Sharp Upturn In Retail Buying Hits Northwest

SAN FRANCISCO — A sharp upturn in retail buying in the Pacific Northwest during the week ending Dec. 28 was reported Saturday by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco.

The upswing apparently reflected a strong surge of last-minute Christmas buying and post-Yule clearance sale shopping which jammed stores from San Diego to Bellingham.

Brightest spot in the retail sales picture was at Spokane, which reported an increase of 33 per cent over sales of the corresponding week of 1956. Spokane has run counter to a recent trend in the Northwest, reporting slight improvements while other points were showing drops from 1956 levels.

Seattle sales were up 29 per cent; Portland 20 and Tacoma 19 in the Dec. 28 week, the bank reported showed. This still was below the national average which was up 31 per cent. The increases left the region with a four-week average for sales at the same level as last year.

The biggest gain on the Pacific Coast was reported at Sacramento, which was up 47 per cent, followed by San Francisco-Oakland, up 40 per cent. Tacoma's 19 was the lowest on the coast.

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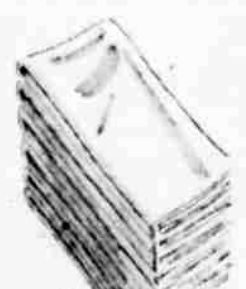

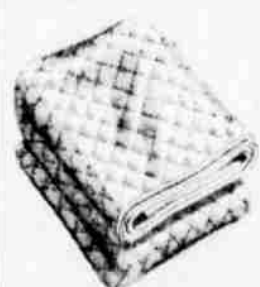
