

Pope Calls On Mankind To Halt Arms Race Sunday In Annual Talk To World

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Pius XII called on mankind Sunday to halt the arms race lest it lead to the annihilation of the human race.

The pontiff's speech, beamed to a host of nations by the Vatican's powerful new radio transmitter, was believed to be the most widely broadcast message in history.

Affirms Defense Right
As he did last Christmas, the Pope affirmed man's right for self defense, but he called on the governments of the world not to be misled by pride in a race for arms supremacy.

The cost of an arms race is ruinous, he warned.
"Such quantities of material such sums of money derived from savings and the result of restrictions and toil," he said, "such expenditures of human labor taken away from urgent need, are consumed to prepare these new arms."

"Even the wealthiest nations," he cautioned, "must foresee the times in which they will regret the dangerously weakened harmony of the national economy, or are in fact already regretting it, though endeavoring to conceal the fact."

Endorses NATO
Without calling them by name, the Pope endorsed the North Atlantic Alliance, the United Nations and Western disarmament proposals, saying: "The divine law of rulers of nations imposes on all members of the obligation to reduce armaments under a system of effective inspection, to deter whoever should aim at disturbing the peace with the most fully guaranteed mutual dependence between the nations which sincerely desire it."

The pontiff delivered his message from his throne in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome after receiving the Christmas greetings of the College of Cardinals. Twelve of the cardinals were present.

In the Holy Land, shopkeepers and hotel proprietors looked forward to a profitable Christmas season as visitors flocked away last year by a "Middle East war rumbling" flocked back.

With some 6,000 tourists expected, hotels already were booked solid in Jerusalem, Jericho and other towns around Bethlehem.

The no man's land between Jordan and Israel was quieter than it has been in years. Jordan's King Hussein lifted the night curfew from the Arab side of the Holy Land for the Christmas festivities.

Porter To Request \$23 Million For His 4th District

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Porter (D-Ore.) said Monday he plans to ask Congress to appropriate a minimum of \$23 million for public works projects in Oregon's 4th Congressional District.

Although items to be recommended in the President's budget are not yet known, Porter said amounts he will ask are those which Army Engineers say can be used "at an economical rate" during the year beginning next July 1.

Just one of the amounts Porter said he would recommend is \$12 million dollars to continue construction of Hills Creek Dam on the Middle Fork of the Willamette River. Cougar Dam on the McKenzie River is included for 7 million dollars.

To Ask Dam Money
Although it has been rumored the President's budget request will contain no money for any new project starts, Porter said he will ask Congress to appropriate two million dollars to complete preconstruction planning and start building Green Peter Dam on the South Santiam River.

Another new start proposed by Porter would involve appropriation of 1 1/2 million dollars to begin work on the Gold Beach Harbor improvement at the mouth of the Rogue River.

Other recommendations which he will put before the House Appropriations Committee, he said, include \$800,000 for Willamette River bank protection and the following planning items: Coos and Millicoma rivers navigation, \$19,000; Blue River flood control reservoir, \$195,000; Fall Creek flood control reservoir, \$150,000; Holley Reservoir, \$110,000.

An added \$35,000, he said, will be asked for various flood control surveys and preliminary examinations being conducted by Army Engineers on Southwest Oregon streams and watersheds.

Patterson, retired owner of the Patterson's Bakery, died Saturday at his home on Flint Street. He was born Sept. 12, 1875, in Honover, Pa., and came to Roseburg 15 years ago. He was married in 1900 to Gertrude Swanson in Omaha, Neb., and lived for a number of years in Payette, Idaho.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Shenandoah, Iowa, of Laurel Masonic Lodge, Roseburg, and a member of the York City Masonry.

Surviving are his wife, Gertrude, Roseburg; a son, George, Roseburg; and a brother, Will Patterson, Shenandoah, Iowa.

Former Boxer, Longshoreman Shot To Death

BOSTON (AP)—Police turned to the Boston waterfront Monday for possible clues in the gangland-style slaying of Thomas W. (Tommy) Sullivan, 39, longshoreman and former prominent middle-weight fighter.

Sullivan was shot down with three bullets in the head as he was walking to work Sunday night.

Witnesses said the shots were fired from a moving automobile containing four men.

A medical examiner said Sullivan died instantly on the sidewalk about 200 feet from the home in South Boston which he shared with his 83-year-old widowed mother.

The scene was well-lighted with street lamps and Christmas illumination.

Police said they were investigating a report that Sullivan might have been killed in retaliation for speaking out against the New York leaders of the International Longshoremen's Union.

Controversial
Daniel J. Donovan, union leader, denied the assertion, saying he knew of no trouble along the Boston waterfront. He added that to his knowledge Sullivan was not a controversial figure.

Donovan also denied knowledge of a second unsubstantiated report that Sullivan was involved in a violent argument recently on the docks.

The killers apparently knew Sullivan's routine well.

Sullivan was a prominent fighter for about 10 years, quitting the ring to work as a longshoreman in 1950.

