

Supreme Court Bars Reprisals On Non-Strikers

NEW YORK (AP)—A State Supreme Court justice granted a permanent injunction yesterday barring a lodge of the International Assn. of Machinists from taking reprisals against members who failed to support a 1954 strike.

The ruling by Justice Nicholas M. Pette in Jamaica Supreme Court was the first of its kind in New York state and the second in the nation.

The action stemmed from a contract dispute between the union and the Republic Aviation Corp., which led to a six-week strike marked by violence and numerous arrests at company plants on Long Island.

The walkout was ended by an accord under which both sides agreed, among other points, that there would be no reprisals by either group.

Notice of Charges

However, according to evidence produced in court, a month after the strike's end the union lodge notified 2,800 of its several thousand members they must be tried by a union jury or face an oncoming union membership.

This, it was said, was because the 2,800 members refused to strike.

Republic then asked an injunction to prevent the union from carrying out its plan, contending that it was a violation of the agreement and also that the company would suffer irreparable harm.

A temporary injunction was granted to restrain the union pending trial of the issue. The trial was held during the past few days.

Wording 'Ambiguous'

During it the union contended the wording of the no-reprisal clause in its contract was ambiguous and unclear, and that Republic was engaging in unfair labor practices by trying to meddle in union affairs.

Justice Pette rejected the union contentions. He said the language of the contract was clear, valid and binding.

Court attaches said the only other court decision of the kind in this country was issued in California in May 1953.

They said this case involved the Southern California Gas Co. and Local 132 of the Utilities Workers of America, in Los Angeles County.

Chilling East Winds Cause Some Freezing

Chilling east winds sent the thermometer below freezing in most parts of Oregon early Tuesday.

The thermometer plunged to 6 below zero at Chemult in Klamath County, 5 below at Seneca in Grant County and 4 below at Austin in Grant County. The Highway Commission reported.

The Weather Bureau said the sharp east winds will continue to fan over the state Tuesday night, bringing a touch of cold to the first day of the new year.

General cloudiness is expected in the state New Year's Day, with some rain late in the day in Western Oregon, the bureau said.

High clouds will form Wednesday over most of Eastern Oregon. The bureau said, however, it will be fair in the Baker and Klamath Falls areas.

Tuesday morning's east winds raced through Cascade Mountain passes at speeds up to 28 miles an hour. One station recorded gusts up to 46 miles an hour.

The temperature skidded to 7 degrees at Baker and 10 at Bend. Few points in Western Oregon escaped the chill, as the temperature dropped to 26 at Salem and 30 at Eugene.

University Majorettes Band Fly To Rose Bowl

May Jane 'Wail' Salem, and Doreen Morash, Camas, Wash., are the majorettes.

Expenses are being paid by the Rose Bowl Assn.

Band director Ira Lee said half-time entertainment by his group will include "entertainment of the past," with "Showboat," a soft shoe dance, "Two Top Hats," "Me and My Shadow and a salute to the Oregon centennial celebration of 1959.

Settlement Made Ending Threat Of Subway Strike

NEW YORK (AP)—The threat of a New Year's Eve transit strike that could have paralyzed the city evaporated Tuesday with a city hall contract settlement.

Deliverance from the threat of a walkout on the city's subways and bus lines came at 2:40 a.m. Michael J. Quill's Transport Workers Union and the City Transit Authority reached tentative agreement on a two-year contract providing a 32-cent-an-hour wage increase.

Then, with the pattern set, City Labor Commissioner Harold A. Felix spent only two hours in ending a stalemate between the TWU and nine privately owned bus lines, including one in suburban Westchester County.

This agreement calls for wage increases ranging from 18 to 24 cents an hour over two years.

Combined, the subways and buses handle almost 10 million fares a day.

After settlement was reached, Quill spoke the words that millions of New Yorkers had been hoping to hear:

"Everything will continue rolling after midnight tonight."

The contract expires at midnight Tuesday night.

A special citizens committee, appointed late Monday by Mayor Robert F. Wagner to assist in negotiations, announced at 2:40 a.m. that the dispute between the Transport Workers Union and the Transit Authority had been resolved.

The new pact, which is to run for two years, gives the Transit Authority's 31,000 employees a package increase of 32 cents an hour. It is subject to union membership ratification later this week.

TWU President Michael J. Quill had sought a 65-cent package in a one-year contract.

The settlement provides an immediate wage increase of 15 cents an hour and another wage boost Jan. 1, 1959, of 10 cents an hour. The remainder went for fringe benefits.

Police Bullets Halt Escapee; Second Sought

SALEM (AP)—Police bullets stopped one man, but a search still was on Tuesday for another man who escaped from the state hospital criminal insane ward.

The man still at large, Vernon Wesley Street, Lake Grove, was described as potentially dangerous.

The other escapee, James Jacob Johnson, 21, Milwaukee, was sighted in an open field north of Salem a few hours after the escape Monday. When Johnson refused to halt, a state policeman opened fire. Johnson was wounded in the lower part of his back and in a leg. He was recaptured.

Both men had been convicted of burglary and sent to the state prison. They were transferred to the state hospital.

Dr. Dean K. Brooks, hospital superintendent, said the men used a thin piece of steel from a shoe arch support to get through a window screen, then lowered themselves three floors to the ground on a rope of blankets and sheets. The obtained shoes and clothing by breaking into the hospital shoe shop, Brooks said.

