

High Winds, Heavy Rains Rake State; Power Knocked Out

High winds and heavy rain raked Oregon Monday night and Tuesday, knocking down trees and causing a number of power blackouts.

Guests up to 52 miles an hour hit the Portland area, and toppled a tree over a 11,500-volt line of the Portland General Electric Co. near Beaverton.

Some areas near Beaverton were without power for 11 hours. The Pacific Northwest Electric and Light Co. said it had some transmission lines near Salem and Albany.

Most electrical service, however, was restored by Tuesday morning.

The rain which accompanied the whipping winds left 1.10 inches of precipitation at Astoria, and heavy amounts at most other Western Oregon points.

Brookings reported 1.03 inches of rain. Eugene, 84 of an inch. Roseburg, 74. Salem, 59 and Klamath Falls, 48.

Freezing Level Drops

As the rain continued Tuesday, the weather bureau said the freezing level dropped from 8,000 to 4,700 feet.

The bureau said a few snow flurries are expected near the mountains in Eastern Oregon Tuesday night and Wednesday.

Western Oregon will have occasional showers through Wednesday, the bureau said. Brief periods of sunshine are expected Wednesday afternoon. And the bureau said it will be cooler.

Temperatures generally were above freezing Tuesday morning, but the mercury dropped to 25 degrees at Burns and 31 at Klamath Falls.

The storm left a heavy snowfall in Oregon's mountains, passing the Highway Commission report.

It said chains should be carried at Government Camp, Warm Springs Junction, Green Springs, Santiam Pass, Lapine, Willamette Pass, Chemult and Bly.

The heaviest fall in the 24 hours ended at 8 a. m. Tuesday was seven inches at Willamette Pass.

Latin Americans Press Hungary On Closed Trials

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Latin American leaders pressed Hungary Tuesday for a reply to their appeal for Gen. Pal Maleter and two other freedom fighters reportedly facing trial.

Paraguay's Alfredo Stroessner, chairman of the 11-nation Latin American group, and Uruguayan Ambassador Enrique Rodriguez Fabrega conferred for more than 90 minutes with Hungarian delegates Peter Moe, Modoranyi and Jozsef.

The Red Subgroup government had begun the trials of Maleter, Gen. Istvan Kovacs and Sandor Kpaci.

The Latin American leaders urged their committee appeal last Friday. Later U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge said that if circumstances warranted he would call a special session of the General Assembly on the issue.

The U. S. special committee on Hungary was expected to take up the Hungarian reply later in the day.

He added that any car which was "cleaned by one man in 15 minutes" should be passable.

Cars To Be Inspected

As for the standard Smith proposed to set during the test period, he said S.P. will "inspect every car that arrives in the Portland Division, and see that all cars in the Southern Oregon area are suitable for the job for which they are ordered, free of damage and debris and in a good condition of repair."

Addressing the shippers, Smith said, "I want you fellows to go with us in accepting cars that might take 15 minutes to clean."

McCollum, explaining why S.P. takes the stand that it is not responsible for cleaning of cars, said Interstate Commerce Commission figures show that it costs a carrier about \$12.75 to clean a boxcar compared to \$1.95 for a shipper. He said this is because a railroad must have additional expense in moving cars to special cleaning tracks where proper facilities are available.

Expressing the opposite view, Ferguson said the question of whether the railroads are liable for the fact that they have worked out a plan to clean themselves a policy of not passing off dirty cars on each other.

Agreement Is Wanted

Along the same lines, Morgan said he hoped to see a future agreement between the railroads through either the ICC or the American Association of Railroads, by which responsibility for dirty cars would be accurately placed.

He said the problem probably would largely be cleared up by the time the plan was worked out, and if firms allowing their cars to become unacceptably dirty could be held responsible.

At Washington, a Defense Department preliminary announcement said the launching was a success.

Five minutes later another announcement said:

"The missile was prescribed course and landed in the associated impact area."

This was the third attempt of the Atlas to test one of its "intercontinental" missiles. The other two attempts failed.