In 1946, the first of his two fights with Al "Red" Priest set a Boston Garden record with a gate of \$59,000 — a record since broken. Priest won both fights.

In addition to his work as a longshoreman, Sullivan taught gym classes.

Search Resumes For Missing Man
HILLSBORO, Ore. (AP)—The search resumed early Monday for a little, 67-year-old man who vanished Saturday after setting off from his farm home for a walk in the woods.

Four bloodhounds owned by Norman Wilson of Dallas, Ore., were pressed into the search Sunday night for Chris Ritter.

Sgt. Jack Clark of the Washington County sheriff's office said the dogs were worked through a three-mile area but found no solid trace of the 5-3, 135-pound farmer. They gave up at 1 a.m. and waited for day light.

Clark said the dogs picked up a number of scents, but none led to the slight, white-whiskered Ritter.

Ritter wore heavy shoes, jeans and two shirts when he set out for a walk near his home 10 miles north of here.

Rain and snow hit the area late Saturday and early Sunday, but later gave way to overcast skies.

Sutherlin Water Okay
Sutherlin's water system was knocked out after the filtration plant was flooded Friday night. Five miles east of Sutherlin on Calapooia Creek, but it went back into operation Saturday night, according to City Manager C. Dean Smith. He said the city was in no danger of a water shortage since the reservoir held enough for 2 1/2 days.

Sutherlin Creek ran over into parts of the business district again, but sandbags limited damage.

State highway division engineer Frank Morgan and county Engineer Al May both reported that roads were put quickly back into operation after minor mishaps.

The most noteworthy was a small rock slide on the Pacific Highway on Roberts Mountain. Sunday afternoon one-way traffic was instituted for a short time until the slide was cleared. Morgan said only minor slides in the rest of the state highways in the county were noted.

Culverts Plugged
The county also had to clear a few minor slides, but the most trouble was caused by plugging culverts during the high water. Several county roads were closed for short times Friday night and Saturday but were quickly put back into operation as the high water subsided. May said all road closures were "just a matter of hours."

The speed of the rise and fall of the streams of the basin were indicated by the short duration of the Douglas County flood emergency network. Ben B. Irving, chairman of the Water Resources Survey, said the flood net was put into operation at 7 a.m. and was discontinued at 1 p.m. Saturday.

Drunkennes Charges Bring Fines To Two
Two Roseburg men were fined \$25 a piece by Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum Saturday after they pleaded guilty to charges of drunkenness in an automobile. Both paid their fines and were released.

The men, Otis Severson, 45, 1318 N. Main St., and Bernard Clarence Mlodnick, 33, 134 SE Burke Ave., were apprehended Friday night in Severson's parked car at the South Roseburg hotel.

Assessor Pledges To Fight Charges Of Tax Evasion

CHICAGO (AP)—Frank Keenan, Cook County (Ill.) assessor, convicted of evading more than \$221,000 in income taxes, says he will not resign and will fight any attempts to remove him from office.

"I have been advised that the verdict of the jury does not disqualify me as assessor," Keenan told a news conference Sunday. "I shall resist any effort by the state's attorney to remove me from office."

The 61-year-old Democrat-turned-Republican faces a possible jail term or fine, possible loss of his job and political exile.

But Keenan promised a battle on all fronts.

"I'm not guilty. I've done nothing wrong," he told reporters. "I said his conviction Saturday in Danville was politically motivated. His attorneys already have said they plan to file a motion for a new trial."

Keenan's conviction came after more than 13 hours of jury deliberation. He was found guilty of seven counts of defrauding the government of \$221,000 in taxes in 1950-52, and one count alleging conspiracy.

Convicted on a conspiracy charge were his brothers, Mark, 66, Chicago, and James, 61, Ojai, Calif. His sons, Edward, 32, and George, 30, both of Chicago, were acquitted of a similar conspiracy charge.

State Highways Back To Normal
SALEM (AP)—Receding flood waters Monday permitted traffic to proceed on all state highways, the Highway Commission reported.

There was one-way traffic 11 miles north of Florence on the Oregon Coast Highway, but the section between Coquille and Bandon, which had been closed by high water, was open to normal traffic.

On Highway 42 between Coquille and Roseburg, there were several spots of one-way traffic. The Coquille-Eastside Highway was opened to controlled traffic, with a gauge of water over the road east of Vanburden Bridge.

Chains should be carried because of packed snow at Government Camp, Warm Springs Junction, Santiam Pass and Willamette Pass. Those points had only an inch or two of new snow in the 24 hours ended at 8 a.m. Monday.

As explained by Superintendent of Schools Lewis Cole, the new program will be all-inclusive, geared to the needs of the arts as well as the science student, and will begin in elementary school.

Under the plan, which goes into effect next year, advanced children will be screened by means of extensive testing and checks.

A student accelerated under the plan could graduate from high school at 13, receive a baccalaureate degree at 19 and a Ph.D. by the age of 22.