Midwest Lashed By Snow Storm

Winter's first major snow storm swirled eastward across most of the Midwest Tuesday, leaving highways hazardous for New Year's Eve travel.

Four traffic deaths in Kansas and two in Missouri were blamed on snow and ice slicked highways.

A rash of minor accidents were reported in Chicago as the snow moved in and was expected to reach a depth of nearly six inches.

Heavy snow warnings were issued for parts of Kansas, Missouri, Illinois and Michigan. Kansas City had four inches of snow on the ground and snow flurries were expected to contribute up to another inch.

Arctic air pushed in behind the storm. Forecasters said the mercury would slide to five above zero in Missouri and Kansas, lowest of the winter.

International Falls, Minn., had an overnight low of 24. Bismarck, N.D., had 23. Duluth, Minn., 15 and Duluth, Minn., 7.

Some of the colder air was expected to dip into Texas, Oklahoma and the mid and lower Mississippi valleys.

Invasion Of Jail Costs Man 15 Years Of Freedom

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (AP)—Kenneth Ward invaded the county jail here Saturday night and the exploit cost him 15 years of freedom.

Ward, 23, of Enterprise, was sentenced Monday by Circuit Judge W. F. Brownson on two charges of kidnapping.

He had gone to the jail and forced jailer Clyde Fleenor to open a cell and release Irven William Holt. Then he forced both men into a truck. But the truck, with Holt at the wheel, soon stalled in a snowbank and Ward surrendered to the jailer.

Monday he said he didn't know why he did it. He was drunk, he said.

A grand jury indicted him on charges of kidnapping both Fleenor and Holt and pleaded guilty a short time later before Judge Brownson.

In addition to a sentence of 15 years on each charge, the terms to run concurrently, a parole granted to Ward on an earlier offense was revoked. In that, he was convicted of obtaining money under false pretenses.

Sutherland Folks Given Probation On Still Charge

PORTLAND (AP)—Three Sutherland, Ore., residents received probationary terms Monday when they pleaded guilty to illegal possession of a still.

U. S. Dist. Judge William East fined Marion Van Hooser, 32, \$200 and put him on two years probation. He placed Van Hooser's wife, Betty, 25, on one-year probation. A two-year probationary term was drawn by Buck Reed, 64.

The three were arrested by federal agents Oct. 12 following a raid on the Van Hooser property near Sutherland. The still was located after agents learned that bootleg whiskey was being sold in the Oakridge area.

The still, about a 20-gallon-capacity affair, had been moved into an unused chicken house shortly before the officers moved in and took the trio into custody.

Sick Penguins To Be Treated

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland's sick penguins will get treatment later this week from a federal expert.

Dr. Carlton M. Herman, chief of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service's health section, has sent word to the office of Sen. Newberger (D-Ore) that he will fly here Thursday or Friday. Dr. W. J. L. Shaden from Johns Hopkins University also is expected soon.

Herman is an expert on periglottitis, the lung ailment that has killed 12 of the 67 penguins flown to this country from the Antarctic. Eight of the birds have died here, two at Baltimore and two in Vancouver, B. C.

Interior Department officials decided to send Herman after Newberger asked for his services.

Meanwhile facilities of the University of Oregon Medical school have been made available for treatment of the birds. One went to a laboratory for study. A portable X-ray machine was sent to Peninsula Park, where the penguins are kept.

Wanted Criminal Caught In Florida

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Russell Wayne Carpenter, 21, wanted in a double slaying in Washington, D. C., bar, was arrested last night by a patrolman making a routine check of transients.

The FBI said he would be jailed in Miami.

Arrestment was slated on a charge of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for murder, said Special Agent John H. Williams.

Patrolman Larry Wald questioned the hitchhiking Carpenter, who showed him a wallet containing pictures that matched FBI circulars and a driver's license bearing the name of the wanted man. Wald arrested him.

Police Sgt. E. E. Graham said Carpenter related that he separated in Miami Beach from Henry Clay Overton, 44, after arriving there Sunday.

Carpenter said a Miami police car fell in behind them and they became frightened.

They left the car and split up. Later Overton went back for the car and found it had been stolen. He was killed in a head-on collision Sunday night at Wrens, Ga., that fatally injured Charles N. Wray, 42, a construction worker from High Point, N.C.

Included in the first-halt sales program is 9,500,000 million feet of salvage.

Roads To Be Built

Road work totals 108.1 miles to be constructed and 4.3 miles to be reconstructed. Acreage of the 17 tracts is 6,729, including 3,820 in the Windigo Pass sale.

The regional forester's sales include 26,400,000 board feet in the Homestead Ridge sale about 15 miles northeast of Steamboat slated for auction Thursday morning, first sale of the year. It is located on the North Umpqua District.

In May, 16,800,000 feet in the Skeeter Ridge sale is scheduled for auction. It is located about 29 miles northeast of Steamboat on the North Umpqua District.

The other regional sales are set up for June: 23 million feet in the Five Sticks tract of the Cow Creek District; 10 million feet in the Castle Rock tract of the South Umpqua District.

A breakdown by forest ranger districts shows the sales the volumes, approximate sale dates, acreages and road work.

Bohemian: Holland Point, 4 million feet, June; Crawfish Lake, 4,500,000 feet, June; a million feet in miscellaneous salvage sales, May and June; 150 acres, 23.9 miles of road construction.

BUSINESS EDUCATION

These classes are usually taken for the vocational possibilities involved. Many individuals find these courses useful for home, social, or business purposes.