The Department emphasized the word "launching," noting that full results of the test would have to be reported later.

The full range from Cape Canaveral extends in a southeasterly direction past the West Indies across the equator between South America and Africa, with the projected impact area in the region of the Atlantic Ocean.

Pravda Continues Barrage At Opening Of NATO Session

MOSCOW — Pravda and Izvestia said Tuesday the opening of the NATO summit conference laid bare "irreconcilable contradictions" in the Western camp.

Soviet propaganda continued to hammer on the theme that the Western Alliance is torn by distrust and dissension.

Pravda said President Eisenhower "trying to do the impossible — try to soothe public opinion at the same time he attempts to 'maintain the atmosphere of international distrust and pressure the members of NATO into accepting American military plans which would return Europe into an atomic graveyard."

The main target of the Soviet propaganda remains the U. S. proposal to equip the continental allies with intermediate range ballistic missiles and to put stockpiles of atomic warheads in Europe. The Soviet editorials said the only solution to the current impasse is negotiations with the Soviet Union.

Moscow Radio said Eisenhower's opening NATO speech disappointed those who hope for a new course toward world peace.

Broad Acceptance

Progress made on this basic political issue indicated broad acceptance of the idea that NATO military planners can go ahead with detailed work on the next few months. But final decisions on installing intermediate range ballistic missiles (IRBM) bases in Europe with American-controlled nuclear warhead stockpiles may be deferred for the time.

Besides the question of missiles and negotiating with Russia, other issues slated to the foreign ministers' discussion at their second session of the conference included disarmament, German reunification, the Middle East, relations between NATO and other international organizations, Africa, economic aid and foreign political consultation among the allies.

Taken By Surprise

The sharp difference of approach between the United States and the European allies toward Europe's missile age security seems to have taken the United States somewhat by surprise.

American officials had hoped for acceptance of principle of warheads and supply medium range missiles to NATO countries willing to accept them.

Speculation now is that in emotional settlement on this issue, the European allies will offer the United States a compromise.

The summit council would instruct the supreme commander, Gen. Lauris Norstad, to study the whole problem, sound out countries on basic ideas, and report at a NATO ministerial meeting next spring.

American and other officials say the Western pact against the Soviet Union could be strengthened by negotiating and finding out whether any real agreements are possible.

Eisenhower and Dulles, while not ruling out the principle of a common defense, think nothing would come of East-West talks in the foreseeable future. Both sides were almost bluntly by European leaders Monday that they must do something along that line.

Both German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and British Prime Minister Macmillan took the line that the West could not take the initiative in conflict with Russia.

Statue Eulogizes Gen. Billy Mitchell

WASHINGTON — A statue of Billy Mitchell, stormy prophet of air warfare, was unveiled Tuesday at what could hardly be a more appropriate time and place.

Thirty-two years ago an Army court-martial suspended Col. Mitchell from rank and command. He had argued — publicly and heatedly — the United States was mired in old-fashioned military methods while warfare was taking to the air.

Today—in a capital busy with charges and countercharges—the America is fumbling the transition to space weapons—a bigger life-size bronze figure of Mitchell in display at the Smithsonian Institution. The statue, by sculptor Bruce Moore, is the gift of George H. Stephenson of Philadelphia.

It is to be unveiled by Mitchell's son William, who has been pressing for reversal of his father's 1925 court-martial conviction on charges of making statements prejudicial to good order and discipline. At the time of the Mitchell court-martial, the Air Corps was part of the Army. It became independent in 1919.

An Air Force review board held a hearing on the Mitchell case last year and reportedly recommended reversal of the conviction. Its recommendations still are awaiting action by Secretary of the Air Force, James H. Douglas.

He was born in Owensville, Ind., Dec. 1, 1877, and was married Dec. 25, 1901, to Loris Smith, who preceded him in death in 1947.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Eulalia Carl of Vale and Mrs. Ruby Norton of Portland; one grandchild, a son, one grandson, one great-grandchild and one great-great-grandchild.

Interment will be in the Yoncalia Cemetery, Yoncalia.
