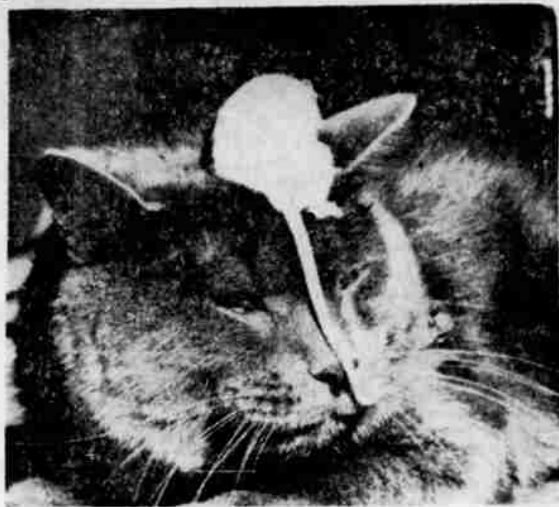

The union struck a number of the stores when national contract negotiations broke down.

Lack Of Evidence Reverses Conviction Of Alien In Not Observing U. S. Security Act

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court reversed Monday the conviction of an alien for failing to deport himself under a proviso of the 1950 Internal Security Act.

Justice Whitaker, writing the court's unanimous opinion, said it was unnecessary to pass on validity of the proviso because the justices found there was lack of evidence to support the conviction of Knut Einar Heikkinen, a native of Finland.

Heikkinen was ordered deported in 1952 after immigration service hearings at Duluth, Minn. The Board of Immigration Appeals said Heikkinen had been a Communist Party member from about 1922 to 1930.

The 1950 act imposes criminal penalties on aliens ordered deported if they willfully fail to depart within six months. It also fixes criminal penalties for aliens who willfully fail to make timely applications for travel documents after being ordered deported.

Heikkinen was convicted by a jury in U.S. district court in Madison, Wis., on the counts: Willful failure to leave within six months after the deportation order and willful failure to apply for travel documents within that six-month period.

At the time of the deportation order he was associate editor of a Finnish language newspaper printed at Superior, Wis.

Death Sentence Stands

In other actions Monday, the Supreme Court:

Let stand, by refusing to review, the conviction of Angelo La Marca, 32, condemned to a life term for kidnapping baby Peter Weinberger, of Westbury, N.Y.

The month-old baby was kidnapped from the Weinberger home

on July 4, 1956. The child's body was found the following Aug. 24 in a woods. La Marca is under death sentence.

Agreed to review a decision that the State Department may use confidential information in determining whether to deny a passport application.

The decision, by the U.S. Court of Appeals here, upheld Secretary of State Dulles' refusal to grant a passport to William Bruce Dayton, of Corning, N.Y. Dayton, a cosmic ray physicist, wanted to go to Bombay to study.

Tie Vote Backs Penalty

Upheld by a tie vote two consecutive federal prison terms of 10 years each given Lovander Ladner of Mississippi for firing a shotgun at two alcohol tax unit agents in 1944. Ladner is on parole from the Atlanta Penitentiary.

Rejected another effort by Martin Sobell, imprisoned for atomic espionage, to win a review of his conviction. This is the ninth time applications of one sort or another on Sobell's behalf have been turned down by the Supreme Court.

Busted Fifers Fill Air In Crash Over Soprano Callas

FORNOVA DI SAN GIOVANNI, Italy — This little North Italian town called off its annual Epiphany life concert Monday because of a life-breaking fight about soprano Maria Meneghini Callas.

The fifters busted their instruments over each other's heads in the melee.

Every year the town's five band give concerts in the main square on Jan. 5 and 6 — the eve and the day of the Epiphany holiday commemorating the bringing of gifts to the infant Christ by the three wise men.

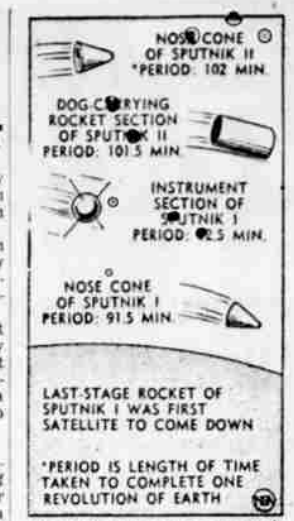
The band held its annual banquet Sunday night after the first of the concerts. Wine flowed freely. The members began talking about Miss Callas' failure to complete her performance Thursday night at the opening of the Rome Opera.

