OHIO STATE IN SQUEAKY VICTORY OVER OREGON

Favored Navy, Oklahoma, Ole Miss Win Three Other Major Bowl Games

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A tricky play worked up at halftime backfired on Duke and launched an Oklahoma touchdown avalanche which gave the Sooners a 48-21 Orange Bowl football victory.

"Sometimes they work, sometimes they don't," Duke Coach Bill Murray said. "This time it didn't."

But Wilkinson, coach of the Sooners, acknowledged that his team didn't need much offense to beat the Blue Devils because Oklahoma got the breaks in the New Year's Day game.

"The things that happened to Duke normally don't happen. I've never had so many touchdowns given to me," he said.

Lady Luck joined the Sooners early. With Duke threatening, Oklahoma quarterback David Baker stole a pass from third unit quarterback George Harris and raced 94 yards for a touchdown before the game was 11 minutes old. It was the longest sprint in Orange Bowl history, surpassing the 90-yard kickoff return by Tulsa's Camp Wilson in 1945.

Breaks Figure
Six of Oklahoma's touchdowns resulted from breaks and luck had a hand in the seventh. Four of the Sooners scores were packed into a hectic fourth quarter and that tricky play of Duke's started the steady end zone parade.

Duke coaches had noticed Oklahoma players dropping back swiftly on quick kick situations, so at halftime Murray and his staff whipped up a play they hoped would work for big yardage.

The Blue Devils got a chance to use it early in the fourth period when Oklahoma was leading only 21-14.

With third down at its 26 and 12 yards to go, Duke faked a quick kick. The ball was supposed to go to quarterback Bob Broadhead for a pass down the middle

to end Dave Hum. But in a mix-up in signals on the new play, the ball was snapped to halfback George Dutrow, who had stepped into quick kick position. Caught by surprise, Dutrow fumbled and Dennis Morris recovered for Oklahoma on the Duke 24. Five plays later Jackie Sander swept three yards for a touchdown and after that almost everything Duke did seemed to go wrong.

"It was a coaching error," Murray insisted, shouldering the blame for the foul-up.

End Contract
A near-record crowd of 76,318 watched Oklahoma win its third straight Orange Bowl game. The two previous victories were over Maryland. This was the last year of the Orange Bowl's 5-year contract with the Atlantic Coast Conference. Next year the Big Eight champs will play a team selected on the open market.

Navy Adds Cotton Bowl Win Over Rice To String

DALLAS (AP) — A Navy squad Coach Eddie Erdelatz calls "the greatest team I've ever been associated with" headed home today with a 20-7 Cotton Bowl victory over Rice.

Tom Forrestal passed and piloted the Middles to a 20-0 lead by the early part of the third period yesterday. Then Navy hung on as Rice surged to a touchdown and powered on the 95-yard drive that reached the Navy 2 as time ran out.

Navy, Eastern champion, now has a victory in the Cotton Bowl, one in the Sugar Bowl and a tie in the Rose Bowl. It has never lost a bowl game.

It was the first bowl loss in five appearances for Rice.

Forrestal passed for 153 yards and ran for 34. Ned Oldham and Harry Hurst chipped in 50 yards and a touchdown each for Navy. Second-stringer Roland Brandquist picked up 36 yards for Navy and recovered the Rice fumble which set up the first Middle touchdown.

Sophomore quarterback Joe Tranchesi got the first Navy touchdown on a one-yard plunge. Hurst went 13 for his and Oldham 19.

King Hill Stopped
Rice's touchdown came on an eight-yard pass play from quarterback Frank Ryan to Ken Williams. Ryan gained 151 yards passing and 69 running. King Hill Rice's All America quarterback, showed little, gaining 13 yards passing and 14 running.

Brandquist covered a Ryan bobble for Navy on the Rice 33 and the Middles went to their first score just before the end of the first period.

In the second period, Forrestal hit Pete Jokanovich regularly on a 66-yard TD drive with Hurst scoring on a run from the 13.

