

Riddle District 'Fully Standard'

Word has been received from the State Department of Education that Riddle High School has now been rated "fully standard," reports Supt. Kenneth A. Stuart. He told correspondent Mrs. Erma Best that the entire district now holds "standard" rating. The elementary school was similarly rated in February.

The high school inspection was made by Willard Bear, state director of secondary education.

The most serious inadequacy listed in the report was the dressing room area which was found to be too limited in dressing and storage space and shower facilities. Unsatisfactory lighting in the shop department was considered an "eye health hazard."

Commendation was given for adequacy of instructional equipment and supplies and their use by instructors. Bear said the general behavior of students and their attention to instruction was indicative that their learning activities were "meaningful and challenging."

He continued that there was "every reason to expect that an outstanding instructional program may be developed at Riddle, providing these ingredients essential to the development of a high quality program can be maintained. The attainment of these standards and ratings is a tribute to the many long hours of planning and working by the board of directors and administrators over a period of several years and the willingness of local taxpayers to finance and support the necessary improvements," he concluded.

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Canyonville High Correspondence Courses Okayed

Supt. O. J. Monger was instructed to make necessary arrangements for interested students. The courses would be given with the counseling of high school teachers. The courses are being offered by the State Department of Education's extension division.

During the same meeting, it was reported that the librarian had shipped all obsolete textbooks to an agency in San Francisco, which ships them for Asiatic distribution, paying the shipping charges from Canyonville.

Washington's Deer Kill One Of Lowest

SPOKANE — Washington state had one of the poorest deer seasons this past fall in 10 years, members of the Washington State Sportsmen's Council were told Sunday.

Burton Lauchhart, head biologist for the State Fish and Game Department, said the kill totaled only about 50,000 animals. He said 60,000 were taken a year ago and a peak number of some 90,000 in 1955.

The biologist, speaking at the council's 95th quarterly meeting, said lack of snow and cold kept deer at higher elevations and foliage didn't deteriorate until late along the coast.

However, upland bird hunters bagged 450,000 pheasant during the past season — the best shooting in eight years, he reported.

Dave Beck Freed On Bond Pending New Trial Effort

SEATTLE — Dave Beck, retiring president of the Teamsters Union, remained free on \$3,000 bond Monday following his conviction Saturday of the theft of \$1,900 from the sale of a union-owned Cadillac.

After the jury of five men and seven housewives returned its verdict following 8 hours and 17 minutes of deliberation, Beck's attorney filed a motion for a new trial.

The Seattle Times said it had learned that Beck's attorneys will charge misconduct by jurors as a basis for a new trial.

The jury found the 63-year-old Beck guilty of grand larceny. Beck, reputed to be a millionaire, has also handled millions of dollars for the Teamsters Union.

Punishment for the crime for which he was convicted after a 12-day trial can be a sentence up to 15 years in prison. There has been no indication when sentence will be passed.

Beck will face more court troubles in April. He goes on trial then in Tacoma in federal court to answer charges he evaded \$240,000 in income taxes for the years 1950-53.

Conviction of Beck came exactly two weeks after his son, Dave Jr., 37, was found guilty on two counts of pocketing \$4,650 from the sale of two other used, union-owned Cadillacs.

Unemployed Number Expected To Be Higher

PORTLAND — The number of unemployed in the Portland area this winter is expected to exceed last year's peak by 35 to 40 per cent.

This estimate comes from the Oregon State Employment Service which says the number of jobless in mid-October was 16,300. This is the highest number for the month since 1954. October totals are the latest one available.

This year's October total was 7,800 higher than the same month last year, and was 2,100 above September of this year.

Unemployment was highest in seasonal industries. Slight employment gains were reported in apparel, textile mill products, durable goods and services.

Average weekly earnings of manufacturing workers were \$1.06 higher than a year ago.

Vatican Radio Will Air Pope's Midnight Mass

VATICAN CITY — The Christmas midnight mass that Pope Pius XII will celebrate in his private chapel will be broadcast by Vatican Radio.

A Vatican announcement Monday said the ceremony will be accompanied by Christmas music and songs by a Vatican orchestra and choir, in an adjoining chamber.

The Italian news agency Ansa speculated, as have various periodicals recently, that the Pope might announce in his Christmas message on Dec. 22 a consistory for the creation of cardinals. There was no confirmation of this at the Vatican, where a press office spokesman said the contents of the pope's message—usually devoted to peace and the state of the world—are not known.

Seven Aboard Missing Plane; Search Launched

SAN FRANCISCO — An air-ground search was planned today for a twin-engine plane believed to have crashed last night with seven persons aboard on a stormy flight from Reno, Nev.

The plane was en route to San Francisco over the storm-swept Sierra. Its last radio report indicated no trouble.

Nuclear-Powered U. S. Icebreaker Request Planned

WASHINGTON — Rep. Tollefson (R-Wash.) urged Monday that the United States construct a nuclear-powered icebreaker to meet present and future needs in the polar areas.

He said he would introduce a bill early in the next session to authorize such a vessel.

Russia launched the world's first atomic-powered surface ship, the icebreaker Lenin, on Dec. 5. A U.S. nuclear merchant ship, the Savannah, is scheduled to be completed in 1960.

Tollefson, senior Republican on the House Merchant Marine Committee, was one of the first to endorse construction of a nuclear-powered merchant ship. He also has been a strong advocate of U.S. action to press claims to portions of Antarctica.

He said he believes it is "obvious in the light of recent events that our activities in the Antarctic will increase during the years ahead."

At the same time, Tollefson said, immediate use could be made of a nuclear-powered icebreaker in carrying supplies to the DEWline warning system above the Arctic Circle.

Saying that nuclear-powered vessels have from six to eight times the cruising range of conventional ships, he added:

"The advantage of having an icebreaker which could operate the year around without refueling and which could, if built as a combination cargo-icebreaker, deliver supplies and oil by itself, would be inestimable."

Freeze Puts Embargo On Florida Fruit

LAKELAND, Fla. — The Florida Citrus Commission placed a strict embargo Monday on shipments of all citrus for fresh fruit purposes from 7 a.m. Tuesday until 7 a.m. Dec. 24.

The embargo is intended to keep freeze-damaged fruit from the markets and thus protect the reputation of Florida citrus.

The commission also banned the use of juice from freeze-damaged oranges for making frozen concentrate. No expiration date was set on this regulation although the commission indicated it would end the same time as the fresh fruit embargo. It will take effect at 5 p.m. Tuesday.
