Russian Targets In Event Of War Being Embraced In Strategic Missile Plans

WASHINGTON — The Air Force's constantly revised strategic plans now include detailed arrangements on how and where intermediate range ballistic missiles would be used in event of war.

The operational plans for both long-range, air-breathing guided missiles and intermediate range ballistic missiles are understood to have been completed and incorporated in the over-all wartime plans of the USAF about six months ago.

This was done even though the IRBM weapons may not become a part of the available arsenal for another year.

The Air Force maintains three basic strategic blueprints which cover periods ranging from the next 60 days to as much as 13 years. They are the short-range "wartime capabilities plan"; the "mid-range wartime" plan containing D-day data up to four years in the future; and the "long-range wartime objectives plan."

The air-breathing Snark guided missile, with a range of 5,000 miles, is now considered operational by the Air Force and units and launching sites are being organized. While the Snark has the

range of the still-developmental intercontinental ballistic missile, its speed is below that of sound and its operating altitude down in the earth's atmosphere.

First Deliveries In 1958

The Air Force expects the first deliveries of the Thor IRBM—with a maximum accurate range of 1,500 miles — to be made late in 1958. But as part of the forward planning, details for the operational use and command structure of IRBM squadrons have been put into the war plans folio.

Presumably these details include not only the proposed bases from which IRBMs would be launched depending on the outcome of the negotiations with the NATO nations but a "target list" like those prepared for operation of conventional, manned bombers.

The details, of course, are highly secret but an IRBM list might include potential targets as deep in central Russia as the munitions complexes in the area of the Ural Mountains, if launching points from Turkey were used. From bases in the United Kingdom and Free Europe, Moscow would be within range of IRBMs.

Because the Air Force believes that it may be many years, if at all, before the missile entirely displaces the manned bomber strategy now is constructed around the coordinated use of both types of weapons.

Some Air Force planners have suggested that instead of a single massive, simultaneous blow against all targets on the list, a series of powerful attacks would be spread out over the first several hours of a war.

The Rev. Mr. Watson will present the communion meditation. The transition from the old year to the new will be spent in prayer. The public is invited.

The watch night service will be preceded by a fellowship time for the combined youth groups of the three churches. This event will be held in the parsonage recreation room at 8 p.m.

Fleeing Girl Driver Kills Second Motorist

NEW YORK — Fleeing from police at 100 miles and hour in a stolen car, a 15-year-old high school girl smashed into the rear of a sports car yesterday, killing its driver. She suffered only a cut lip.

The girl, Christine Nystrom, was charged with vehicular homicide and grand larceny.

Richard H. Sperling, 47, Newtown, Conn., was killed instantly in the wreck. His car "was spread all over the road," said Richard Crawford, a Westchester parkway patrolman.

Crawford spotted the girl, a youth church council president at Mount Vernon, N.Y., who had been picked up by police three times in two years, at a toll booth on the Hutchinson River Parkway in the Bronx.

Crawford said he tried to stop her but she sped away in a new convertible. Crawford said he chased her for a quarter of a mile at more than 100 miles an hour.

Increased Debt Limit Predicted By Martin

WASHINGTON — House Republican Leader Martin of Massachusetts said today it appears almost inevitable that Congress will have to increase the national debt limit.

The present statutory debt ceiling is 275 billion dollars and "we are awfully close to it now," Martin told reporters.

"They had to do a lot of manipulating to keep within the limit last fall; it was a close squeak."

Homeland Welcomes Fleeing Hollanders

THE HAGUE, Netherlands — Premier Willem Drees in a New Year's Eve broadcast today told Dutch citizens fleeing from Indonesia that a warm welcome awaits them in the Netherlands.

Drees added, however, that "if there are those among you who believe they can still do useful work (in Indonesia), or feel they have to stay for other responsible reasons, then we shall have respect and appreciation if they remain at their posts."

More than 30,000 Dutch nationals are expected to leave Indonesia as a result of the current anti-Dutch campaign there.

The Premier warned that the refugees are coming to an over-populated country "at a moment when there is a serious housing shortage and when employment is no longer as easy as it was in general a short time ago."

Clear Weather Predicted For New Year's Day

WASHINGTON — Clear weather is predicted for New Year's Day in most of the central portion of the United States and in the Southwest, with rain or snow over much of the East and clouds in the Pacific Northwest.

A nationwide forecast issued Tuesday by the Weather Bureau said:

"Clear cold weather is expected over most of the central portion of the nation on New Year's Day while precipitation spreading eastward threatens to dampen the holiday over much of the East."

"Cloudy skies are forecast in the Pacific Northwest with fog in the interior valleys while sunshine is promised for the Southwest."

Below normal temperatures are in store for the Gulf states, near normal through the Rockies and Northwest, and above normal in the Southwest, with 70 degree weather at the Rose Bowl game at Pasadena, Calif.

Malta Is Next In Line To Seek Independence

VALLETTA, Malta — Malta, a key Mediterranean base of the Atlantic Alliance, has threatened to seek independence from Britain unless the British do something to avert expected unemployment.

Complaining that Britain's plans to cut her armed forces peril the jobs of workers at the Royal Navy dockyard in Valletta, Premier Dom Mintoff won the Legislative Assembly's unanimous approval last night of a motion to sever "obligations toward Britain and those assumed by its allies."

"This is only a notice to the British of what the Maltese intend to do if the British government's policy toward the Maltese unchanged," the 41-year-old Premier told an emergency meeting of the Assembly.

Malta, a British crown colony since 1814, is the British navy's chief Mediterranean base, Mediterranean headquarters for NATO and the home of a 1,000-man bomber base of the U.S. 6th Fleet.

Mintoff said the Americans could be expected to move their base if they found a better site. He also complained because the United States had rejected his government's request to increase the Maltese emigration quota to the United States from its present 100 persons a year.

Granquist urged taxpayers to contact the office by telephone whenever possible instead of incurring unnecessary travel expenses by appearing in person.
