

Dave Beck Seeks Additional Time

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Times said Saturday Dave Beck has asked for additional time in which to determine if he owes the Western Conference of Teamsters and Teamsters Joint Council No. 28 Building Assn. more money or has a refund coming.

In 1954, Beck made an agreement calling for an accounting and repayment of loans received from the two Teamster organizations. Since then he has repaid \$370,000 and three times has postponed the date of final accounting.

The most recent final accounting date was Dec. 31, 1957. The Times said Beck has asked the conference and council to leave the date open for further accounting.

The accounting agreement was made in July, 1954. In August of that year, while Beck's finances were under investigation by the Internal Revenue Service he paid the two Teamsters organizations \$200,000. He added \$70,000 in 1956 and \$100,000 last May, shortly before he was indicted for income tax evasion.

Mother Of Five Jumps In Path Of Big Truck

STERLING, Ill. (AP) — A mother of five young children was killed Friday when she got into an argument with her husband during an auto trip and jumped into the path of an oncoming truck.

William Boyer of nearby Rock Falls said at the inquest that he and his wife, Martha, 29, began arguing while driving to Dixon. When he stopped the car, he said, his wife pulled away from him, jumped from the car and ran in front of an approaching truck.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of death from head injuries "with suicidal intent." Boyer testified his wife had previously threatened to kill herself.

Three-Year-Old Boy Has 15th Operation

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Although he is only three years old, Michael Lee Himmel Friday underwent his 15th major operation.

He was in surgery for more than two hours in an operation involving his nose.

The boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Himmel, was born with a cancerous condition of his right cheek. He had his first operation when he was 10 days old. Since then he had undergone 13 operations for skin transplants and plastic repair work.

Physicians said the malignant condition has disappeared.

Cloud-Scanning TV Camera Set For Satellite

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — A cloud-scanning television camera will be mounted in one of the United States satellites, says a physicist at California Institute of Technology.

The camera will be able to pick up only objects at least 10 miles in diameter, but it will be useful in transmitting "a picture of the cloud cover over the earth," Dr. Albert R. Hibbs said in an address Friday night.

Hibbs is chief of the research analysis section at Caltech's jet propulsion laboratory, which is putting together one of the satellites for launching early this year.

The camera, said Hibbs, will transmit only upon signal from a receiving station on the ground. It will be contained in a 20-pound package which will include batteries, he added.

ONE-WAY STREETS

PORTLAND (AP) — Beginning Sunday, parts of Grand and Union avenues on Portland's east side now carry only one-way traffic.

The city plans eventually to increase the one-way routes to 37 blocks. Union will carry southbound vehicles and Grand northbound.

Air Force Denies Tanker Plane Given For Nixon's Use

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force said Saturday it is not true that a jet tanker plane has been assigned for use of Vice President Nixon.

The Air Force said it has offered Nixon a flight in the plane, but that no date has been fixed.

It issued the formal statement a few hours after Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) had telegraphed Secretary of Defense McElroy saying he protested conversion of a "privately needed Boeing KC135 jet tanker into a taxi" for the vice president.

The Air Force gave this version: "Considerable misunderstanding has resulted from a report that an Air Force KC135 has been assigned to Vice President Nixon. This report is entirely without fact."

"A KC135 jet tanker assigned to the Air Research and Development Command, the aircraft which recently made a record flight to Buenos Aires, has been based in the Washington area for several weeks."

"This aircraft has been undergoing testing for a considerable period of time and, in conjunction with the tests, orientation and familiarization flights have been given to senior Air Force staff personnel, including the secretary of the Air Force."

"A similar orientation flight was offered to the vice president by the Air Force some days ago, but no date has been set."

"The vice president has never been assigned to him an aircraft for his own personal use. He uses the regular MATS (Military Air Transport Service) service only when on official business."

The statement was obviously in reply to specific complaints made by Monroney, chairman of the Senate subcommittee of the Senate Commerce Committee.

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland's bowling preacher rolled his 441st consecutive game Monday after 56 hours and 56 minutes of a marathon stint and claimed a new national record.

The Rev. Wayne V. Jensen, 49, keeping two alleys busy as he rolled in one while the balls were being returned in the other, said he was feeling good and might continue rolling all day.

The 440th game, which tied what is regarded here as the previous record, was rolled with a score of 211. The Rev. Mr. Jensen then set his new mark with 174 pins in the next game. His average throughout however, had been only 139.

Near him was a box labeled "marathon kitty" for contributions to the building fund of his church, the Southwest Church of Christ. Friends said spectators were contributing well but no sum was announced.