Navy end John Ruth recovered a fumble by Ray Chilton on the Rice 20 and Oldham scored from the 19 to make it 20-0.

Late in the same period, Bobby Williams of Rice intercepted a Forrestal pass on the Navy 36. Ryan's passing to Buddy Dial and Ken Williams put the ball on the Navy 8. Ryan then hit Williams on the 1 and he dove over.

Texas Thrashed, 39-7, By Mississippi Rebels

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Quarterback Raymond Brown gave one of the greatest one-man performances in Sugar Bowl history to

end Mississippi's frustration in the New Year's Day event.

The Rebels' 39-7 victory over Texas was a tribute to Brown's driving power, masterful passing and deceptive faking. He scored two touchdowns, one on a record-smashing 92-yard run, passed for one and set up another with a pass interception.

The 190-pound senior won the Warren V. Miller trophy as the outstanding player as Mississippi made up for Sugar Bowl losses to Georgia Tech (24-7) in 1953 and Navy (21-0) in 1955.

"Brown played his best game today," Rebel Coach Johnny Vaught said. "But every guy we had in there was ready."

Royal Speaks
"He played better against us than any other quarterback this season," said Texas Coach Darrell Royal.

Brown gained 157 yards running, completed three passes for 24 yards, intercepted three Texas passes and managed a 34.7 yard punting average although aiming for the sidelines. He had one kick go out on the 7.

Mississippi took a 19-0 halftime edge after Brown intercepted a pass by Texas quarterback Bobby Lackey and returned it seven yards to the Texas 20. On the fifth play, halfback Kent Lovelace sprinted nine yards to score.

Mississippi added a touchdown in the third period on a 52-yard march before Texas could get its offense clicking.

The Longhorns moved 33 yards for their touchdown, with halfback Max Alvis smashing the final two. Otherwise they had only limited success against the tough Mississippians, who intercepted four Texas passes and recovered four Texas fumbles.

Heavy Prep Sports Weekend Scheduled By County Schools

After almost two full weeks of only limited action on the basketball and wrestling scene the 16 schools of Douglas County have some eight basketball games and four wrestling matches on the schedule for the coming weekend.

Six basketball games are on tap for Friday night, including the first league game of the year. The opening league game will match the Elkhorn Elks, last year's state B champs, against the Canyonville Tigers on the Canyonville floor.

Both clubs have been idle for the past two weeks. Elkhorn will go into the game with a 3-4 record and Canyonville with a 2-3 mark.

Other Friday night games will find the Roseburg Indians playing host to the Grants Pass Pirates, the team that downed them 48-46 in an overtime thriller two weeks ago. Roseburg has a 3-3 record on the year after splitting its two games in the "Little Far West Classic" last week.

The Douglas Trojans will also be on the road for a return game with Myrtle Point. The Trojans downed Myrtle Point the first time they met and will be out to improve on their 3-3 record for the year.

Viks Travel
Other games Friday will find the Myrtle Creek Vikings, smarting from three straight defeats, traveling to meet Creswell in hopes of improving on their 4-4 record for the year. Sutherlin will also be on the road with a game scheduled against the Powers Cruisers.

Mattmen Grapple
In wrestling action this week, the Roseburg Indians have three matches scheduled for this weekend, in one of the toughest weeks of the season for them. They will out their 5-1 record for the year against the Grants Pass team on Friday night and then will travel to meet the Marshfield Pirates and the North Bend squads on Saturday. Roseburg has defeated all three of these teams earlier this season.

The only other wrestling match scheduled will be Saturday night, when the Sutherlin Bulldogs will travel to meet the South Eugene Axemen. This will be the first meeting of these two squads, with Sutherlin having a 5-1 record for the year.

Fourth-Period Field Goal Nets Favored Bucks Verdict

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Ohio State's Buckeyes, if they want to be fair about it, should chip in to have third-string halfback Don Sutherlin's right shoe gold-plated.