Edward Gein Not Competent To Stand Trial

WISCONSIN RAPIDS (AP)—Circuit Judge Harperts, Wis. Judge said Monday that authorities at Central Hospital for the criminal insane have reported to him that Edward Gein, Plainfield bachelor recluse who admitted killing and mutilating two women and looting the graves of a dozen more, is "not competent to stand trial."

Judge Bundel, who ordered Gein's commitment for a sanity hearing when the 31-year-old handyman was arraigned Nov. 21, said that he would be "extended" beyond the first 30-day period he ordered.

The judge also said he would order a formal sanity hearing "at a time and place to be designated later."

The frail-appearing Gein was committed under his arraignment on a charge of first degree murder in the Nov. 15 mutilation slaying of Mrs. Bernice Worden, 58-year-old Plainfield hardware store operator.

Mrs. Worden's body dressed out like a deer carcass, was found hung by the heels in the woods behind Gein's secluded farmhouse on the night of the slaying.

The discovery was only the first of a horrifying series as investigators searching through the cluttered interior of the rambling old farmhouse found ghastly relics of human skin, skulls and other fragments of bodies.

During extensive questioning, Gein also admitted the slaying and similar mutilation of Mrs. Mary Hogan, 34-year-old tavern operator in a nearby county, in December of 1954.

However, he contended that the other female parts found in his home all had been taken from new graves.

Body Of Witness In UAW Shooting Probe Recovered
ST. CLAIR SHORES, Mich. (AP)—Police in St. Clair Shores, Mich., reported Monday that the body of a witness in a shooting that killed a UAW worker was recovered.

Workers whose body was pulled from Lake St. Clair Sunday died of accidental drowning, a coroner's report said last night.

Winstead, 44, was to be a key witness in a \$4-million-dollar suit now under way against the union, Detroit police and state police. He vanished from his home near the lake Dec. 15 "for a walk on the ice" and never returned. The following day he was scheduled to testify in the case.

His body was seen floating in the lake four blocks from his home by a passer-by.

Dr. Richard Olson, a Pontiac, Mich., pathologist who performed the autopsy with Macomb County Coroner Raymond C. Markle, said there were no signs indicating death other than by drowning.

Winstead was one of the defendants in a malicious prosecution suit brought against the UAW and others by Carl Renda, one of four men arrested in 1954 in connection with the 1948 shotgun wounding of Walter P. Reuther, UAW president.

Davenport died Saturday in a local hospital. He was born Nov. 10, 1881, in Mississippi and had lived in this community for the past 30 years. He was a retired railroad fireman. He was a member of the First Christian Church.

Surviving are his wife, Mabel, Hamm, Portland; a daughter, Mrs. Eva Meister, Fort Smith, Ark.; two brothers, Al Davenport, Roseburg, and Dewey Davenport, Huntington Park, Calif.; and two sisters, Mrs. Mittie Hatfield, Huntington Park, Calif., and Mrs. Dave Woods, Henrietta, Okla.

Chinese Nationalist Ships Clash With Reds
TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Nationalist Defense Ministry reported today that its warships clashed for 62 minutes early today with two Chinese Communist gunboats just off the mainland.

The Nationalists said they suffered no casualties or damage and made no claims of hits on the Red gunboats. The number and type of Nationalist ships involved were not disclosed.

Two Slain, Four Wounded Sunday; Jealousy Blamed

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Two persons were slain and four others wounded in two separate shooting incidents across the state Sunday in which jealousy apparently triggered the gunplay.

In Petersburg, a divorced husband, who had warned his wife he wouldn't be responsible if she brought a man into the house, he told brought and paid for, shot and killed a man who did show up in the house, authorities said.

Sheriff's deputies said the former husband, Wilbur Rauch, 41, admitted firing a shotgun blast through the window of his ex-wife's home. Inside, George Shandor, 41, of New Middletown, fell mortally wounded in the left hand as she stood talking to Shandor.

The couple, divorced three years ago, have five children who were asleep in the Rauh home when the shooting occurred.

In Dayton, Det. Lt. Robert C. Beckett announced the arrest of a 24-year-old Negro, Dan Myrick, for questioning in a shooting that killed Mrs. Marie McElroy, 27, year-old mother of a two-week-old baby. The baby was asleep in Mrs. McElroy's three-room apartment which was riddled by bullets from a .38 caliber revolver. The child escaped unharm.

Mrs. Doris Bateman, 33, who lived with the slain woman, her husband, Lonnie Bateman, and Samuel Miller, 24, were wounded in the shooting fray.

nine feet below flood stage and began a steady fall. The weekend rain there was 1.25 inches Saturday and .34 of an inch Sunday.

At Sutherlin, Calapooia Creek made inoperative the city's water filtration system but there was enough water stored in reservoirs to meet the need until the system was restored Sunday.

The street of Sutherlin were flooded 18 inches deep Saturday from Sutherlin Creek and the stores were sandbagged, but the water went down before damage became extensive.

Snow fell heavily in some Cascade Mountain areas.
