Visit For Holiday Mr. and Mrs. Ray Harrison and Dickie of Coos Bay spent the New Year's holiday with the Bill Zimmermans.

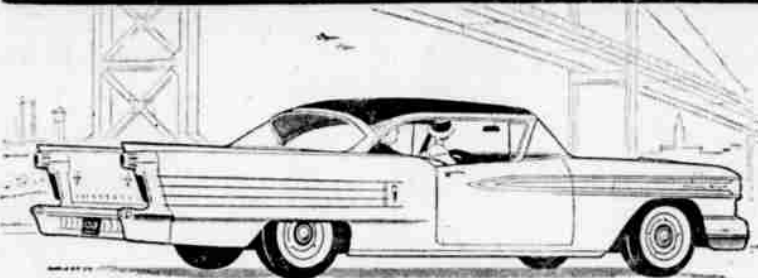

Since September 1910, the Texas Democrat has gavelled open every session except those during four years in which Republicans had control of the House. No other man in history has presided so long as speaker. The runner-up, Henry Clay, served a little less than 12 years.

Son Of Evangelist Dies During Hymns, Prayers

CHICAGO — An 8-year-old boy afflicted with a brain tumor died in his evangelist father's arms at a prayer meeting Sunday night as his parents and members of the congregation sang hymns and offered prayers.
Daniel Long's condition was diagnosed more than a year ago. Doctors said an operation might save his life but that his brain would be damaged.
His parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Long, nursed him at home through his hopeless illness.
Long, 38, is a maintenance man and part-time evangelist. Before coming to Chicago five years ago he and his wife, Lennie, lived in the South as a singing-praising evangelist unit.
Mrs. Long noticed her son weakening Sunday. She and her husband took the boy to the Brother Bridge Bible Church where he died.