The 194-pound senior came off the bench to boot a fourth-period field goal from the 24 - yard line yesterday, giving the nation's second-ranked team a squeaky 10-7 verdict over Oregon's 19-point underdogs before 98,302 in the 44th Rose Bowl game.

Moral Victory
The shaky Pacific Coast Conference, which has seen its representatives drop 11 of the 12 games with Western Conference foes since this pact was signed in 1947, figured this one was a moral victory.

It came close to being more than that as the Webfoots out-gained Woody Hayes' stalwarts 351 to 294 yards and had 21 first downs to Ohio's 19. It was the most first downs scored against the Bucks this season. The Ohio point total was its lowest of the campaign.

The scoring was short and sweet. The Bucks took the opening kickoff 79 yards in 13 plays for their first touchdown, quarterback Frank Kremblas sneaking for the counter after throwing a 37-yard "blind and 18" pass to sophomore end Jim Houston on the one-yard line. Kremblas converted.

Shanley Scores
The Ducks marched 80 yards in 10 plays, in a drive which bridged the first-second quarter intermission, with halfback Jim Shanley taking a pitchout from quarterback Jack Crabtree and circling end for five yards. Halfback Charley Tourville swept Kremblas out of the scoring path with a bowlshaking block. Fullback Jack Morris booted his 14th conversion in 19 attempts to tie it.

In the third quarter Morris missed by 24 yards a field goal from the 24-yard line. The Bucks took over on the 20, and in 13 plays, all on the ground, battered their way to the Webfoot 17.

With only 38 seconds gone in the final period, Sutherlin came off the bench, and with Kremblas holding, angled a 24-yard kickoff between the Ducks' uprisings for the winning margin. It was a thrilling career finish for the Toronto, Ohio, senior, who has been unable to practice kicking for weeks because of a lame back.

Heroes Many
That was the ball game, but there were many deeds of derring-do along the way. For instance, just as Sutherlin's field goal won the tilt, senior Joe Cannavino — making his first start at right half — saved it.

Joe carried the ball but once, and wound up with a seven-yard loss. But he intercepted both Oregon passes snapped by the Bucks, halting drives which had carried over 30 yards, and picked up one of the two fumbles captured from the Webfoots.

Coach Hayes said "anytime we can get the ball four times on pass interceptions or fumbles, we figure to win." Joe did it almost all by himself.

Oregon's sharpshooting quarterback, who was voted the game's outstanding player, and Hayes concurred that the 191-pound senior was as good as anyone who graced the rugged Big Ten this season. Crabtree completed 10 of 17 passes for 135 yards and picked up 48 yards in 16 rushing tries.

Mondale Hurt
Although Oregon lost its No. 1 guard, Harry Mondale, on the fifth play of the game, the Webfoots did a neat job of stacking up Ohio's famed "up the middle" assault.

Oregon started the season with only 45 players, and nine of them had appeared in a game. But seldom have so few done so much to so many as the determined

Big Surprise
In his post-game conference, the Ohio coach was asked to estimate where Oregon would have finished in the Big Ten. Hayes evaded an swering with "we start spring practice April 2."

Pressed for an answer, he said: "I've been here before, and I think I make too many friends by making comparisons. Let's just say that Oregon was a big surprise to us. They moved the ball as well as anyone we've met. Crabtree is a fine passer, Stover a fine receiver, and their defense was as good as any we've seen. Len Casanova really did a job coaching those boys for us."

Stover Stars
Stover was the game's pass-snatching star, picking off 10 aeri-als for 144 yards.

Don Clark, Ohio's No. 1 half-back, who missed the last two Big Ten games with a groin injury, rushed for 82 yards in 14 carries, but Bob White, the sophomore fullback, paced the ground-gainers with 93 in 23 tries. Shanley and Morris each carried 11 times for the Ducks, the former for 39 yards, the latter for 37.

