

### Tacoma Family Hopefully Awaits Information About Airman Held By Albanians

TACOMA — Prayerful thanks blended with hopeful anticipation at the home of Charles C. Curran Tuesday night.

The thanks were because Curran's brother, Air Force Maj. Howard J.B. Curran, had been reported alive in a Red Albanian prison.

The hopeful anticipation was because Curran and his family wondered how long the Reds would be able to hold his brother.

"If Howard is in Albania, they won't keep him long," Mrs. Charles Curran said. "He'll be too much fun and too much trouble. They'll send him home, and soon."

**Missing On Dec. 23**

The major was reported missing Dec. 23 on a flight from France to Italy in a T-33 jet training plane. Tuesday the Albanian radio said he had been forced down in Albania by jet fighter planes and was being held captive.

Charles Curran, secretary of a Teachers' Union local here, said his brother, whose wife died of cancer two years ago, has three children at Chateaux, France. The children, Michael, 12, Patricia, 10, and Mary Lou, 4, are being flown here in the company

of another brother, Lt. Richard Curran, an Air Force officer stationed at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C.

Howard Curran flew 96 missions over Europe during World War II, scoring five kills in the air and two on the ground. On his last mission he was shot down and was concealed until war's end by the French underground.

During the Korean War Curran flew another 165 missions.

For his exploits, Curran was awarded two Distinguished Flying Crosses, one Purple Heart and the Air Medal with 19 oak leaf clusters.

Born in Pratt, Kan., Curran has more than 500 hours of combat flying time to his credit.

### Conviction Of Four Marines For Harshness Reversed

YOKOSUKA, Japan — The U. S. Navy announced Wednesday that convictions of four Marines charged with mistreating Navy prisoners at the Sasebo base have been reversed and acquittals of three others upheld.

There was no indication so far that any of the other four convictions in the trials of guards at the U. S. Navy base at Sasebo had been upheld.

In all, eight Marine guards have been convicted of cruelty charges and six acquitted. Another, Sgt. Robert J. Barbuti of Schenectady, N. Y., is now on trial before a general court-martial at Yokosuka. The last of the 16 defendants, Sgt. Adrian McLane of Philadelphia, Pa., will be tried after Barbuti.

The Navy said that Adm. Maurice E. Curtis, deputy commander of the Pacific fleet at Pearl Harbor and the final reviewing authority, had reversed the four convictions because he did not consider them justified. Charges against the four were dismissed.

**Four Marines Cleared**

The four Marines thus cleared were:

Cpl. Glenn Fredericks, 21, Fleetmouth, Alaska, sentenced to 14 days at hard labor and reduced to private for punching a prisoner. Fredericks has since returned to the United States for discharge.

Pfc. Maurice J. Beeson, 22, Palo Alto, Calif., sentenced to 10 days, demotion to private and a \$30 fine, convicted of rabbit-punching a sailor and forcing him to crawl on his hands and knees like a dog.

Cpl. James T. Ray, 21, Texas City, Tex., sentenced to 15 days at hard labor without confinement, demotion to private first class and forfeiture of \$30 pay on conviction of punching a prisoner in the stomach.

Pvt. Jose D. I. Medina, 22, Albuquerque, N. M., sentenced to 30 days restriction and a \$60 fine, convicted of striking a brig inmate.

The Navy said Curtis upheld the acquittals of Cpl. Dayton W. Dierksen, 21, St. Lawrence, S. D.; Sgt. Bobby Phillips, Tyler, Tex.; and Sgt. Tommy G. Flint, Silas, Ala.

### Theft Of Radio Laid To 13-Year-Old Boy

The theft of a small transistor radio from Frowbridge Electric was said cleared Tuesday with the arrest of a 13-year-old Roseburg boy.

Roseburg police said the boy was taken into custody after a check at the school revealed the stolen radio in his locker. A description furnished officers by a store employee led police to the school where they waited until a boy fitting the description left the building.

### Glendale Council Receives Report On Street Work

### Sutherlin Reclassified By Fire Underwriters

Word has been received by the Sutherlin City Council that the community has been reclassified to National Board of Fire Underwriters Classification Six.

This will mean a decrease in fire insurance rates on most properties of approximately 10 per cent upon renewal of their policies. It does not effect present policies.

