

Dave Epps New Head Of Oregon Demo Committee

PORTLAND (AP)—Dave Epps of Sweet Home is the new chairman of the Democratic state Central Committee. Epps, 50, a furniture merchant, received 26 votes to 19 for Pat Davis, Baker County chairman, and 14 for Richard E. Groener, Clackamas County chairman. Epps succeeds Robert A. Boyer, Medford attorney whose resignation became effective Sunday. Epps is a long-time Democratic party worker. He was a delegate in 1940 and in 1942 to the national party conventions, and in 1946 was Democratic nominee for Oregon secretary of state. Boyer, in one of his final official acts, urged delegates to seek money for the treasury which, the treasurer's report said, will be empty when all bills are paid. A proposal that the party headquarters be shifted from Portland to Salem was voted down. Last year the Republicans made the move.

Montgomery Ward Co. Retail Clerks Strike

WASHINGTON (AP)—Clerks in a number of Montgomery Ward & Co. retail stores went out on strike Monday across the nation. The Retail Clerks International Assn. said possibly a dozen such stores were struck and the number would be increased gradually as the walkout progressed. The union would not give a list of affected stores immediately. The union has asked a 10-cent hourly wage boost retroactive to Sept. 15 when the old contract expired. The workers also want a 40-hour week, overtime pay, and a modified union shop which would require new employees to join the clerks union. Present average wage rates have not been disclosed.

Search Of Airliners Squelches Bomb Threat

PORTLAND (AP)—A telephoned bomb threat, one of a series which has plagued airlines for many months, caused a search of all United Air Lines planes here Monday morning. UAL officials said nothing was found in the early search and they expected only one flight, No. 676 to San Francisco and Los Angeles, to be delayed. It left at 8:30 a. m., a half hour late. Four other planes were searched after a caller at 6:42 a. m. said, in what was described as a muffled, young-sounding male voice, "There is going to be a bomb on the next airplane."

Appliances, Guns Taken By Burglars From Home

Electrical appliances and guns were taken from a Roseburg home in a burglary, Roseburg police report. Taken from the E. A. Erickson home, 1303 SE Terrace St., were an electric frying pan, a waffle iron, 32-20 revolver and holster and a .22 caliber rifle. Police say the burglar jumped open a basement window to gain entry. The burglary was discovered Saturday but could have taken place anytime between Dec. 23 and Jan. 4.

There are no formal requirements for admission, except for those students who are working toward degrees.

'World In Dire Peril,' Report From Panel

(Continued from Page 1) armed forces of the United States. The 21-man panel, headed by Nelson A. Rockefeller, included scientists, former diplomats, former defense officials and military officers, industrialists, atomic experts, educators, publishers and a labor union representative. World Faces Dire Peril The Rockefeller study group says that perhaps the most difficult thing for this nation to accept is "the reality of our peril." It writes that "A new technology of unprecedented power and destructiveness has placed all nations of the world in dire peril." An attack on 50 of the most important metropolitan areas would kill about 35 per cent of the nation's population and 75 per cent of its industry, the report says. The report concludes that the casualties in such an attack might be 10 to 15 million dead, 15 to 20 million injured, and 25 to 35 million caught in radioactive fallout. To help reduce the possible toll, the report said "civil defense must be part of our over-all strategic posture" with a program including warning systems and fallout shelters.

Allies Must Be Aided As Eisenhower has proposed, the panel said this nation must work closely with other countries in meeting joint security requirements, must help re-equip allied forces and "must pool with our allies in NATO scientific and technical information." Among other things, the panel said, this nation must provide NATO allies "with nuclear weapons and delivery systems." The report says the United States does have some military advantages over Russia now—a superior industrial base and production know-how; a system of alliances superior to those of Russia because they are based on free association instead of the method of "forced satellites"; superior operational experience in long-range bombers; "superior and more flexible naval power," especially surface naval power.

But there are disadvantages, says the report, noting that the long-range bomber force is always confronted with improving defenses and forward bases are vulnerable to surprise attack. State Hospital Escapee Found Here By Police Lodged in the Douglas County jail is an escapee from the State Hospital at Salem. The 41-year-old man, Earl Warren Bechtel, was taken into custody Saturday by state police when he was found walking along Highway 99 between Roseburg and Myrtle Creek. Hospital authorities informed police the man had walked away from the institution and that they would come to Roseburg to get him.

(Continued from Page 1) the reins of government in case of presidential disability. Little Rock's school integration troubles have served notice that the nation's race problem is far from solved. But despite some congressional cries for further action, there is small chance of another civil rights bill becoming law this year. The Senate rackets inquiry has spurred demands for laws to prevent labor union abuses. The economy, once bursting with prosperity, has taken a downswing. Tax cut talk, curbed by Sputnik, could be revived on grounds a pump primer is needed to bolster the economy. Eisenhower's plea for a five-year expansion of the reciprocal trade law may face greater than normal difficulties.

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Missionary Slated To Speak Locally

The Rev. Dr. Ira E. McBride, missionary to Nigeria, West Africa, will be the speaker Wednesday night at the North Roseburg Evangelical United Brethren Church, reports pastor Lyle H. Willard. Dr. McBride will speak at 7:15 p. m. He and his wife first went to Nigeria in 1923 where they began their work in Wukumland, one of the most primitive sections of Northeastern Nigeria. Since then, he has been in continuous service except for brief furloughs in the United States. In 1935, Dr. McBride was appointed superintendent of the EUB mission work in Nigeria, a post he held until his resignation in 1953. Under his leadership, great steps were taken to make the Nigerian church completely self-governing and self-supporting under native leadership. The medical work was expanded, new schools and evangelistic centers were opened. Dr. McBride is recognized as an authority on the native languages of Nigeria. Thirty years ago, he found the people illiterate. Now, that section of Nigeria skirting the Benue River valley has a system of mission schools attended by hundreds of African children and young people.