So well did the Ducks move the ball, digging themselves out of deep situations time after time, that they were not forced to punt even once — the first time in years the Bucks haven't forced a foe to kick.

Ohio State defeated California here in 1950 by the margin of Jim Hogue's field goal, 17-14, and tripped up Southern Cal in 1955 by 21-7.

Tournament Of Roses Debris Follows Parade, Grid Game

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — They're cleaning up the debris today along Colorado Street, the litter left by a million spectators who watched the dazzling beauty of the New Year's Day Tournament of Roses parade.

Bleacher seats which blossom annually for a few days on lawns and parkways are coming down. Paper, discarded lunch boxes, blossoms fallen here and there from the 62 floats symbolizing "Daydreams in Flowers" are being carted away.

The annual madhouse which is Pasadena came off relatively smoothly, considering the vast throng for the parade, plus 98,600 at the Rose Bowl football game and 29,000 more at the nearby Santa Anita racetrack.

Two women died of heart attacks at the parade, Mrs. Myrtle Markel, 72, San Diego, and Mrs. Clara Cardinal, 61, Daly City, Calif.

Before parade time an auto went out of control after a collision and plowed into the crowd, fortunately only about 10 m.p.h. Five persons were hospitalized as a result and 13 others were treated at the scene, staying onto watch the parade.

Police Chief Clarence Morris, who moved the traffic situation from a helicopter, said that, considering the holiday, the 1,400 police officers on duty managed to keep things moving well. Morris

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No. 1 Cagers Re-Open Play

The Senior Bowl journey at Mobile, Ala., and the New Hampshire Invitational at Durham, N.H., also wind up tonight. The Citadel plays Spring Hill for the Senior Bowl championship while Harvard tangles with Amherst in the New Hampshire final.

Both The Citadel and Spring Hill won first-round games last night in the final seconds. A long field goal by Ray Graves with 10 seconds left gave The Citadel a 38-37 triumph over Florida State. A one-handed shot by Jim Carney that went into the net just as the final whistle blew gave Spring Hill a 69-67 victory over Georgia.

Harvard overwhelmed New Hampshire 78-56 and Amherst nipped Springfield 51-45 in the first round games at Durham.

In non-tourney games last night Ohio State ended a seven-game losing streak and chalked up its 21st victory of the season by nipping Yale 69-67 and North Carolina State, ranked 11th nationally, wallopped Virginia 54-70 in an Atlantic Coast Conference tilt.

Top Pre-Conference Record Makes OSC Cagers Choice

(This is another in the series on PCC basketball prospects.)

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — This is the 30th season for Amory T. "Slats" Gill as Oregon State basketball coach, and it could be his most memorable.

Already he has been honored by election as president of the National Assn. of Basketball Coaches.

Now his team has come up with the best pre-conference record among Pacific Coast Conference squads, causing a number of West Coast sports writers to predict Gill's team will win the conference title.

Gill may find out this weekend how good his chances are.

His Staters open the conference race by meeting California and UCLA, California, whose prospects once were doubtful, developed fast in pre-conference play and reached the finals of the just-concluded Holiday Festival Tournament at New York City before bowing to Temple, 69-59. California plays OSC here Friday night.

UCLA's well-balanced team is expected in some quarters to carry off the conference crown if Oregon State does not. UCLA plays

OSC here Saturday night.

Lost To Iowa
Oregon State compiled an 8-1 record in pre-conference play, defeating Oregon, the University of Portland twice, Seattle, Gonzaga, Indiana, Yale and Utah. The only loss was in overtime at Iowa.

The Staters go into conference play with an all-veteran team headed by 6-7 forward Dave Gambee, who won the conference scoring race last season. Currently he is plunking in 20 points a game.

Gill also has been starting Ken Nanson, 6-foot forward, Wayne Moss, 6-9 center, Lee Harman, 6-foot guard, and Jim Anderson, 5-9 guard.