The lowering in classification was brought about by the acquisition of a second fire truck in 1954, additional fire-fighting equipment made available in the city, extension of fire mains and hydrants and improvement of the entire water system, over a period of the past five or six years.

The city applied for reclassification in 1954 to the Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau. Inspection of facilities for reclassification was made in August and September, 1957.

### Eisenhower's Farm Gets Payments By Soil Bank

GETTYSBURG, Pa. — A U.S. Agriculture Department official reported Wednesday President Eisenhower's farm at Gettysburg received soil bank payments totaling \$2,009.60 for not growing corn and wheat the past two years.

Glen Miller, chief of the Adams County office of the USDA Commodity Stabilization Service, made the statement when asked about a Washington dispatch to the New York Times that also noted the farm got federal payments for conservation practices.

"The figures are correct, as I understand them," Miller said.

### Oyster Shell Dredge Upped Shells Three

HOUSTON, Tex. — A new 250-foot oyster shell dredge, built by rough waters, overturned in Galveston Bay 40 miles southeast of Houston yesterday. Three of its 23 crewmen drowned.

The others were injured but were reported in satisfactory condition.

The H. A. Sawyer was dredging shell and loading barges on either side when it capsized two miles east of the Houston ship channel in 15 feet of water.

### Benson To Recommend End Of Acreage Reserve Part

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Agriculture Benson said Tuesday the administration will recommend ending the half-billion dollar annual acreage reserve part of the soil bank program at the end of this crop year.

Benson also told a news conference his department's budget for the fiscal year beginning next July 1 will be no larger than this year's \$5,400,000,000 figure.

Benson said the administration plans to send its farm recommendations to Congress in a special message possibly Jan. 15 or 16. He did not discuss these recommendations. But he has said in the past they would call for

### Ben-Gurion's Cabinet Wins Confidence Vote

JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector — One week after his Israeli government resigned because of a breach of Cabinet secrecy, Premier David Ben-Gurion and the same five political parties were back in office today.

The new government won a confidence vote from Parliament last night 76-33 after Ben-Gurion expressed certainty that a secret vote would not be broken again. The Premier said the Achdut Avodah (Labor Unity) party leaked plans to send a special mission to West Germany to seek arms.

### To Expire In 1959

Under the soil bank's acreage reserve, the government offers payments to farmers who retire allotted acres from production of corn, cotton, wheat, rice and tobacco—major surplus crops. This program is now scheduled to expire at the end of the 1959 crop year. Benson said Congress will be asked to end it a year earlier.

Benson said the recommendations will call for increased emphasis on the longer-range reserve part of the soil bank. This authorizes payments to farmers who retire land, including full farms, for long periods of time and plant the land to grasses, trees and other conservation uses.

Benson was asked if he thinks this Congress will be "any less tough on you personally."

Laughing a little, Benson replied that "only time will tell."

Benson again defended his recent action ordering lower dairy price supports effective April 1. He said he is confident the decision was the correct one.

### Hillary, Fuchs In Step Again

AUCKLAND, New Zealand — Sir Edmund Hillary and Dr. Vivian Fuchs, the British Commonwealth's chief antarctic explorers, today were reported in step once more.

Word from Scott base said Hillary, leader of the New Zealand expedition, would fly to meet Fuchs' party of Britons after they pass the South Pole and guide them to the New Zealand base at McMurdo Sound.

Fuchs, who is making the first overland crossing of the antarctic continent, reported today that he was not 200 miles from the pole. He is to meet Hillary at a point about 500 miles beyond the pole and 700 miles from Scott base.

Hillary and a party of New Zealanders established supply dumps at intervals from McMurdo Sound to the 700-mile point, then went on to the pole.

### Three American Mothers En Route To See Sons

HONG KONG — Three American mothers flew north from Canton today to visit their sons in Red Chinese prisons.

Mrs. Ruth Redmond, Yonkers, N.Y., left the south China port city first on a flight to Shanghai. Her businessman son Hugh, 28, has been in prison there since 1951, serving a life sentence on espionage charges.

Mrs. Jessie Fecteau, Lynn, Mass., and Mrs. Mary Downey, New Britain, Conn., left later on a flight to Peiping. Richard Fecteau and John Downey have been held since 1952 on spying charges, sentenced to 20 years and life, respectively.
