indian jayvee squad in matches held at Roseburg.

The Bulldogs took seven of the 12 matches during the night, but only one of those was in the 120-pound class where Jerry Perez of the Bulldogs, showing the form that brought him two state championships in a row, pinned John Antonen of the Indians 11:20 of the second round.

Roseburg gained two of its four wins by pins, with Felix Raddatz pinning Charles Wright of the Bulldogs in 20 of the second round and C. B. Simons, in the fastest bout of the evening, pinning Merle Shoroy at 97, Mike Taylor at 147, Tom Gilman at 167 and Bill Nelson at 177 were winners through pins.

California, UCLA Defection From PCC Awaits Final Say

LOS ANGELES — The question of whether the University of California and UCLA withdraw from the PCC is expected to be decided by the PCC Friday.

The board of regents governing the body for all the California University campuses, is due to open the question at a 2 p.m. (PST) open meeting.

What recommendations, if any, were formulated in Thursday's closed committee meetings are not known.

Chairman Edward W. Carter of the regents' Educational Policy Committee said any disclosure must await Friday's meeting. Chancellors Raymond B. Allen of UCLA and Clark Kerr of Berkeley were before Carter's committee.

Dr. Robert Gordon Sprout, president of the university, sat in with the committee.

Faculty alumni and student support for withdrawal has come from both campuses again this year, as it has periodically since California and UCLA, along with Southern California and Washington University, were penalized by the conference for illegal aid to athletes.

Last June the California regents drew up a new program on scholastic standards, abolition of the PCC and a 100-hour schedule, free of outside aid to athletes, and a need for institutional self-enforcement of policies.

Most of these demands were rejected by the PCC at a recent meeting. The California regents said they whether in or out of the conference.

If the California campuses bolt the PCC, the breakup of the 42-year-old conference might well follow because there are some 100 schools in the conference and USC and Washington might go along.

The date of July 1, 1959, has been talked about as a possible withdrawal date for California and UCLA. The date is when PCC sanctions against UCLA expire.

USC and Washington penalties end until next July 1. California has completed its probation period.

Charles Starns in the 120-pound class, Dave Woods in the 127 and Bruen Almske in the 112-pound weights were the only Glide winners by pins.

Starns pinned Terry Fox of the Trojans in the first round. In the latest match of the meet, while Manski pinned Bernard Long and Woods pinned Dick Wells, both in the second round.

High Hopes For Top-Notch Cage Team Held By Harper

Coach Bill Harper didn't veil his hopes for a top-notch basketball team at Roseburg High this year when he spoke to Rotarians at the weekly meeting in Roseburg Thursday noon.

"I think we have a pretty good chance of getting into the state tourney," he said. He took a page from Len Cassanova, University of Oregon football coach, however, when he stressed the team would play the games "one at a time."

Has Height
Coach Harper said his varsity team has "pretty good height" this year and the experience of tall men Wes Jackson, Larry Sloan and Tom Barron.

He indicated that much more than a mere championship rests on the success of the team. "If we can get a championship team, I'm sure athletics at Roseburg High will pick up," he said.

Harper outlined his team for its work in defeating Sutherland handsily at the season's opener. He gave particular credit for the defense the team Gray up to hold Sutherland to 32 points.

He claimed the next game, at Corvallis, however, would be a major test of the team's mettle. "With Jackson out (with the flu), we will be in for a rough time," he said.

Harper also explained the new foul rule under which a fouled player gets a chance for an extra free throw if the opposing team has already committed four fouls. He said he felt this will bring about greater emphasis on zone defenses in the state.