The principal front-line reserve is 6-6 Gary Goble, who was among conference leaders in rebounds last year. There also are a flock of 6-2 reserves available for front-line or mid-court duty, including lettermen Gary Haynes and Ted Miller.

In addition to the usual deliberate attack this season Gill has his team using the fast break. This is a sometimes weapon with Gill. He uses it only when he has big men he believes can keep up with his smaller players. The last time he used it consistently was a decade ago. That team won the conference crown.

Zora Folly Triumphs Easily Over Boxing Foe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Zora Folly, with an easy win over new-comer Garvin Sawyer to his credit, Thursday was talking again about a heavyweight title fight with champion Floyd Patterson.

Folley, 25, of Chandler, Ariz., had experience, record and ranking on his side Wednesday night at the Capital Arena against Sawyer. The fight showed it.

He was barely winded in controlling the 10-rounder all the way to win a unanimous decision.

Northwest Schools Frozen Out Of Cal Grid Schedules

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Three Pacific Northwest members of the Pacific Coast Conference, excepting Washington, are frozen out of play with California schools in 1961-62 football schedules.

The new schedules were announced Wednesday. They freeze UCLA, California and Southern California from the round robin campaigns they have fought against and named as their reason for withdrawal last month from the conference.

The three institutions announced they would withdraw after July 1, 1958. Washington later said it, too, left the conference was collapsing.

Left off the schedules of the California schools were Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State. The PCC said the schedules received unanimous approval of athletic directors at a special San Francisco meeting and later in a mail poll of faculty athletic representatives.

Additional games may be arranged by negotiation, leaving the three Washington and Oregon

Fast-Improving California Team Opens PCC Title Defense At OSC

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — California's Bears, a relatively inexperienced team faced with the job of defending the Pacific Coast Conference title, have improved faster than coach Pete Newell expected.

His pre-conference slate contained such killers as the University of San Francisco, Kansas and Kansas State, all ranked in the national Top 10. Then to the Holiday Festival in New York.

Not expecting his club to reach Monday night's finals, Newell booked plane passage back to California for shortly after midnight Tuesday. So after losing the finale to Temple, 69-59, the Bears had to hustle to be on time for the return flight.

The Bears reached the finals by beating the strong Dayton club 60-55 as Al Buch contributed the clutch play in overtime. In the opening round Newell's mean beat NYU.

"I'm very pleased with the way this team has developed," says Pete. "I won't predict a title for it, but we'll be in there all the way. The tough schedule helped gain experience for the PCC race."

After winning the first three games of the season, the Bears lost in succession to USC, Kansas State and Kansas before flying to New York for the Holiday Festival. They opened defense of their title Friday in Corvallis against Oregon State.

Newell lost four of the five starters from his championship club with guard Earl Robinson the only returnee.

He's built a first team that in-

cludes letterman Jack Groat and sophomore Bob Dalton, at 6-3 and 6-3 respectively, as forwards. Don McIntosh at 6-6 in the post with Buch, a letterman reserve from last season, and Robinson as guards.

Reserves include 6-5 sophomore Earl Schneider, Dennis Fitzpatrick, a junior college transfer at 5-11, and George Sterling, 6-4, who was on the squad but did not win a letter last season.

Play of McIntosh particularly has been impressive. He did a good job guarding All America Will Chamberlain of Kansas and held Jack Parr of Kansas State to three points.

"McIntosh has shown lots of improvement this season and is a big reason for the success we have had," Newell declared.

Bernie Simpson, a two-year letterman guard, suffered a shoulder separation, before the season started, but he may be able to rejoin the squad later.

Gonzales Drops Head In State Of Rivalry

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — Pancho Gonzales defeated Lew Hoad Thursday night 5-7, 6-6, 6-2, 4-6, 9-7 in a professional tennis match before a capacity crowd of 9,000.

The duel lasted 2 hours and 33 minutes. It was the first of 100 matches between Gonzales, the American age, and Hoad, the Australian who turned professional after winning the Wimbledon crown.
