Oregon State's Beavers earned a ranking among the title contenders in the Pacific Coast Conference when they trounced UCLA 68-61.

The Beavers, who resume PCC action Jan. 18 at California, were led Saturday by the 31 points of 6-foot senior Kenny Nanson. He hit 22 of them in the second half. OSC bounded ahead 35-39 in nine minutes left but then the

Beavers seemingly unlocked the Beaver zone defense and closed to 58-52. OSC roared back on Nanson's field goal and two gift tosses and another free throw by Dave Gambee.

In other league games, California crushed Washington 57-45. Washington State stopped Stanford 64-51 and Southern California edged Idaho 83-77. Oregon was idle.

Monday night Southern California meets Washington at Seattle in the only conference game before Friday when Oregon plays at UCLA. Washington State at Stanford, Idaho at Southern California and Washington at California.

Oregon State now with a 2-0 record, beat defending champion California 53-43 Friday night and UCLA dumped Oregon 64-38. Southern Cal. also unbeaten in

conference action, edged past Washington State 67-59 and Idaho dropped Stanford 67-59.

Southern Cal. finally pulled ahead of Idaho Saturday night by sinking 12 consecutive free throws. Prior to that the lead had changed 11 times during the second half.

Cal's Bears hit 37 per cent of their shots against Washington in sharp contrast to their cold shooting the night before against Oregon State. It was a team triumph for the Bears as Earl Robinson contributed 16 points and Don McIntosh and Al Buch 14 each.

Stanford started hot as blazes but burned out just before the half against Cougar coach Jack Friel's platoon system. Jim Ross with 21 and sophomore John Maras with 16 paced WSC scoring.

Dick Haga and John Arrillaga with 14 each were high for Stanford.

Sutherland Edges South Eugene Matmen, 22-21

In one of the closest matches of the year for Sutherland, the Bulldogs matmen edged the South Eugene Axemen, 22-21, in matches held at Eugene Saturday night.

Eugene managed two pins during the evening, against the one for Sutherland, but the Bulldogs gathered five wins on decisions to only three for Eugene. One match ended in a draw.

Gaining the pin for Sutherland was Durrell Giegar in the 129-pound weight. Phillips at 95 pounds and White in the heavyweight division were the Eugene winners on pins.

One of the best matches of the day was in the 140-pound weight as Layton Ferguson of Sutherland and Hollaway of Eugene wrestled to a 2-2 draw.

Sutherland also won the jayvee matches by a 37-8 score as five Bulldogs gained pins. Jerry Strong, 97, Gary Modrell 114, John Thompson 129, Bill Nelson 177 and Mervin Cole, heavyweight, were winners through pins for the Bulldogs.

Douglas Rallies For Win Of 41-38 Over Bandon Team

Douglas, coming from behind in the fourth period, downed the Bandon basketball team, 41-38, in a non-league game played on the Bandon floor Saturday night.

The Trojans battled Bandon to a 10-10 standoff during the first period, as Bob Galsen and Jim Taylor hit the net for three points apiece, but Bandon rallied in the second quarter to take a 22-17 halftime bulge.

Gary Martin, former Douglas player, sparked Bandon to the second quarter advantage by collecting six points, for a total of 10 at halftime. John Erbe, with three points in the second quarter, was tops for the Trojans.

Bandon increased its margin one point during the third quarter to take a 27-23 lead going into the fourth quarter, but Douglas started to hit the net and went ahead for the first time since the opening quarter with two minutes left in the game.

Counts Sparks Douglas

Terry Counts with nine points in the final panel, his total for the night, was the main spark for the Trojans, as they outscored Bandon by a 18-11 margin in the final eight minutes.

Douglas shot at a 340 average from the field for the game against the 280 for Bandon. From the free throw line the Trojans cashed in on seven out of 15, while Bandon hit on 12 out of 23.

Larry Bissonnette was top Douglas scorer for the game with a total of 10 points. Counts with nine and Taylor with eight followed close behind. Martin with 13 points was

high for Bandon and for the game, followed by Tom Ray with 10.