A scuffle broke out between pro-Callas and anti-Callas fifters. Most of their instruments were broken and most of the fifters needed first aid.

WHAT'S UP THERE NOW?

Four pieces of man-made astronomical hardware are still orbiting the earth, according to Dr. John D. Kraus, Ohio State U. Radio Observatory. Sputnik I and II nose cones, unreported for weeks, were spotted by him, since the Sputniks no longer broadcast, they can only be detected by radio telescope. The nose cone of Sputnik I is expected to fall relatively soon; Sputnik II itself may survive for several more weeks. No predictions are made on the death of Sputnik II and its cone.

Christensen Nags Judged Top Rodeo Bucker Of 1957

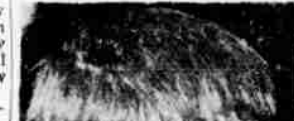
DENVER — Characterized by the riders as "a pinto gelding with a belly full of bed springs," a bronc named War Paint has been picked as the outstanding bucking horse of the year.

War Paint, owned by Hank and Bobby Christensen, rodeo stock contractors of Eugene, Ore. The Christensens will receive a silver trophy halter as War Paint's prize from Rodeo Sports News, the sport's official newspaper.

The trophy will be awarded during the National Western Stock Show rodeo in Denver, Jan. 16 and a special ride will match War Paint against Alvin Nelson, world champion saddle bronc rider for 1957.

The champion horse was selected from an estimated 2,500 wild ones by a ballot of the 10 riders who finished highest in the championship standings for the year.

War Paint, incidentally, had lost most of the men who voted for him.

U. S. Joins India, Nepal In Road Building Plan

NEW DELHI, India — The United States, India and Nepal have agreed to cooperate on an ambitious road-building program. The work is to begin soon.

Ellsworth Bunker, U.S. ambassador to India and Nepal, signed the agreement today in New Delhi.

The United States will put up \$4,900,000 for the first three years of the five-year program. India will supply \$1,875,000 in rupees and Nepal will ante up the equivalent of \$370,000.

New roads will run southward from the mountainous interior of Nepal to the border railheads of the Indian railroad system. Some east-west roads will link interior towns with Katmandu.

American officials estimate the roads and vehicles will cut transportation costs 10 times.

The Freedonites are pacifists, vegetarians and opposed to public school teaching. A group of 100 Freedonite children now are detained in a dormitory school at New Denver, B. C., because their parents refused to permit them to attend school.

Negotiations were opened with the Soviet government some time back for return of the Freedonites.

Since settling here, the Freedonites have burned their own homes, set fire to schools, paraded in the nude, bombed railway lines and vigorously opposed tax gathering and census taking.

They said they wish to return to Russia because they believe religious persecution in Canada is worse than it was in imperial Russia.

Their main settlement is about 200 miles east of here.

Child In Icebox Saved Through Barking Dog

EL CENTRO, Calif. — While 500 men searched for her, 3-year-old Mary Ellen Jackson huddled in an icebox into which she told police, an elderly man placed her after saving her a ride in his car.

Although searchers had looked into the box three times Saturday night, the girl's father, Sam Jackson, found her there early Sunday. A barking dog attracted him to the box, which was kept in the Jackson's back yard for storing fish. The box had air vents and the child was in no danger of suffocating.

A doctor said the child had not been mistreated. Neighbors reported seeing two men loitering in the neighborhood Saturday. Mary Ellen was missing 12 hours.

Nonaggression Pact Try Has Soviet Endorsement

LONDON — The Soviet Union today led off favorable European reactions to Prime Minister Macmillan's proposal for an East-West nonaggression pact. West Germany and Italy appeared the most interested and no government rejected it outright.

Moscow radio pointed out that the idea was really a Russian one and said Macmillan had been pressured into backing it by "the aspirations of his people."

Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, noted with approval that "the British government intends to continue to seek an agreement with the Russians."

Macmillan starts a tour of commonwealth countries tomorrow.

JUDY GARLAND QUITS

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — Judy Garland's song and dance career ended for good yesterday when she walked off stage during a New Year's Eve show because she thought the crowd "too noisy."

The singer ended yesterday her four-week Flamingo Hotel, contract calling for a reported \$30,000 a week. The deal was canceled after one week by mutual consent.
