A pair of free throws by Phil Edin with 10 seconds left in the game gave the Yoncalla Eagles a close 43-41 victory over the Elkton Elks in a Douglas B League basketball game, Tuesday night at Elkton.

The Eagles came from behind with a fourth quarter rally to win the close game, their first league win of the year. Elkton had a 31-28 advantage going into the final eight minutes of action, but the well-balanced scoring power of the Eagles told the tale in the end.

Elkton had a 10-8 lead at the end of the first quarter as Ralph Beal and Dave Compton hit the nets for four points apiece. T. E. Bowman of the Eagles had six of the Yoncalla eight points in the opening quarter.

With Beal hitting for five more in the second period, Elkton kept a slight 20-19 halftime lead and then increased it to the 31-28 count at the end of the third period.

Joe Bourne of the Harlem Globetrotters, who will play in the Roseburg High School Gym Tuesday, Jan. 14 against the Washington Generals, is one of the exceptions to the common belief that a little man can't hold his own in top-flight professional basketball.

The boy from Brooklyn is only 5-9 in his stocking feet, but even among his giant teammates he stands out as a star. More surprising that he holds this status is the fact that he is in his first season with this fabulous quintet. It normally takes a new man several seasons to blossom out as a Trotter lead-line.

Bourne is one of the greatest dribblers in basketball and usually puts on a demonstration or two of his amazing knack with the ball in every game. Trotter coaches believe Bourne will become one of the greatest ever in this department before too many seasons.

Only 22, Bourne starred in basketball in both high school and college. He's one of the hardest men on the Trotter team to guard and his great speed in going up and down the court makes him a valuable defensive cog.

The game, which matches the Trotters against the Generals, is slated to start at 8:15 p.m., with tickets on sale at J.C. Sporting Goods. Also along with the Trotter team are five variety acts of some of the finest entertainment in the world.

Jimmy Brown, Cleveland's bulldozing fullback, swept the boards in the annual Associated Press poll Wednesday, gaining quadruple honors as the Player, Back and Rookie of the Year besides getting the most votes on the AP all-pro team.

The 220-pound muscleman was the only member of the Browns to earn a place on the two-plate team as San Francisco got four berths while Baltimore, Green Bay and the champion Detroit Lions earned three places each.

Brown was named on all 36 ballots of the sports writers covering the NFL campaign in the various cities from Coast to Coast. He received 34 votes for the fullback spot and two for left halfback. Gino Marchetti of Baltimore attracted the second highest total of votes, 35, for an end post on the defensive unit.

Detroit's great linebacker, Joe Schmidt, was next with 34 votes. He was followed by offensive end, Billy Wilson of San Francisco, and defensive end, Gene Brito, 31.

Eleven Repeaters

Eleven players, led by Schmidt and Brito, were repeaters from 1956 all-star team. They included tackle Lou Creekmur and halfback Christiansen, Detroit; tackle Roosevelt Brown and halfback Frank Gifford, New York; tackle Art Donovan, Baltimore; middle guard Bill George, Chicago; Bears; halfback Ollie Matson, Chicago Cardinals; end R. H. Houston, Green Bay and guard Dick Stanfel, Washington.

Brown, who leaped from All-America fame at Syracuse University to a regular fullback berth with the Browns in one year, piled up 33 of the 36 votes to win the title of the freshman prize.

The 220-pound Long Islander also received 19 votes as the outstanding back and was named on 14 ballots as the circuit's No. 1 player.

Y.A. Tittle, San Francisco's veteran quarterback, was second.

In a non-conference game at Stockton, College of the Pacific piled up 20-3 early lead over Chico State and roared on to a shattering 72-33 victory. Fourteen Tigers saw action with Ken Flaig's 16 points high. Billy Graham led Chico with 15.

Roseburg Retains Early Margin In Whipping Sutherlin, 50-42

The Roseburg Indians built up a 20-9 lead at the end of the first quarter of play Tuesday night against Sutherlin and then held off the Bulldogs for a 50-42 non-league basketball victory in a game played on the Sutherlin floor.

In picking up their sixth win of the season against three losses, the Indians, after building up the large

first quarter lead, had more trouble with the Bulldogs than was expected as time-after-time a sharp shooting Sutherlin player would hit from far out to add another two points to the score.

After the first quarter, the Indians could outscore the Bulldogs in only one period, that one the third and then by only one point,

as the scrappy Sutherlin squad outplayed them throughout much of the second half.

Halftime is 29-20

With 6-5 Tom Barrong and 5-7 Bob Steele each hitting for six points in the first quarter, Roseburg started out like it was going to run the Bulldogs off the floor.

Sutherlin actually outscored the Indians 11-9 in the second period to hold the Roseburg lead down to 29-20 at the end of the first half.

Ron Kenwisher hit for five of the Sutherlin points in the third quarter to make the score read 47-27 going into the final eight minutes of action. But here the Indians tightened up and allowed the Bulldogs only two points more than themselves in the final quarter to account for the final eight-point margin.

It was Kenwisher again in the fourth period that sparked the Bulldogs as he hit for another six points, to run his total to 16 for the night, high on both teams.

Steele and Gary Cripps with four points each in the fourth period were the only Indians able to hit the nets.

Without the high-scoring Larry Sloan, who was out with the flu, Roseburg seemed to have trouble working the ball into position for a good shot.

Roseburg connected on eight out of 12 attempts from the free throw line, while Sutherlin hit on 10 out of 17 tries.

Kenwisher Leads Scoring

Steele with 14 points and Barrong with 10 led the Roseburg scorers, followed by Wes Jackson with nine and Gary Cripps with eight. Kenwisher with 16 points was high for Sutherlin and for the game, followed by Ray Hill with 14.

The next game of the season for the Indians will find them traveling to meet the Douglas Trojans on Friday, starting at 8 p.m.