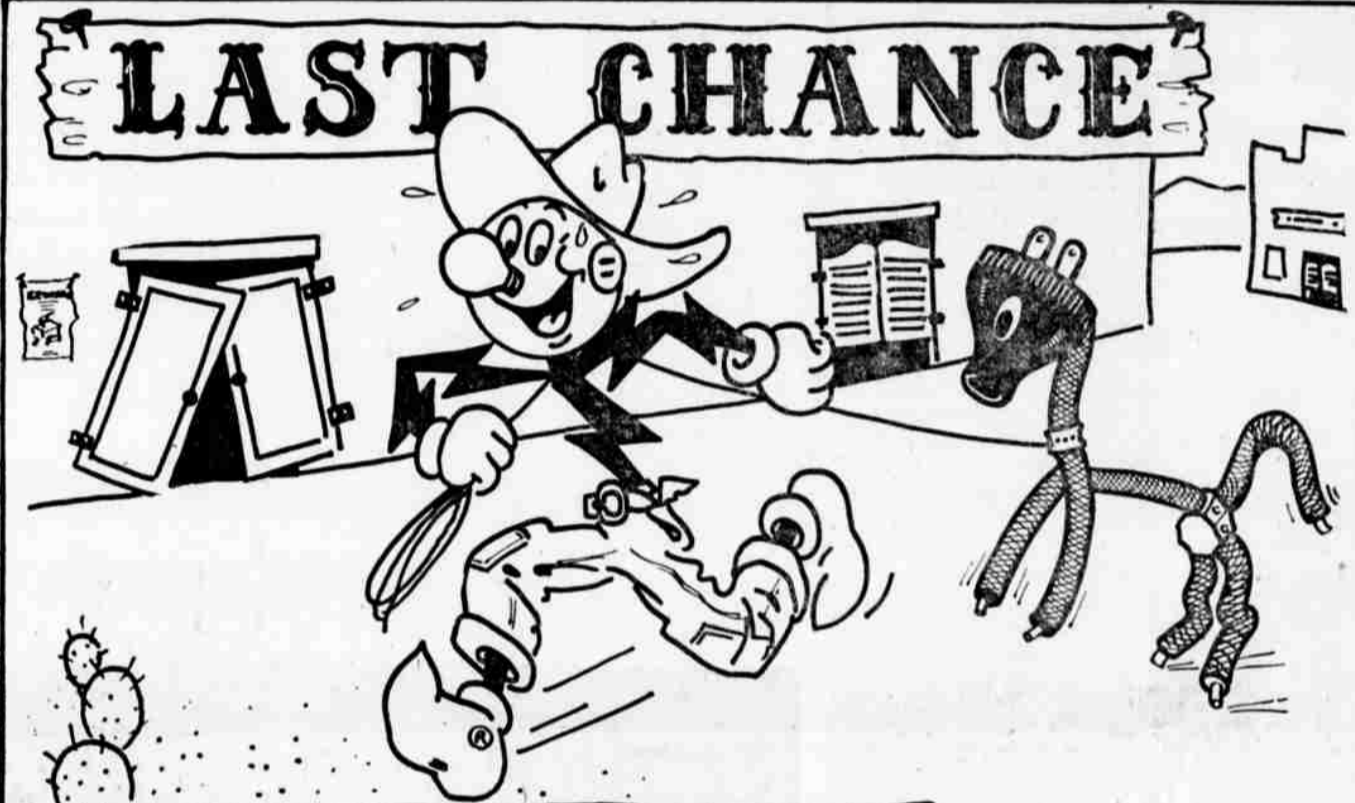

Missing Bend Family Turns Up At Los Angeles

BEND, Ore. (AP) — A missing Bend family has turned up in Los Angeles — at the end of what started out to be a short drive New Year's Day.

James Thompson called his landlord here Saturday to say that he, his wife and their daughter were in Los Angeles and were all right.

The family, he said, had started on a short drive, gone to Klamath Falls, 140 miles south of here, and then decided to continue to Los Angeles.

As Thompson made his phone call, 50 men and several planes searched rugged, snow-covered foothills for them.

The search began after the Thompsons failed to keep a dinner appointment last Wednesday.

Police began the search because they thought the family might have gone into the foothills to take pictures and had become lost in the heavy snow.

Why they went to Los Angeles instead was not clear.

Western Pine Assn. Says Orders Dipped

PORTLAND (AP) — The Western Pine Assn. says 1957 orders, shipments and production of western pine all dipped below the 1956 pace.

Last year's production was 4,119,042,000 board feet. This represented a drop of 7 per cent from the 1956 figures.

Shipments dropped 4 per cent in 1957, to 4,165,528,000 board feet. A 3 per cent drop was noted in orders, to 4,181,832,000 board feet.

ADMITS THEFTS

NEWARK, N. J. (AP) — A motherly gray-haired woman known by many policemen as secretary-treasurer of the Suburban Police Bowling Leagues, is accused of stealing a half ton of mail from letter boxes.

Police said Miss Doran King, 58, admitted that she had looted boxes in the Weequahic section of Newark for the past four months.

Another Sharp Drop In Polio Cases Told

WASHINGTON (AP) — Another sharp drop in the number of polio cases last year was reported Saturday by the U.S. Public Health Service.

The service said tentative figures put the number of cases during 1957 at 5,894. That compares with 15,460 in the previous year and 29,270 in 1955, the first year in which Salk polio vaccine was generally used.

The service said the attack rate was significantly lower among persons who had received polio vaccine, adding that:

"Approximately 7 per cent of the paralytic and 17 per cent of the nonparalytic cases reported in 1957 had received three or more injections of vaccine."
