137 Tender Arms Result From Shots

"Ouch! Oh! Be careful! Don't bump my arm."

This was the ejaculation heard often from 137 Roseburg High students this month after immunization shots were administered to them.

The diphtheria, tetanus and small-pox vaccinations and tuberculin skin tests were administered by the Douglas County Health Department.

Ten cents for the tuberculin tests and 50 cents for the other shots were charged to cover costs.

Within a few days, if a reddening appears around the area of the tuberculin test, the student has a positive reaction. This means he should have a further examination to determine if tuberculosis is active.

Canyonville Sends 700 Books To Asia

The Canyonville High School library, under the supervision of Mrs. P. J. Gaedecke, this month sent some 700 books, packed in 23 boxes, to Asia. The books were sent through the Asian Foundation, a non-profit, non-political organization that pays the transportation costs of the books.

ALSO GIVES BOOKS — Trades and Industries organization members at Roseburg High School contributed 137 books to the "Books for Asian Students" program. Nine Oregon schools participated in the program, collecting 5,233 books. Notices describing the program will appear in many professional scientific journals early next year.

Chief purpose of the organization is to collect and distribute books to the schools in Asia. Almost half a million specially selected books and journals have been set so far. The foundation says, however, that many more are needed.

Before each of the books was packed, it was cleaned and mended. Then a packing list was made for each box. The job at Canyonville was carried on over a period of two months by Librarian Mrs. Gaedecke and her nine student assistants.

State Youth Code Adoption Dependent On Spontaneity

Some Students Say It May Not Reach Those Who Need It Most

In November, more than 300 delegates at the first Governor's Youth Conference adopted an "Oregon Code for High School Students," she says. It will give them standards from which to work.

The governor's State Committee on Children and Youth was obviously enthusiastic about the adoption of the code as a guide to moral actions and attitudes of high schoolers. But it has become evident in the weeks since then that the "hard sell" will be necessary to achieve the adoption in the individual schools.

Most young people agree to the need of the actions outlined in the code, but some don't feel it will be readily accepted, particularly by those who need it most.

Judy Costelloe of Douglas High School sums it up this way: "The young people who would live with the code are already doing it."

Desire Needed
The roadblock to be met at the individual schools is summed up by Bob Fies of Roseburg High. "I don't think kids have a unified desire to adopt the code. Until we have a desire, it won't be effective."

Youth Conference indicated the code is not a one-way set of rules, applicable only to high schoolers. It is a very good guide for parents," she says. It will give them standards from which to work.

In this sense, several students have indicated it may be of great value to many of the younger students in the high schools to whom parents can apply the standards.

So far in Douglas County, no evident indications have been noted of a spontaneous desire to adopt the code. Students questioned indicated it was the type of code that had to be spontaneously accepted. They said it could not be forced by adults. But many students are obviously giving it considerable thought.

Following is the gist of the code as revised by the high schoolers at the conference.

BASIC RULE
Students and parents should inform each other of their whereabouts while away from home. Parents should know what their sons and daughters are doing and with whom they are spending their time and what time their young people return home.

Proper attitudes consisting of cooperation, respect and love should exist between parents and youth.

PARENT-YOUTH PLANNING
1. Finances should be planned together, based on discussion of ability, needs and the management of money.
2. Family plans should be organized far enough ahead so that (1) necessary transportation for all members of the family can be provided and (2) the individual members can be reached in case of emergency or change of plans.

HOME ENTERTAINING
The home should be the center of young people's social activity. To accomplish this, the cooperation and support of parents is needed. Young people should be encouraged to bring friends into the home and to accept invitations to visit the homes of friends. Parents should welcome the opportunity to meet their sons' and daughters' companions and friends.

DRINKING
Both parents and high school students must consider their responsibilities.
1. No one has a moral or legal right to serve any alcoholic beverages to other people's children. The adult who does so may be charged criminally and is directly responsible for any serious consequences.
2. State law prohibits minors from purchasing, acquiring or having liquor in their possession.
3. Parents should impose any alcoholic beverage brought to a party and notify parents of the offender. No alcoholic beverages should be accessible to young guests.
4. Young people should understand it is no disgrace to decline

an alcoholic drink.
5. Young people should understand that it is foolhardy to ride with a driver who is under the influence of liquor. They should seek other means of transportation.
(6) Host should not admit people bringing liquor to parties and social pressures should be exerted on such people.
(7) No one under 21 has the moral or legal right to drink nor is it in the best interest of health.

SMOKING
Oregon law prohibits sale of cigarettes and tobacco to persons under 18 years of age and prohibits such persons from smoking except in their home and with their parents' consent.
Students should not smoke, as it affects one's self, one's school, community and friends.

CITIZENSHIP
Young people should realize that they have a responsibility to the group of which they are a part.

DRIVING
1. Parental consent for driving privileges should be based on (1) possession of a driver's license, (2) proof of young people's ability to control themselves and the car and (3) a healthy attitude regarding the lives, rights and welfare of others.
2. Training driving instruction is urged.
3. Both parents and youth should be sure a car is in safe operating condition.
4. Young drivers should be expected to assume a portion of responsibility for maintenance and appearance of the shared car.
5. Parents should be firm in their decision to take away the car privilege when it is abused. They should also be generous in their praise of proper driving attitudes and careful handling of the car.
6. Young people should understand that overcrowding of a car is dangerous.
7. Riders should take a share in the responsibility of safe driving.
8. Young people should understand that it is wise to refuse a ride with a reckless driver. They should call their parents or a cab.
